Madrid, Febr. 25. The 18. instant his Catholick Majesty went to *Balsain*, a Lodge about 11 Leagues from hence, where he diverted himself with Hunting till the 20. when he returned thither. The King has named the Prince de Chimay, hitherto Governour of *Luxemburg* to be Viceroi of *Navarre* in the place of the Marquis de *Villo*, who has desired leave to resign that Government. Orders have been sent to *Cadix* and other Ports of this Kingdom, to hasten the Equipage of the Men of War that are fitting out there, which it is said are to joyn the *Venetian* fleet the next Campaign against the *Turks*. They write from *Cadix* of the 11 instant, that the *Greyhound*, returned thither from Cruising the day before, and would sail again the day following with Captain *Priestman* for the Coast of *Barbary*. And that the *Mermaid* then at Anchor in that Bay would sail the next Morning for *England*.

Paris March 17. We have an account from *Brest*, that the Chevalier de *Chaumont*, Ambassador from his most Christian Majesty to the King of *Siam*, Embarked there the 11th instant on a French Man of War of 46 Guns, being accompanied with the Abbat of *Choisy*, who is to perform the Embassy in case of the Death of the Chevalier de *Chaumont*; They are attended by an other Frigate of 24 Guns, which carries their Baggage. An Envoy from the *Dray* of *Argiers* had the 11th instant Audience of the King at *Versailles*; and afterwards presented to his Majesty ten *Barbary* Horses. The Marquis de *Louvois*, Second Son, to Monsieur de *Louvois* Minister and Secretary of State, is gone for *Poland* to serve in the War against the *Turks*.

Deal, March 11. Yesterday in the Afternoon arrived in the Downs the *Loyal James* from *Fort Spang* George in the *East Indies*, having lost their Captain, Sir *John Werwang*, who Dyed after he had been about six Weeks in the Country. They say two Dutch *East-India* Ships came home in their Company, His Majesties Ship the *Mermaid* is arrived in the Downs from the *Straits*.
