And there has been Brought 32 thousand Florins of the Effate of the late Arch Bilhop of Gran into the Emperors Treasury, which will be em-ployed in the Preparations for the next Campagne. It's faid the Emperor will have two Armies in the Field this next Summer, the one com-poled of his own Troops and thole of Hungary un-det the Command of the Duke of Lorrain; and the other of the Troops of the Empire, which we are affured will make above 50000 men, Com-manded by the Elector of Bavaria. The 2009 men raifed by the States of Austria will be incorporated into the old Imperial Regiments.
