**W**HILE Your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects Your University of Oxford, do hear prostrate our selves at your Royal Feet, to present with all humility this publick Testimony of our unfeigned sorrow for the Demise of our late Dread Sovereign of Blessed Memory; and withal from the bottom of our Hearts to adore, and magnifie the Providence of our good God, by whom Kings Reign, who out of his unspeakable mercy to this Church and state hath preserved Your Sacred Majesty to succeed in the Government of these Kingdoms.

And as we can never sever from the Principles of our Institution in this place, and our Religion by Law established in the Church of England, which indispensably bind us to bear all Faith and true Obedience to our Sovereign without any restrictions or limitations? So we cannot but most thankfully acknowledge that further Obligation Your Majesty hath laid upon us, by your Royal assurance to defend that Religion, which to the great Joy of all our Hearts You have vouchsafed to give us in Your late most Gracious Declaration.

And finally we shall never fail to be earnest Solicitors at the Throne of Grace; that it would please Almighty God, who of His infinite Goodness hath setled You in peace upon the Throne of your Royal Ancestors, to be henceforth and forever the defence and Shield of His Anointed, to protect your Person, and prolong Your days; and when You shall have holden Your course upon Earth in Peace, and Honour so to translate You from one Crown to another, to a never-falling Crown of Glory in His everlasting Kingdom.

Whitehall, Febr. 28. This day several Addresses signed by the Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of Peace, Lesgy, Gentry, Froemen, and other Inhabitants in the County and City of Durham, were humbly presented to his Sacred Majesty by the Lord Bishop of Durham Lord-Lieutenant there; all which were receiv'd very Graciously by His Majesty.

Doncaster Febr. 24. This day his Majesty was Proclaimed here by the Mayor, Recorder, and Aldermen, accompanied with about 600 Gentlemen all on Horse Back, which was performed with great Joy and Solemnity.

Eye in Suffolk, Febr. 25. His Majesty has been Proclaimed here with all imaginable Expressions of Duty and Loyalty.

Appleby in Westmorland, Febr. 15. This day his Majesty was Proclaimed here by the Mayor and Aldermen in their Formalities accompanied with Sir John Comber of Lowther, and many other Gentlemen and the Clergy, which was performed with much Solemnity, and with great Acclamations of the people, and afterwards the whole Company were entertained in a very extraordinary manner by the Mayor at the Town Hall.

Ludlow Febr. 27. This day his Majesty was Proclaimed here by the Sergeant at Arms with sound of Trumpet, Drums, and Wind Musick, attended with a Company of Musketiers and Pikees, our Conduits running with Wine, which was followed with Banquets, ringing of Bells, and all other Expressions of Joy and Loyalty.

Marston, February 28 His Majesty has been proclaimed here, and all other places of this County with all the Expressions of Joy and Loyalty.

His Majesty was Proclaimed the 14th Instant at Ayr in the County of Northumbria, The 18th at Newcastle in Northumbria. The 20 at Tring, The 23 at Berkhamstead, and the 24 at Wotton, which was performed with all the Demonstrations of Joy and Loyalty.

Windsor, February 22. The last Letters from New-Bergh gave an account that Colonel Hauser had discharged a Party of Turks who were going with a Convoy to Newbergh and had taken 60 Wagons Laden with Provisions and Ammunition; But told us withal that the Garrison of Newbergh being considerably reinforced with the Troops that have of late got into the Place, have made several excursions and burnt the Village of Gung putting all the Inhabitants to the Sword. An Officer arrived here this Week from Gung tells us that they were performed by the Convoy People that the Turks at Gung have not yet been able to repair the Fortifications of that Place ruined during the Siege; and that they are there in great want of Provisions. The Imperial Commissioners have Orders to provide 2000 Horses to mount the Cavalry and Dragoons

that want. The Elector of Saxony is to furnish 12 half Cannon and 6 Field Pieces for the Service of the next Campaign. Count Staremberg will Command the Emperor's Forces in Croatia the next Summer; And General Leslie will it is said have the chief Command in the Imperial Army in Hungary under the Duke of Lorraine. Count Berke late Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperors to the Kings of Denmark and Sweden, returned hither three days since. Signior Morosini an Ambassador from the Republick of Venice to the King of Poland, arrived here the 20th Instant in his return home.

Hamburgh, February 28. The Letters from Warsaw of the 17th Instant tell us, That the King of Poland came thither the day before. That the Dyes would meet the 20th; But that none of the great Officers of Lithuania were yet arriv'd.

Hague, March 6. The States General have Named the Heer Van Duynvoerden and the Heer Dyckweis to go for England in the quality of their Ambassadors Extraordinary (with whom will be joynd the Heer Van Citters at present their Ambassador at that Court) to Condole the Death of the late King of over Blessed Memory, and to Congratulate His Majesties Accession to the Crown. The States of Holland are adjourn'd till the 14th Instant; It is believed that at their next Meeting they will take a final resolution concerning the State of the War, to which the Nobles and small of the Towns have already consented. The Prince of Orange is gone to Dieren for a few days.
