THIS day the Right Honourable the Lord Mayor, the Aldermen, Recorder, Sheriffs, Common Council, and Officers of the city of London waited upon Her Majesty with the following Address, which was read by the Honourable Charles Ewan Law, the Recorder, and which Her Majesty was graciously pleased to receive on the Throne :

To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble, loyal, and dutiful Address of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the city of London, in Common Council assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the city of London, in Common Council assembled, most humbly approach your Majesty for the purpose of giving utterance to our feelings on occasion of the recent attempt which has been made upon your Majesty's most valuable life.

While we refrain from any observations which may affect a question that must necessarily become the subject of judicial investigation, we unite with the whole British public in adoring the goodness of God to this highly favoured land in His recent deliverance of your Majesty from the hand of the assassin.

We beg to assure your Majesty, that our fervent supplications will ascend to the King of Nations that He will be graciously pleased still to watch over and to guard your Majesty's sacred person, and to vouchsafe to your Majesty a long, a prosperous, and a happy reign over a free, a united, and a grateful people.

They were all very graciously received, and had the honour of kissing Her Majesty's hand.

Warmly attached to the illustrious House of Brunswick, and the subjects of devoted loyalty to the reigning Monarch, we cannot but rejoice in the example held out to the nation by Her Majesty and your Royal Highness of social and domestic virtue ; and we fervently pray that you may be long spared to each other in the enjoyment of every blessing.
