Mr. Charles Hatton our Deputy Governor having on the 15 Liffant received an account of the Death of our late Gracious Soveraign King Charles the Second, he gave the neceffary Orders for proclaiming His MajeftyKing Fames the Second, which was performed the next Day about Noon with all the Solemnity this place is capable of, and the Remainder of the Day was spent in Solemn Prayers for His Majesty and in swearing fidelity to him, by all his Officers and Subjects in this Ifland, and with all the expressions of Joy they could poffibly demonstrate. The next Day our Deputy Governor fet Sail for Serke, and having caused His Majefly to be Proclaimed there and the Oath of Allegiance to be Administred to the Inhabitants he went f om thence to Alderney; Where His Majelly was Proclaimed the 19th by the Deputy Governor of that Illand, and Allegiance fworn to His Majefly, by the Inhabitants, who, as well as those of Serke, were not wanting to express their Joy and Loyalty on this occasion.

We have an account from Ferfey that the Lord Fermin Governor of that Ifland proclaimed His Majefty there on the 18th Inflant, which was done with all ima--ginable Demonstrations of Joy and Duty.

Vienna, March 1. On Monday last arrived here an Officer from Hangary, being ient by the Count de Zober to give the Emperor an account, That having notice the Turks were murching to put a further supply of Provisions into Newbeusel, he had drawn his I roops together, and having joyned with those commanded by Colonel Heusler, they had met and defeated the Enemy, having killed above 100 of themupon the place, and taken 60 Wagons laden with Provisions, and feveral Prisoners And from Upper Hungary we have advice that foo Horle eftle Regiment of Caraffa, and some of the Bavarian froups, has defeated a Party of 500 Rebels : And that General Schultz had had a rencounter with 2000 Turks and Hungarians near the River Teiffa, and had put them to flight.

Cologne, March 6. The Elector of Cologne, we are told gives the Emperor a Regiment of Cuiraffi rs of 800 Hurle befides the 6000 Men which his Electoral Highpels will maintain at his own charge, and 500 Men for recruits, for which he is to re-The Bifhop of Paderborne c ive 14 Crowns a Man. gives 250 Men for recruits at his own charge. The Duke of Juliers fends to the Emperors Affiftance 1000 Men in four Companies. The Elector of Trier affils the Emperor with 500 Men, and the Elector of Ments with 1000 at their own expence. The 600 Men railed by this City are ready to March.

Hamburgh, March 9. The Letters from Coperbagen give an account of the Death of the Queen Mo ther of Denmark, who Dyed the 2d Inflant. They wri.c from Warfaw of the 23 of the last Month, that the Nobility of Lithuania had very much infilted to have the Dyst nemoved : a Grodno; but that they had at lafe been prevailed with to confert to its being held e is time as Warlaw, upon cordition that the two next Dyces fhall met at Grodno.
