

Stamford, Febr. 9. His Majesty was this Day Proclaimed here by the Mayor, accompanied by his Brethren in their Formalities, the Right Honourable the Earl of Lindsey our Lord Lieutenant, with the Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, the Militia Officers, and other Gentlemen assisting at the Solemnity, which was followed with all the Demonstrations of a general Satisfaction. The like will be done within these two days throughout the whole County.

Birmingham, Febr. 9. This Afternoon His Sacred Majesty was Proclaimed at the Market-Cross of this place; which was followed with the unanimous and repeated Acclamations of the People.

Salisbury, Febr. 10. Yesterday Morning our most Gracious Sovereign Lord King JAMES the Second, was Proclaimed here by the Mayor and Aldermen in their Formalities, attended by the Officers, Wardens and Brethren of the several Companies of this City, which was done with the usual solemnity, and a general Satisfaction; and the Evening was spent with ringing of Bells, Bonfires, and other Expressions of Joy.

Windsor, Febr. 10. Yesterday His Majesty was Proclaimed here with all imaginable Expressions of Duty and Loyalty; the great Guns were thrice discharged, and the Day ended with Bonfires, and other Expressions of Joy.

Langford-River, Febr. 10. This Day His Majesty was Proclaimed here with great Joy and Loyalty, the Cannon round the Fort being thrice discharged, with three Volleys of small Shot, and the whole concluded with a great Bonfire.

Kingston upon Hull, Febr. 10. This Day about Noon His most Sacred Majesty King JAMES the Second, was Proclaimed by the Mayor, Aldermen, the Officers, and Chamberlains of this Corporation in their Formalities, and by the Deputy Governour, which was performed in the presence of our Governour the Right Honourable the Earl of Plymouth, and divers Gentlemen of the adjacent Country, with the greatest Demonstrations of Joy and Duty imaginable. The great Guns about the Town were thrice discharged, the Cannon gave several Volleys, and the Day concluded with Bonfires, and ringing of Bells.

Wigan, Febr. 10. This Afternoon Sir Roger Bradshigh, our present Mayor, accompanied with the Aldermen, Bayliff, Burgesses and principal Inhabitants, Proclaimed at the High Cross of this place our Gracious Sovereign King JAMES the Second, which was done with great Solemnity, and with mighty Acclamations of the People; and was followed with Bonfires, ringing of Bells &c.

Welbeck in Nottinghamshire, Febr. 10. His Majesty has been Proclaimed in four of the most considerable Towns of this County with great Expressions of Joy and Loyalty; and in our next we shall be able to tell you that the like has been done throughout the whole County.

Portsmouth, Febr. 10. Yesterday His Majesty was Proclaimed here with a great deal of Solemnity, and with all possible Demonstrations of Joy and Duty. The Mayor and Aldermen were in their Formalities, assisted by the principal Inhabitants; the Cannon was in Arms; the great Guns were discharged round the Town with Volleys of small Shot, which was answered by the Neighboring Gallies and the whole Navy; and at Night the Streets were filled with Bonfires.

Plymouth, Febr. 10. This Day our Gracious King JAMES the Second, was Proclaimed by the Mayor and his Brethren in their Formalities, accompanied with the most considerable Inhabitants, the People expressed their Joy with repeated Acclamations: The great Guns were thrice discharged from the Royal Citadel, St. Nicolas Island, and the Ships in the Harbor, and the Soldiers gave three Volleys of small Shot; the Evening concluding with Bonfires, ringing of Bells, &c.

Warwick, Febr. 10. This Day His Majesty was Proclaimed here with the Solemnity becoming the occasion, and with a general cheerfulness and Satisfaction.

Chester, Febr. 10. This Day His Sacred Majesty King JAMES the Second was Proclaimed here in the presence of our Governour, the High Sheriff, a great many Gentlemen, and the most eminent Citizens, which was followed with a treble discharge of the great Guns, and three Volleys of small Shot; the Evening concluding with Bonfires, ringing of Bells, and repeated Acclamations of Joy.

Dover, Febr. 11. Yesterday His Majesty was Proclaimed here with the usual Solemnity and an universal Joy.

Aylesbury, Febr. 11. His Majesty was Yesterday Proclaimed here in the presence of the Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, and a great Number of Gentlemen, upon a Stage for that purpose Erected in the middle of the Market Hill, which was followed with great Acclamations, ringing of Bells, and all other Expressions of a general Satisfaction.

Exeter, Febr. 11. Yesterday His Majesty was Proclaimed in this City with great Solemnity, and all imaginable Expressions of Joy and Loyalty.

Chichester, Febr. 11. Yesterday His Sacred Majesty King JAMES the Second, was Proclaimed here by our Mayor and his Brethren in their Formalities, accompanied with the Lord Bishop of this Diocels, together with the Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, and many other Gentlemen of this County; which was performed with all the Solemnity this place was capable of, and was followed with Bonfire, ringing of Bells, and other Demonstrations of Joy.

Boston, Febr. 11. The Ninth Instant the Mayor, accompanied with the Aldermen and Common-Council in their Formalities, and the Clergy and Gentry of this place, Proclaimed our Gracious Sovereign King JAMES the Second, which was performed with the greatest Demonstrations of Joy and Loyalty; that Subjects could express: The great Guns were thrice discharged, and the Trained Bands gave several Volleys of small Shot, which was followed with ringing of Bells, Bonfires, &c. to the great Satisfaction of the whole Town.

Oxford, Febr. 11. This Morning His Majesty was Proclaimed here by the Mayor, Bayliff, and all the Council Chamber in their Formalities upon Horseback, the Right Honourable the Earl of Arundel, Lord Lieutenant of the County, accompanied with above Six Hundred Gentlemen likewise on Horseback, the Lord Bishop, the Vice-Chancellor, and the whole University in their Formalities assisting at the solemnity, which was performed with great order, the Bells ringing, Trumpets sounding, Musick playing, the Conduits running with clear Water, and the Evening concluding with Bonfire, and with all the Demonstrations of Joy that could possibly be expressed.

York, Febr. 11. Yesterday Morning our Dead Sovereign King JAMES the Second, was Proclaimed here by the Lord Mayor and his Brethren, the Lord Archbishop His Majesties Governour, the High Sheriff of the County, several Deputy-Lieutenants, and other Gentlemen, with a multitude of Citizens assisting at the Solemnity which was performed with all the Ceremonies accustomed upon the like occasions, and was followed with loud and repeated Acclamations of the Citizens; the rest of the Day, and part of the Night, was spent in ringing of Bells, Bonfires, and all other Expressions of a general Satisfaction.

Whitehal, Febr. 14. We have in account from many other places of His Majesties having been Proclaimed with the like Expressions of Joy and Duty, of which we have not room to give at present any particulars.

Whitehal, February 14. This Evening was privately Solemnized the Funeral of His late Majesty King CHARLES the Second, from the Painted Chamber in the Palace at Westminster, to the Abbey-Church there. The Body was carried under a Velvet Canopy, born by Gentlemen of the Privy-Chamber, six Earls supporting the Pall. The Proceeding began with Servants to the Nobility, their Royal Highnesses, their present Majesties, the Queen Dowagers, and the late Kings Servants, &c. After whom followed Barons, Bishops, and others of the Nobility according to their respective Degrees, together with the Great Officers, and the Lord Archbishop of *Canterbury*. His Royal Highness the Prince of Denmark was Chief Mourner, (his Train born by the Lord *Cornbury*;) The Supporters to the Chief Mourner were the Dukes of *Somerset* and *Beaufort*, wearing their Collars of the Order, as the other Knights of the Garter, then present, did. The Assistants to the Chief Mourner were Sixteen Earls. One of the Kings of Arms carried the Crown and Cushion, the rest of the Officers of Arms attending and directing the Ceremony, which was closed with His Majesties Band of Gentlemen-Pensioners, and the Yeoman of the Guard.

At the Entrance into the Church the Dean and Prebendaries of *Westminster*, attended with the Quire, met the Body, and proceeded to King *Henry* the Seventh's Chappel, where it was Interred in a Vault under the East-end of the South Isle. Service being ended, and the Officers of His Majesties Household having broken their Staves, the Royal Stile was Proclaimed by another of the Kings of Arms according to custom.
