Preston in Lancashire, Febr. 11. This day His Majesty was Proclaimed here by the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen and Common-Council in their Formalities, accompanied with all the Gentry for many miles round this place, which was performed with much solemnity and great Acclamations of Joy; the Evening concluding with ringing of Bells and Bonfires.

Peardennis, Febr. 11. His Majesty was this day Proclaimed here by the Mayor, Recorder, and Aldermen in their Formalities; The great Guns from the Castle were discharged, with three Volleys of small-shot and all other expressions of duty and Satisfaction.

Berwick upon Tweede, Febr. 11. This day His Majesty was Proclaimed here first by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgeses in their Formalities, and then by the Deputy-Governor and Officers of this place, with much Solemnity, after which the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgeses accompanied with the Deputy-Governor and Officers of the Garrison returned to the Toll-Booth and there drank their Majesties Healths, and all the Royal Family. The Guns firing (three times about the Line) the Bells ringing, and Musick playing, with all other expressions and testimonies of true Affection and Loyalty to His most Sacred Majesty.

Burham in Worcestershire, Febr. 11. The 9th Instant His Majesty was Proclaimed here by the Mayor assisted with his brethren

Wresten in their Fortalice, and divers Gentlemen of the best Quality herabouts, and a great concourse of People who expressed their satisfaction in loud and unanimous Acclamations, and the night concluded with Bonfires, ringing of Bells, &c.

Heddon in Yorkshire, Febr. 14. This day His Majesty was Proclaimed here by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Bayliffs in their Formalities accompanied with the Gentlemen of the Neighborhood, and the principal Inhabitants of this place, which was performed with great expressions of Joy and Duty.

Hertford, Febr. 14. The 9th Instant His Majesty was Solemnly Proclaimed at Buntingford by our High Sheriff in the presence of several Justices of the Peace, and other neighboring Gentlemen. The 10th His Majesty was Proclaimed in like manner at Ware. The 11th at Royston. The 12th at Bishops Stafford and Hatfield. And this day His Majesty was Proclaimed in this place with much Solemnity by the said Sheriff in the presence of several Deputy-Lieutenants and Justices of the Peace, and many other Gentry of the County, and the Mayor, Recorder, and Aldermen in their Formalities, the People expressing their Joy with great Acclamations, ringing of Bells, and Bonfires in the Evening.

Colchester, Febr. 14. This day His Sacred Majesty King JAMES the Second, was Proclaimed by the Mayor and Commonalty of this place in their Formalities, with great Solemnity and all imaginable expressions of Joy and Duty, with the general Acclamations of the People, which were very numerous, the night concluding with Bells ringing, Bonfires, &c.

Barford in Oxfordshire, Febr. 14. This day the Bayliffs and Burgeses accompanied with the Principal Inhabitants of this place, and a great number of the neighboring Gentry, Proclaimed our most Gracious Sovereign King JAMES the Second, with ringing of Bells, Musick playing, and all other demonstrations of Joy.

Durham, Febr. 13. His Majesty King JAMES the Second has been Proclaimed here, and at Auckland, and in several other publick places within this County, with the greatest Joy and Acclamations imaginable; The Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, Clergy, and Gentry attending the Solemnity with great numbers of other People.

Clinthorpe in Lancashire, Febr. 14. This day His Sacred Majesty was, with great Solemnity, Proclaimed here by the Bayliffs and his Brethren in their Formalities, in the presence of great numbers of the Gentry of the adjacent Country, with the greatest Demonstrations of Joy and Duty imaginable, as also with the unanimous and repeated Acclamations of the People.

Huntingdon, Febr. 14. This day the Sheriff accompanied with the Lord Bishop of Lincoln, the Gentlemen of Quality, and Clergy of the County, and also the Magistrates of the Corporation, with great Solemnity Proclaimed His Majesty King JAMES the Second, with all possible demonstrations of Loyalty and Duty.

Brussels, February 27. The Court here has put on Mourning for the Death of the late King of England of Glorious Memory. And this morning Count Tilly parted from hence for England, being sent by his Excellency to make his Compliments of Condolence and Congratulation to His Majesty. We are told from the New Conquests that the French have marked out a Camp between the Sambre and the Meuse, and another towards Luxemburg. The last Letters from Vienna told us, that the Armenians who came from Buda, had only orders to treat about the exchange of some Prisoners, and that he would in few days be sent back. That Satisfaction had been given to the States of Croatia by removing several German Troops which were quartered there. And that three German Regiments, who had their quarters in Hungary, were likewise for the ease of that Kingdom ordered to march towards the Hereditary Countries. That preparations were making to receive and quarter the Auxiliary Troops which the Princes of the Empire send to the Emperors assistance.

Hague, Febr. 23. The 21 Instant parted from hence the Heir Van Owerkerck for England, being sent by the Prince of Orange to condole the death of the late King of Blessed Memory, and to Congratulate His Majesties Succession to the Crown. And the States General have resolved to send an Extraordinary Embasie to make their Compliments to His Majesty on this Solemn occasion. The States of Holland are not yet come to a final resolution about the Rate of the War for this present year, Amsterdam, Delft, Leyden, and several other Towns, still pressing that a further reduction may be made of the Troops of the State.

Paris, February 17. The 12th Instant the Articles concerning the Submission of the Republick of Genoua were Signed at Versailles, by which it is agreed, That the Doge and four Senators of Genoua shall repair to Versailles, or some other place of this Kingdom, before the 10th of April at farthest, from whence they shall continue their Journey to the place where the King is; and being admitted to Audience in their Robes of Ceremony, the Doge shall in the Name of the Republick declare their great Regret for having displeas'd his Majesty, and shall use such other submissive and respectful Expressions as may best manifest the sincere desire of the Republick has to

deserve for the future his Majesties kindness. That the said Doge and Senators shall at their return to Genoua re-enter upon the exercise of their respective Places and Functions. That the Republick shall dismiss within a month the Spanish Troops which they have received into any of their places; And do by the present Treaty renounce all Leagues and Affociations made since the first of January 1683. That the Republick shall reduce their Gallies to the same number they were three years ago; and shall disarm those they have fitted out since. That the Republick shall restore what can be found remaining of the Effects taken from the French; and his Majesty in lieu of other Reparations for the Losses sustained by his Subjects, is content the Genoueses shall give such a sum of Money, as the Pope shall think fit, towards the repairing the Churches and Convents at Genoua that were ruined or damaged by the Bombs the last year. That the Republick shall pay within two Months 100 thousand Crowns to the Count de Fiesque, but without prejudicing the Reason they have against the said Count; And his Majesty promises that he will not support with his Arms, or other Force the Pretensions of the said Count, but will leave them to be decided by the Methods of Justice. The King will give the said Doge and Senators such a favourable Reception as may facilitate them of the return of his Royal Kindness: And after having performed the function they are sent for, they may return to Genoua, his Majesty declaring that no other Conditions or Demands shall be imposed upon them but such as are agreed by this Treaty. All acts of Hostility to cease within a month, and all Prisoners to be set at liberty.

Paris, February 24. This Court is gone into Mourning for the death of His late Majesty of Great-Britain, of which we received the News by an Express on the 19th Instant. We are told that Orders have been sent to Brett and Rochefort for the fitting out several Men of War. The 20th Instant the Popes Nuncio had another Audience of the King.

Westminster, Febr. 19. This day the Right Honorable the Earl of Rochester Lord High Treasurer of England, being accompanied with many of the Nobility and other Persons of Quality, and attended by the Officers of the Exchequer, took the usual Oaths in the Courts of Chancery and the Exchequer, before the Right Honorable my Lord Keeper, who made a very Eloquent speech to his Lordship on this occasion. And my Lord Treasurer having taken his Place as Chief Judge in the Court of Exchequer, went afterwards to visit the several Offices according to Custom.
