Bruges, Odob. 19. The French Army are every where teel i g to their Winter Quarters, placing great numbers of men in all'their new taken Garrisons, the Religious Houses not exempted at Lille, or the Co'ledges at Donay; having aliogreat bodies of host a wish which they intend to make Incurfiors all this Winter, and draw in all the Country into Contribution. That little part of the Country left to the Spaniards is not thought sufficient for the quartering of all their horse, who therefore are constrained to reform several of their Troup .

their notic; expecting also a larg: benevolence from the No-bility and Gentry of those parts: We he r of several Masts, Sails, and broken pieces of Ships call on thore about Blanckenbergh, and of many Ships lately caft away.

lague, Odob. 20. The 17th Infant arrived here Admiral De Ruyter, where he has given an account of all his Summers Expedicion, his Squadron having the 16th Inftant with little damage put into Rotterdam. Van Beuningben has alfo given them an account of his late Negotiation in the French Court, and acquainted the Deputies for fecret Affairs, with his private tranisctions with his most Christian M jesty and his principal Ministers, who 'tis fald are not altogether un-willing to beatken to an Accommodation with Spain: and in the mean while to a suspension of Arms in order thereunto.

The next week the States Intend to have a Meeting extraordinary, to confider of the Report made to them by Van Benninghen, and of some Proposals of the Ministers of the Marquels of Brandenburgh, wh , 'cis faid, feems much intereffed in the Affairs of the Spanish Netherlande.

Some farther proceedings there have been lately in the bu-finels of Portugal, whole Ambsflador hath given in his Memorials touching the Evacuation of the Towns of Cochin and Gananor in the Enft-Indies, from whom the States demand farther 8 millions upon the account of Brafille ; But to mafifeft their inclinations to peace, expect fome further prope-fitions to be made them by that Ambaffador. Vice-Admiral Van Ghent is arrived at the Uly with two or

three of his Ships, which have luffered great damage by an extraordinary tempelt, which he met with neer Hitland. Five of our Eaft-India Fleet are alfo come in there, and at the Texel ; one other of them is at Ancho neer Amilant mach injured by ill weather, to whom the Directors of that Company have ordered all necessaries to be sent for her repair.
We have not yet any certain news of the rest of them. The
Essex, commanded by Captain Paw, was cast away in her trance into the Uly, the Captain and most of her men loft, only 30 escaping.

West-Cowes, Off. 14.
