## A PROCLAMATION

Declaring His Majesties Pleasure touching His Royal Coronation, and the Solemnity thereof.

JAMES R.

**W** Hereas We have Resolved by the Favour and Blessing of God, to Celebrate the Solemnity of Our Royal Coronation, and also the Coronation of Our Dearly Beloved Consort the Queen, upon the Twenty third day of April, being St. George's day next, at Our Palace of Westminster; And forasmuch as by Ancient Customs and Usages of this Realm, as also in regard of divers Tenures of sundry Manors, Lands, and other Hereditaments, many of Our Loving Subjects do Claim, and are bound to do and perform divers several Services on the said Day, and at the time of the Coronation, as in times Precedent their Ancestors, and those from whom they Claim have Done and Performed at the Coronations of Our Famous Progenitors and Predecessors, Kings and Queens of this Realm: We therefore out of Our Princely Care, for the Preservation of the Lawful Rights and Inheritances of Our Loving Subjects whom it may Concern, have thought fit to give Notice and Publish Our Resolution therein; And do hereby give Notice of, and Publish the same accordingly: And We do hereby further Signifie, That by Our Commission under Our Great Seal of England, We have Appointed and Authorized Our Right Trusty and Welbeloved Councillor Francis Lord Guilford Lord Keeper of Our Great Seal of England, Our Right Trusty and Right Welbeloved Cousin, and Councillor, Laurence Earl of Rochester Lord High Treasurer of England, Our Right Trusty and Entirely Beloved Cousin and Councillor George Marquis of Halifax, Lord President of Our Privy Council, our Right Trusty and Right Welbeloved Cousin and, Councillor Henry Earl of Clarendon Lord Privy Seal, Our Right Trusty and Right Entirely Beloved Cousin Henry Duke of Norfolk, Earl-Marshal of England, Our Right Trusty and Right Entirely Beloved Cousins and Councillors, James Duke of Ormond Lord Steward of Our Household, and Henry Duke of Beaufort Lord President of Wales, Our Right Trusty and Right Welbeloved Cousins and Councillors Robert Earl of Lindsey Lord Great Chamberlain of England, Henry Earl of Arlington Lord Chamberlain of Our Household, Aubrey Earl of Oxford, Theophilus Earl of Huntington, John Earl of Bridgewater, Henry Earl of Peterborow, Philip Earl of Chesterfield, Robert Earl of Sunderland One of Our Principal Secretaries of State, and Robert Earl of Alesbury, Our Right Trusty and Right Welbeloved Cousin John Earl of Radnor, Our Right Trusty and Welbeloved Councillors, George Lord Dartmouth Master General of Our Ordnance, Sidney Lord Godolphin Lord Chamberlain to Our Royal Consort the Queen, and Sir George Jeffreys Knight and Baronet Chief Justice of Our Court of Kings Bench, and Our Trusty and Welbeloved Sir Thomas Jones Knight Chief Justice of Our Court of Common Pleas, or any Three or more of them to Receive, Hear and Determine the Petitions and Claims which shall be to them Exhibited; by any of Our Loving Subjects in this behalf: And we shall Ap-

point Our said Commissioners for that purpose to Sit in the Painted Chamber of Our Palace at Westminster, upon the Twenty fourth day of this instant March; at Nine of the Clock in the Forenoon of that day, and from time to time so Adjourn, as to them shall seem meet for the Execution of Our said Commission, which We do thus Publish, to the intent that all such Persons whom it may any ways concern, may know when and where to give their Attendance for the Exhibiting of their Petitions and Claims concerning their Services before-mentioned, to be Done and Performed unto Us at Our said Coronation; And We do hereby signifie unto all and every Our Subjects whom it may concern, That Our Will and Pleasure is, and We do hereby Straitly Charge all Persons of what Rank or Quality soever they be, who either upon Our Letters to them Directed, or by Reason of their Offices, or Tenures, or otherwise are to do any Service at the said day or time of Our Coronation, That they do duly give their Attendance accordingly in all Respects, Furnished and Appointed as to so great a Solemnity appertaineth, and Answerable to the Dignities and Place, which every one of them respectively holdeth and Enjoyeth; And of this they or any of them are not to fail, as they will Answer the contrary at their Perils, unless upon special Reasons by Our Self under Our Hand to be Allowed We shall dispence with any of their Services or Attendances.

Given at Our Court at Whitehall the Sixth day of March, 1684 in the First Year of Our Reign.

**Brecon.** From the Mayor, Alderman, Burgesses, and other Inhabitants of the Corporation of *Chipping Sodbury in Gloucestershire*, which His Majesty received very Graciously.

**Guernsey St. Peters Port February 27.** Mr. Charles Hatton our Deputy Governor having on the 15 Instant received an account of the Death of our late Gracious Sovereign King Charles the Second, he gave the necessary Orders for proclaiming His Majesty King James the Second, which was performed the next Day about Noon with all the Solemnity this place is capable of, and the Remainder of the Day was spent in Solemn Prayers for His Majesty and in swearing fidelity to him, by all his Officers and Subjects in this Island, and with all the expressions of Joy they could possibly demonstrate. The next Day our Deputy Governor set Sail for *Serke*, and having caused His Majesty to be Proclaimed there and the Oath of Allegiance to be Administered to the Inhabitants he went from thence to *Alderney*; Where His Majesty was Proclaimed the 19th by the Deputy Governor of that Island, and Allegiance sworn to His Majesty, by the Inhabitants, who, as well as those of *Serke*, were not wanting to express their Joy and Loyalty on this occasion.

We have an account from *Fervey* that the Lord *Fermin* Governor of that Island proclaimed His Majesty there on the 18th Instant, which was done with all imaginable Demonstrations of Joy and Duty.

**Vienna, March 1.** On Monday last arrived here an Officer from *Hungary*, being sent by the Count *de Zober* to give the Emperor an account, That having notice the Turks were marching to put a further supply of Provisions into *Newbeusel*, he had drawn his Troops together, and having joyned with those commanded by Colonel *Heusler*, they had met and defeated the Enemy, having killed above 100 of them upon the place, and taken 60 Wagons laden with Provisions, and several Prisoners. And from Upper *Hungary* we have advice that 400 Horse of the Regiment of *Carassa*, and some of the *Bavarian* Troops, had defeated a Party of 500 Rebels: And that General *Schultz* had had a rencounter with 2000 Turks and Hungarians near the River *Teissa*, and had put them to flight.

**Cologne, March 6.** The Elector of *Cologne*, we are told gives the Emperor a Regiment of Cuirassiers of 800 Horse, besides the 6000 Men which his Electoral Highness will maintain at his own charge, and 500 Men for recruits, for which he is to receive 14 Crowns a Man. The Bishop of *Paderborne* gives 250 Men for recruits at his own charge. The Duke of *Fuliers* sends to the Emperors Assistance 1000 Men in four Companies. The Elector of *Trier* assists the Emperor with 500 Men, and the Elector of *Mentis* with 1000 at their own expence. The 600 Men raised by this City are ready to March.

**Hamburgh, March 9.** The Letters from *Copenhagen* give an account of the Death of the Queen Mother of *Denmark*, who Dyed the 2d Instant. They were from *Warsaw* of the 23 of the last Month, that the Nobility of *Lithuania* had very much insisted to have the Dyest removed: a *Grodno*; but that they had at last been prevailed with to consent to its being held in its time at *Warsaw*, upon condition that the two next Dyces shall meet at *Grodno*. And that the Baron *Zierowski* Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor was arrived at *Warsaw*; who has orders as yet the Dyest is ended to go from thence to *Moscow*.

**Brusse's, March 13.** Most of the Officers that have been reformed in these Provinces are going to serve in *Hungary*, being recommended to the Emperor by the Marquis *de Grana* our Governor. The Troops

which the Elector of *Cologne* sends to the Emperors Assistance will not March till the beginning of the next Month. They write from *Vienna* that the Turks of *Buda* and *Agria* had prepared another Convoy for *Newbeusel*, which was advanced as far as *Novigrad*, but that Colonel *Heusler* having notice of it, had put himself into a posture to prevent their design.

**Westminster-Hall, February 13.** Whereas divers Carriers, Higlars, Drivers of Pack-Horses and Stage-Coaches have collected and conveyed great quantities of Letters contrary to the Statute in that Case made and provided, This Day *Gilbert Staunton* Carrier and Coachman of *Kittering in Northamptonshire*, was Tried before the Right Honourable the Lord Chief Justice *Jeffreys* for the said Offences, and was thereupon found Guilty, and Damages assessed to 380 Pounds.

**Whitehall, March 6.** His Majesty being well satisfied with the Art and Industry of the Sicar *Antonio Ferris*, in Painting and Adorning the Chapel-Hall and Rooms in His Majesties Castle of *WindSOR*, has been pleased to appoint him to be His Chief and first Painter in the place of Sir *Peter Lely* Deceased.
