PRESENT,

The **QUEEN's** Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the late Act of Uniformity, which establisheth the Liturgy, and enacts, that no Form or Order of Common Prayer be openly used other than what is prescribed or appointed to be used in and by the said Book, it is notwithstanding provided, that in all those Prayers, Litanies, and Collects which do anywise relate to the King, Queen, or Royal Progeny, the names be altered and changed from time to time, and fitted to the present occasion, according to direction of lawful authority: Her Majesty was pleased this day in Council to declare Her Royal will and pleasure, that in all the Prayers, Litanies, and Collects for the Royal Family the words "The Prince of Wales" be inserted immediately after the words "The Prince Albert."

And Her Majesty doth strictly charge and command, that no edition of the Common Prayer be from henceforth printed but with this amendment; and that in the meantime, till copies of such edition may be had, all Parsons, Vicars, and Curates within this realm do (for the preventing of mistakes), with the pen, correct and amend all such Prayers in their Church Books, according to the foregoing directions: And for the better notice hereof, that this Order be

forthwith printed and published, and sent to the several parishes; and that the Right Reverend the Bishops do take care that obedience be paid to the same accordingly.

THE following is a copy of an Order of Her Majesty in Council, for dividing the parish of Hursley cum Otterbourne, in the county of Southampton, into ecclesiastical districts, and assigning one of such districts as a district parish to the chapel at Ampfield, in the said parish of Hursley cum Otterbourne, under the 21st section of the 58th George 3, cap. 45:

At the Court at Claremont, the 3d day of September 1841, present, the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act, shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto, under his hand and seal; and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses, or other endowments, which will by such division arise and accrue, and remain and be within each of such respective divisions, and also the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce or fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits which may arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always, that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided;" and it is, by the 21st section of the said Act, further enacted, "that in any case, in which the said Commissioners shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish or extra parochial place into such complete, separate, and distinct parishes as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts as they, with the consent of the Bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary, for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending divine service, according to the rites of the United Church

of England and Ireland, to persons residing therein, in the churches and parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein, the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proposed to be described; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division;" and whereas by an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and by another Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and by another Act, made and passed in the 1st and 2d years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and also by another Act, made and passed in the 2d and 3d years of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to render more effectual an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect:

And whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to Her Majesty in Council in the words following, viz.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, appointed by virtue of an Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," and continued by an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," and further continued by an Act, passed in the first year of your Majesty's reign intituled "An Act to prolong for ten years Her Majesty's Commission for building new churches," beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, when the census was taken, in the year 1831, the united parishes of

Hursley cum Otterbourne, in the county of Hants and diocese of Winchester, contained a population of 2001 persons :

" That, besides the parish church of Hursley and the church or chapel at Otterbourne, which together afford accommodation to 850 persons, there is a new chapel, recently erected at Ampfield, in the said parish, which affords accommodation to 250 persons, all being free seats :

" That the said chapel at Ampfield has been consecrated and divine service is regularly performed therein :

" Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending this parish, it appears to them to them to be expedient that it should be divided into ecclesiastical districts, under the 21st section of the said Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, and that one of the said districts should be assigned as a district parish to the said chapel at Ampfield, for the purpose of affording accommodation for attending divine service to the persons residing in the said district parish, and for enabling the spiritual persons serving the said chapel to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the district parish attached to the said chapel, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district parish, and the preservation and improvement of the moral habits of the persons residing therein ; and that such district parish should be named " The District Parish of Ampfield," with boundaries as follows :

" To commence at a place called Guttridge drove, adjoins Dore-lane, and proceed up the said drove to Limeshard-gate ; thence, crossing the Ampfield-outwood, in a southerly direction, to Clay-pitt-hill ; then follow Clay-pitt-road, in a south easterly direction, to Hawker's paddock and knap ; then, northwardly, by the coach road, at Ampfield-coppice, to Portland-bank ; then, to the eastward, on the said bank to the Hunter's-ride, at the east end of the Portland-coppice ; then, turn a few yards, southerly, to the south west corner of Square-copse ; thence, by the south fence of the said copse, eastwardly, into an ancient drove into Raulake-lane, by the Brick-kiln near Petty-priest-coppice ; then crossing the Romsey and Winchester turnpike road to the south west corner of King's-meadow, following the south bank of the same to Kent's-coppice, by the south bank of such copse to the corner of Bailey's-paddock ; then, eastward, along the southern bank into the footpath leading from Hamstead ; then following the same path, eastwardly, into the Hursley and Southampton turnpike road, down the said road, southwardly, to the road leading from Ampfield to Otterbourne ; then turning eastwardly, following the road to Otterbourne ; then to the north east corner of a plantation on the south side of the last-mentioned road ; then turning a few yards to the south, proceed along the ancient bank of Hocombe-meadow to Hocombe-bridge ; then, eastwardly, along the aforesaid road to Otterbourne hill, at the eastern boundary of the parish ; then, southwardly, by the said boundary adjoining the parishes of Otterbourne, North and South Stoneham, Baddesley, Romsey, Michelmarsh, and Farley, to Guttridge-

drove aforesaid, as the same is more particularly described in the plan hereunto annexed, and therein coloured pink :

" That the consent of the Lord Bishop of Winchester has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act of the 58th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third ; and in testimony of such approbation the said Lord Bishop has signed and sealed this present instrument :

" Your Majesty's Commissioners beg leave, therefore, to lay before your Majesty the above-stated circumstances, and humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed division and assignment be accordingly made and effected, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

Change of Pilot Station from the River Hooghly..

NOTICE is hereby given, that, referring to the impracticability during the last S.W. monsoon, owing to the increasing resort of shipping to the port of Calcutta, to supply pilots at the distant station off Point Palmyras, the following arrangements will be adopted for the next S.W. monsoon :

1st. A pilot vessel will be stationed off False Point during the next S.W. monsoon, say, from the 15th of March to the 15th of September 1842, bearing,

according to circumstances, E. by N. to S.E. by S. from the light-house, and in from ten to fifteen fathoms depth of water.

2d. This vessel will exhibit by day, when any others are in sight, besides the usual Company's ensign at her peak, a large Danish jack (red with white cross) at her main top gallant mast head, and at night a good light in the same situation, besides burning a blue light every hour, and beating a gong frequently in calm thick weather, to warn vessels coming from the southward of her near neighbourhood; she will not, however, have any pilots on board, the main object of her intended station off False Point being to guard all inward-bound vessels from proceeding to the old station off Point Palmyras during the next season, and directing them to a new one in the South Channel, between the tails of the eastern and western reefs, where pilot vessels will then be found in from sixteen to twenty fathoms water, and from six to eight miles south west of the present South Channel buoy, that buoy laying in latitude $20^{\circ}58'30''$ N., longitude $88^{\circ}4'$ east of Greenwich, and in twelve fathoms water.

3d. For the purpose of more distinctly marking the new station, the commanding officer's vessel there will always wear by day, when other vessels are in sight, a large St. George's jack (white with red cross) at her main top gallant mast head, besides the usual Company's colours at her peak; and at night be distinguished by a constant good mast head light, by blue lights and maroons, used alternately every half hour, and also by guns fired every four hours, say, 8 p.m. midnight, and 4 a.m., with good rockets discharged at the same time.

4th. All vessels are recommended to be most careful in coming over from False Point to the new station by constant attention to the lead, and thereby correcting their steerage, as tides or currents may or may not set them out of their proper course; and they are also advised not to come under sixteen fathoms at night, especially till they reach the pilot's station, and get their proper pilots on board.

5th. Lastly, all vessels are directed not to approach the pilot station at night, without giving due warning, and not only by the exhibition of lights, say, two vertical, where best seen, but also by the discharge of a gun, if they have any on board, as soon as they descrie the first pilot vessel near them. They are further recommended to be most careful not to come into collision with any of the pilot vessels at the station on their own account, no less than that of the public, as they will be held responsible for all damages, and called upon afterwards to pay for all that may have arisen from bad look out, inattention to duty, or carelessness of any kind whatever.
