Late Majesty King George the Fourth, initituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and by another Act, made and passed in the 1st and 2d years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, initituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty, initituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and al-o by another Act, made and passed in the 2d and 3d years of His said late Majesty, initituled "An Act to render more effectual an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, initituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect: :

And whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to Her Majesty in Council, in the words following, viz.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, appointed by virtue of an Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" continued by an Act, passed in the 7ta and 8th years of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and further continued by an Act, passed in the 1st year of your Majesty's reign, initialed "An Act to prolong, for ten years, Her Majesty's Commission for building new churches;" beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that when the census was tal en, in the year 1-31, the parish of Hillingdon, in the county of Middlesex and diocese of London, contained a population of 6885 persons:

" That besides the parish church, which affords accommodation to 670 persons, there are two chapels in the said parish, called respectively St. Margaret's and St. John the Evangelist's Chapels; that St. Margaret's Chapel affords accommodation to 900 persons, including 426 free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; and that St. John the Evangelist's Chapel affords accommodation to 500 persons, including 250 free seats appropriated to the use of the poor;

"That the said chapels have been consecrated, and divine service is regularly performed therein :

"Your Majesty's Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty, that having taken into consideration all the circumstan es attending this parish, it appears to them to be expedient, that particular districts should be assigned to the said chapels, called St. Margaret's and St. John the Evangelist's Chapels, under the provisi ns of the 16th section of an Ac, p.s. ed in the 59th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, initialed "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parlia-

> "Saint Margaret's district, Uxbridge, is to comprise the whole of the township of Uxbridge, being bounded on or towards the north by the parish of Denham and the remaining part of the parish of Hillingdon; on or towards the east by Waters or Watery-field, Press-field, Great-mead, Lord's-field, and Abbot's close; and on or towards the south by the Chequer-closes, Little Crown-alley, Vine-street, Church lane, and Heaborn's meadow, all in the said remaining part of Hillingdon; and on or towards the west by Fray's-river and the Grand Junction Canal, and including also a small triangular piece of land, bounded by parts of such canal, and five willow trees, as is more particularly delineated in the plan hereunto annexed, and thereon tinted green:

St. John's District, Uxbridge-moor.

"The boundary commences at Rockingham-bridge, and proceeds in a south easterly direction along the centre of Flav's-river, as tar as the north side of the bridge on the Windsor and Hillingdonroad, over that river; then south west and westerly to a wall, as shewn on the annexed plan, one hundred and twenty paces from the bridge, across the Grand Junction Canal, and crossing that canal and the waste water from the culverts, proceeds to the River Colne, by an imaginary line, as shewn on the plan, and then along the centre of that river to a ditch which runs from the western to the eastern branch of the River Colne; thence eastward along the centre of the ditch crossing the eastern branch of the River Colne, proceeding eastward across the Grand Junction Canal and along the centre of a ditch which runs from the said canal to Fray's-river; then on a southerly direction along the west bank of that river to Rockingham-bridge, where, the boundary commenced, as is more particularly shewn by, the annexed plan, the boundary being thereon colonred red :

"That marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized, and performed in each of the said chapels; and that the news arising therefrom should be necessed by and belong, to the Ministers of the said chapels:

"That the consent of the Lord Bishop of London has been obtained thereto, as required by the above mentioned section of the said Act, passed in the 59th year of His Majesty. King George the Third; in testimony of which the said Lord bishop has signed and sealed this present instrument:
