The Addresses from *Tiverton* and *Tonnes* were Presented to His Majesty by his Grace the Duke of *Albemarle*. And those from the Royal Citadel and Town of *Plymouth*, and from *Truro*, and *Grampound* by the Right Honourable the Earl of *Barb*.

Vienna, Febr. 15. Count *Rebata* General of the Imperial Horse, and Count *Serini* who commands the Elector of *Bavaria's* Troops, are both returned hither from *Hungary*, and have given the Emperor a particular account of the condition of the Troops quartered in that Kingdom. His Imperial Majesty to ease the Towns in *Hungary* has ordered three Regiments that are now quartered there to march for *Austria* and *Bohemia*; And several Troops lodged in *Croatia* are commanded to go and quarter in *Stiria*. The Armenian sent hither by the Vicer of *Buda* will be dispatched in few days; And because it has been reported that he came to make overtures of Peace, the Emperor has declared that he will faithfully and punctually execute the League he is engaged in, and consequently that he will not enter into any Negotiation with the Turks without the knowledge and consent of his Allies. The Prince of *Schwarzenburg* has Lent the Emperor 300 thousand Florins, greatest part whereof has been distributed among the Officers to make their Recruits. And there has been brought 52 thousand Florins of the Estate of the late Arch-Bishop of *Gran* into the Emperors Treasury, which will be employed in the Preparations for the next Campaign. It's said the Emperor will have two Armies in the Field this next Summer, the one composed of his own Troops and those of *Hungary* under the Command of the Duke of *Lorraine*; and the other of the Troops of the Empire, which we are assured will make above 50000 men, Commanded by the Elector of *Bavaria*. The 9000 men raised by the States of *Austria* will be incorporated into the old Imperial Regiments.

Brussels, March 2. There are reformed of the Troop in these Countries 18 Regiments; Eleven of Foot, and Seven of Horse besides the Independent Companies. They write from *Madrid* that the King of *Spain* had resolved to enter into the League against the Turks, and that Notice had been given thereof to the Pope's Nuncio. The Letters from *Ratisbonne* inform us that the Emperor hath named the Bishop of *Passau* to be his Principal Commissioner at the *Diet* in the place of the Bishop of *Aichstadt* deceased.

Brage, March 27. The States-General, the States of *Holland*, the Council of State, the Chamber of Accounts, the Court of *Holland*, the Great Council, the Council of *Brabant*, &c. have made their compliments of Condolence and Congratulation to the Prince and Princess of *Orange*, upon the Death of the late King of *England* of ever happy Memory, and His Majesties accession to the Crown. The *Sieur Camprecht* the Imperial Minister has given in another Memorial to the States-General concerning the Sacco the Emperor demands of them against the Turks. The States of *Holland* have not yet taken a final resolution concerning the State of the War for the present Year. The Nobles and Eleven of the Towns have consented to it, but the other Seven, among which are *Amsterdam*, *Delf*, *Dort*, and *Lejden* continue to press that the Troops may be reduced to 30000 Men.

Paris, March 3. The King has named the Mar-
chal de *Lorges*, and the Duke of *Orleans* the Mar-

quis d'*Eftampes*, to go and make their Compliments of Condolence and Congratulation to His Majesty of *Great Britain* upon the Death of the late King of ever Blessed Memory, and His Majesties Succession to the Crown. The Chevalier de *Sillery* and the Chevalier d'*Angouleme* are gone to make the same Compliments to His Majesty on the part of the Prince de *Conti* and the Prince de *la Roche-Sur-Yon*. We have an account from *Rome* of the Death of Cardinal *Carraccioli* Neopolitan, by which there are become vacant 24 Places in the Colledge of Cardinals; And that the Cardinals *Raggi* and *Gualtaldi* were dangerously Sick. They write from *Venice* that the Elector of *Saxony* was arrived there, and that he had offered to assist the Republick with 4000 men.

Whitehall, February 13. This Day Count *Seraclaes de Villy* Envoy from the Marquis de *Grana*, Governor General of the Spanish Netherlands, had Audience of their Majesties, being conducted thereunto by Sir *Charles Cotterel* Master of the Ceremonies.
