In Recognisance whereof we shall be always ready to employ our Lives and Fortunes in your Majesties Service, And to pray the Almighty God to preserve You from the malice of Your Enemies, and to make You a Blessing to Your Durifal Subjects.

The Humble Address of the Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, and principal Gentlemen of the County of Suffolk.

May it please your most Excellent Majesty,

A calamity great as ours in the Death of our late Dread Sovereign, (which was every Mans sorrow) could not be dispersed but by a Blessing Vital and Extensive, as that of your Great and Gracious Majesty, in your Peaceable accession to the Crown by Lineal Descent.

Grief and Tears were His last Tribute, and we paid it solemnly: Our Joys, Sir, are yours, and we beg leave to Celebrate them as your Feet; but believing we can offer them best in our Duties, we come to promise you our selves.

Haslemere, February 28. This Day the Freeholders of this Borough, met and Subscribed the following Declaration,

WE whose Names are Subscribed, being Freeholders and Inhabitants of the Ancient Borough of Haslemere in the County of Surrey, do Declare that we will not Elect, nor give any of our Voices for the Electing of any Person or Persons whatsoever, to be a Burgess or Burgesses for this Borough in the next ensuing Parliament, who were Members of Parliament, for this or any other Borough, City or County in England or Wales, in the Two last Parliaments held at Westminster, or in that held at Oxford, or in any of them, and did give his or their Vote or Votes for the Excluding our present Sovereign Lord the King, (then Duke of York) from Succeeding His Brother our late Dread Sovereign, King Charles the Second, in the Imperial Crown of this Kingdom: Nor for any Person or Persons who was, or were a Member or Members

any of those Parliaments, and cannot prove, and make it appear to us, That he did openly and avowedly oppose and give his Vote against the passing of the said Bill.

And this we do Declare in pursuance and towards the performance of that solemn Promise contained in our Address to our late most Gracious King Charles the Second, That we would take all possible care, whenever there should be occasion for calling of another Parliament, to send such Members from this Borough as we should have good assurance were Cordially and Zealously affected to His said Majesty's Person, and Family, and to the Government Ecclesiastical and Civil, as by Law Established. In Testimony whereof we have hereunto Subscribed our Names the Eighth and Twentieth Day of February in the First Year of the Reign of our most Gracious Sovereign Lord James the Second by the Grace of God, of England, Scotland, France, and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith, &c. Anno; Domini, 1684.

Vienna, February 22. The 16 instant the Count d'Otting who commands the two Regiments of *Suabia*, arrived here from *Hungary*, and having given the Emperor an account of the condition those Troops are in, is gone to assist at the Assembly of the States of *Suabia* which are to meet at *Vlm*, and to hasten the Recruits that are raising for the said Regiments. The Regiment of Horse which the Duke of *Hanover* has given the Emperor commanded by his Son the Prince *Augustus* is arrived in *Bohemia*, where it is to quarter. The Archbishop of *Salzburg* has offered 100000 Crowns in lieu of his quota of men, which the Emperor has accepted of; and we are told that several other Princes of the Empire will likewise assist his Imperial Majesty in Money.

Vienna, February 25. This day Dyed here Father *Emmericke* Bishop of this City; It's believed he will be succeeded by the Bishop of *Gurck*. The Count de *Zabor* has burnt the Suburbs of *Newbushel* and hath taken several Prisoners; But in return the Turks of that place have made an Excursion and burnt the Town of *Guisz*, putting all the Inhabitants thereof to the Sword.

Hague, March 8. The Heer *Van Duynewoorden* and the Heer *Dyckvelt* will part from hence on their Extraordinary Embassy for *England* so soon as their Equipage can be got ready, which is preparing with great diligence. Prince *Casimir* of *Nassaw* Stadtholder of *Friezland* and *Groningen* hath sent a Gentleman hither to make his Compliments of Condoleance and Congratulation to the Prince and Princess of *Orange*. The Prince is expected back from *Dieren* about the middle of the next week.

Brussels, March 6. The Letters from *Madrid* of the 15th Instant tell us that the Prince de *Chinay* is made Viceroy of *Navarre*: And that the *New Spain* Fleet is expected at *Cadiz* about the end of this Month. They write from *Dufeldorp* that 1000 Foot began their March from thence the 3d Instant towards the Emperors Hereditary Countries to recruit the Regiments belonging to the Duke of *Newburgh*, that are at present in His Imperial Majesty's Service. We are told from *Cologne* that the Levy of 600 Men with which that City is to assist the Emperor being compleated, they would in few Days begin their March; and that the 6000 Men which the Elector of *Cologne* sends to His Imperial Majesty's Assistance would likewise March about the middle of this Month for *Hungary*.

Paris, March 10. The 5th Instant my Lord *Churehill* Envoy Extraordinary from his Majesty of *Great Britain*, to Notify the Death of the late King of ever Blessed Memory, and His Majesty's Succession to the Crown, had Audiences of the most Christian King at *Versailles*, and afterwards of the

Dauphin and Dauphiness, of the Duke of *Burgundy*, the Duke d'*Anjou*, and of the Duke and Dutches of *Orleans*, being Conducted by the Sieur de *Bonneuil* Introducator of Ambassadors, with the usual Ceremonies. And the 3th his Lordship had his Audiences of Leave in the same manner. And this Morning his Lordship parted from hence in his return for *England*. The Fourth instant arrived here an Express from *Genova* with the Ratification of the Articles Signed at *Versailles* the 12th Instant concerning the Submission that Republic is to make to his most Christian Majesty. We have an account that a Squadron of Men of War is fitting out at *Brest* and *Rocheport*, which we are told will be commanded by the Marschal d'*Essee*.

Westminster-Hall, February 13. Whereas divers Carriers, Higlens, Drivers of Pack-Horses and Stage-Coaches have collected and conveyed great quantities of Letters contrary to the Statute in that Case made and provided, This Day *Gilbert Staunton* Carrier and Coachman of *Kittering* in *Northamptonshire*, was Tried before the Right Honourable the Lord Chief Justice *Jeffreys* for the said Offence, and was thereupon found Guilty, and Damages assessed to 380 Pounds.

Whitehall, March 2. Yesterday Count *Serslaes de Tily*, Envoy from the Marquis de *Grana*, Governor of the Spanish Netherlands, had Audience of the Queen Dowager, and this Day of their Royal Highnesses, being conducted thereunto by Sir *Charles Cotterel* Master of the Ceremonies.

Whitehall, March 4. His Majesty was Graciously pleased this Day to begin to Touch for the Kings-Evil, and will continue to do so till *Easter*.
