

# The London Gazette.

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Warsaw, January 5.

**T**He last Letters from *Cracow* told us, that the King of *Poland* was gone from *Zolkiew* to *Leopol*, where the Commissioners for the regulating the Winter-quarters, are still assembled; And that from thence his Majesty would go to *Czernieck* near *Lublin* a place he much delights in. In the mean time things are preparing for the general Dyet which is to meet here the 20th of the next month. The Provincial Dyets are now assembled in most of the Palatinates to choose their Deputies for the general Dyet, and to give them Instructions upon the great Point proposed by the King in his Circular Letters, to wit, the raising of such a sum of Money as is necessary for the recruiting the Troops, making of Magazines, and providing a good Train of Artillery; In which his Majesty desires a speedy resolution may be taken in the general Dyet that so he may be able to begin the next Campaign earlier than he did the last. The Letters from the Frontiers give an account that the Turks have brought 600 Wagons laden with Provisions into *Caminet*; And that the Tartars do make frequent Incurfions into the Polish Territories. The Troops which the Elector of *Brandenburg* sent the last Summer to the assistance of this Crown, are marching back to *Prussia*, being reduced to 1200 men. We are told that a Marriage is concluded b. tween the Prince of *Poland* and *Madameiselle de Bourbon*. And that the Queen will go to *France* in the Spring.

*Vienna, January 18.* The Turks in *Newbeusel* encouraged with the succor they lately received, have since made several Excursions with very strong Parties; The 3000 Horse that brought in the Provisions, were according to our last advices still there; It's said there would be drawn out of them 1000 or 1200 men to make up the Garrison, and the rest with the old Men and others that are unfit for Service, and the Women and Children would be sent back to *Agria* and *Buda*. There are Letters from *Hungary* which say, that a considerable Body of Turks is drawing together between *Buda* and *Gran*, with design to pass the *Danube* and put a farther supply into *Newbeusel*, but it deserves no great credit. They write from *Croatia* that the Turks have very closely blocked up *Wroawitza* (which place was taken by General *Leslie* the last Summer) but it is so well provided with all things necessary that we do not think it to be in any danger. The States of *Austria* are now assembled here, but it is not yet known how great a sum of Money the Emperor does ask of them. On Sunday last the Duke of *Lorraine* returned hither with the Queen Dowager of *Poland* his Wife, whom he had been to meet at *Lintz* in her way hither from *Inspbruck*.

The same day the Emperor received an account of the death of the Arch-Bishop of *Gran* Primate of *Hungary*, who it's said has given all his Temporal Estate and a great sum of Money to the Emperor; The Baron *Abele* is gone from *Trenchin* to *Newsel* to confer with General *Rabata* about removing the Troops of *Bavaria* into better quarters, who make great complaints of those they are now in. The Count of *Wallastain* has given the Emperor an account of the disposition he left things in at the Court of *Poland*. We hear nothing farther of the Prince of *Poland* coming hither; And it's thought he is gone directly for *France*. All things are, it's said, agreed with the Count *de Hobenloe*, Envoy Extraordinary from the States of *Transonia* concerning the march and subsistence of the Troops they are to send to the Emperor's assistance.

*Vienna, January 21.* The Armenian, who arrived here the last week, had yesterday Audience of the Prince of *Baden* President of the Council of War, to whom he delivered a Letter from the Visier of *Buda*; of which we do not yet know the Contents; but it's said that in his discourse he made some overture towards the setting on foot a Negotiation of Peace. The Emperor has written to the Cities of *Ulm*, *Ratisbonne*, and other places on the *Danube* to provide a certain number of Boats for the use of the Troops with which the Elector of *Cologne* is to assist his Imperial Majesty. It's said the Court will remove the next month to *Lintz*; And that the Marriage between the Elector of *Bavaria* and the Arch-Duchess the Emperor's Daughter will be celebrated there. The Cold is at present so severe that People are daily found Frozen to death in the Streets.

*Ratisbonne, January 22.* The Memorial presented by the Imperial Commissioners demanding the assistance of the Empire against the Turks, hath been read in the several Colledges of the Dyet, and there has been a long debate upon it; but it is a matter that meets with so many difficulties that the Imperial Ministers have thought it necessary to dispatch an Express to *Vienna*, and have desired the Colledges to proceed no farther in it till his return. On Thursday last died here the Bishop of *Aichstet* the Emperor's Principal Commissioner at the Dyet in the 80th year of his Age. The Bishop of *Salzburg* hath promised to assist his Imperial Majesty with a sum of Money, and with several great Cannon. They write from *Vienna* that the Count of *Wallastain* was returned from *Poland*; And that the Ambassador of *Venice* had obtained leave from the Emperor to raise a Regiment of Dragoons for the Service of the Republick.

*Cologne, January 26.* The Magistrates of this City finding it a very difficult thing to raise the 600 men they are to assist the Emperor, with, do offer instead thereof to give a sum of Money, which it's believed his Imperial Majesty will consent to.

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The Count de Daun the Imperial Minister, arrived yesterday at *Bonne* in his return from *Zell* and *Paderborn*; and is expected here in a day or two with the Baron de *Meyersheim*. The last Letters from *Vienne*, confirm the account we had of the Turks having put some Provisions into *Newbeusel*, but withal tell us, that they continue to be in great want in the Town of Fuel and other necessaries; and that there was a report that the Turks were drawing together 10 or 12000 men to put such a Convoy into the place as might sufficiently provide it with Ammunition and Provisions and every thing else they at present want. Count *Teckley* since his late defeat by General *Schultz*, is retired to the Castle of *Mongatz*, from whence he has, it's said, written to the Visier of *Buda* to let him know that he will be in the Field early in the Spring with a very good Body of men.

*Hamburg*, January 26. The Duke of *Holstein* parted from hence the 22. Instant for *Vienne*, having, it's said, rejected the Proposal about exchanging the Dutchy of *Sleswyck* for the Countreys of *Oldenburg* and *Delmerborst*. The King of *Denmark* has made the Count de *Rantzaw* Stadtholder, and the Sieur *Lelienkyoon* Chancellor, of *Sleswyck* and *Holstein*. And we are told that his Majesty will pass the greatest part of the next Summer in *Holstein*. The Letters from *Lunenburg* tell us that the Duke of *Hanouer* begun his journey for *Italy* the 18th Instant.

*Brussels*, January 30. The great Reform has been put in execution in *Flanders*; And the Intendant-General came hither yesterday to go on with it in this Province; There will be broken of the Foot, two Spanish, four German, three Walloon, the Burgundian, the English, and Irish Regiments; The Scotch will be kept on foot, but some Companies will be reformed. Yesterday was performed in the Chapel of the Court the Ceremony of giving the Prince de *Ligne* the Golden Fleece by the Prince de *Nassaw* the Eldest Knight of that Order at present here, assisted by the other Knights, the Prince de *Faudemont*, the Marquis de *Grana*, the Duke of *Holstein* and the Marquis of *Rhisberg*, after which they were entertained at Dinner by the Marquis de *Grana*, the Knights continuing all the while in their Robes. This week arrived here Monsieur *Spanheim* in his way to *France*, whither he is going in quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Brandenburg*. Our Letters from *Liege* tell us, that the Clergy have agreed to the Subsidies demanded by the Elector of *Cologne* their Prince, for the War against the Turks, upon condition that the Moneys be sent directly to the Emperor except such part thereof as shall be given to the Troops his Electoral Highness has promised to send to the Emperor's assistance, before they begin their march.

*Hague*, February 2. The Commissioners of the Court of Justice are returned from *Dort*, having before they left the place, put the Persons chosen by the Prince of *Orange* out of the second Nomination, into the Magistracy of that City; which the contrary Party are much dissatisfied at, and it's said they will bring the matter again before the States of *Holland* at their next meeting, which will be on the sixth of *February*. But the main Business that it's believed will then employ the said States, is the estate of the War for the next year, which several of the Towns do oppose, thinking it necessary to make a farther reduction of the Troops. The Bailly *Van Bancken* who hath been sometime a Prisoner at *Amsterdam* for making an attempt upon the Person of one of the Burghermasters of that City, will, it's said, in few days be brought to his

Tryal; His Son who was seized at the same time with him, is again at liberty. The Sieur *Norf*, who resides here on the part of the Elector of *Cologne*, has this week presented another Memorial to the States General, wherein he desires a regulation may be made concerning the passage of his Electoral Highness's Troops and those of this State through each others Territories when there is occasion for it. The Sieur *Dieff* is expected here in three or four days with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Brandenburg*; The Heer d' *Amerongen* who is returned from that Court, is at present at his House near *Utrecht*. The States General have not yet returned an Answer to the Heer *Camprecht* upon his Memorial desiring Succor against the Turks.

*Paris*, February 3. We have an account by a Courier arrived from *Rome*, that the Senate of *Genova* have at last resolved to send hither their Doge and four Senators; It's said they will be received and treated in all the places of this Kingdom through which they pass, with a great deal of Ceremony. The King has named the Marquis de *Fenquieres* to go his Ambassador to the Court of *Spain*; The Sieur de *Seyler* is arrived here with the Character of Resident from the Emperor; And the King has appointed the Abbat *Morel* to reside in the same quality at *Vienne*.

*Deal*, January 27: Yesterday arrived in the Downs the *Constantinople* from the *East-Indies*; the Commander Captain *Smith* dyed in the Voyage homeward.

*Whitehall*, January 28. On Sunday last Dr. *Thomas Kenn* was consecrated Bishop of *Bathe* and *Wells* by the most Reverend Father in God the Lord Archbishop of *Canterbury*, assisted by several other Bishops, at his Chapel at *Lambeth*. And the next day he did his Homage to His Majesty.
