The Following Addressees have been presented to His Majesty, who received them very Graciously. This from the County of Hertford was Presented by the High Sheriff accompanied with several of the Principal Gentlemen of that County, being introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Rochester, Lord High Treasurer of England.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the High Sheriff, Deputy-Lituitants, Justices of the Peace, Gentlemen of the Grand Jury, and other Loyal Gentlemen of your Majesties County of Hertford, met together at the Assizes for the said County held at Hertford, March 12. 1684.

Dread Sovereign,

When we reflect what Sinister Artifices and damnable Plots of late Years were contrived by Wicked Men, and what solemn Bonds of Oaths they have broken to supplant your Majesties undoubted Title to the Crown, and to seize on Your Inheritance by endeavouring to obtain the Specious Formality of a Law against You: We cannot but think our selves under indispensable obligations of thankfulness, to Almighty God, for confounding all their Devices, and preserving us, by so many wonderful Deliverances, to Gracious a King to Reign over us

As we must acknowledge we have many reasons as ever Subjects had, to honor the memory of Your Glorious Brother, our late Blessed King, in there is none greater than that He recommended to us your Majesty as the best of Brothers, and unmovably defended your unquestionable Right of Succession against the implacable Malice of all Yours and your Kingdoms Enemies.

The whole World knows Your Majesty to be a Prince of invincible Courage, Coalsancy to Your Friends, and Firmness to Your Word.

And therefore though Your Enemies having nothing else to object, were wont to traduce your Virtue as a Vice, and to Libel your Fortitude and Resolution with the malicious reproach of Obliquity; Yet it is this inviolable Fidelity to your Royal Word, especially given us in your Majesties most indulgent Declaration on which we rely with an entire Confidence.

Since your Majesty has been pleased so generously to declare You will take our Lives, Liberties and Religion into Your immediate Protection, we can henceforth have no other just fears but what arise from our infinite value of your Majesties Person, the loss of which is the only insupportable Misery that can now befall us in this World.

Wherefore with one Voice and Heart we pray for your Majesties long and prosperous Reign, faithfully engaging to serve and defend your Majesty with the utmost of our Lives and Fortunes; humbly beseeching your Majesty to believe that this Loyal County, which upon an eminent occasion gave signal proof of Fidelity and Affection to his Royal Highness James Duke of York, will not in Duty and Obedience be inferior to any of the Subjects of the Great and Good King JAMES the Second,

Venice, March 3. Great preparations are making for the next Campagne. This Week 1000 new raised Foot arrived at the Lido from several places; and in a Day or two they will be Mustered and afterward sent with the new raised Dragoons for Dalmatia. The Elector of Saxony has it's said offer'd to assist the Republick with 3000 Men. Signior Lorenzo Bettoni, Giosepe Persico, and Girolamo de Lino have been received into the Body of the Nobility, they paying each 100 Thousand Crowns. We have an account of the Death of the Arch-Duchess Isabella Clara of Austria, Mother of the Duke of Mantua.

Genova, March 4. Our Doge, and the Four Senators that are to accompany him, will part from hence the 22 of this Month for France: The Republick gives the Doge 30000 Crowns for the Expences of the Journey; and have Regulated his Train, which is to consist of 8 Gentlemen, 12 Pages, and 20 Footmen. Two of the New Gallies which are now in this Port are Disarming; and the like will be done with the other two, as soon as they return from Corsica where they are at present. The Count de Melgar Governour of Milan has sent orders to the Spanish Troops that are here to return to their Quarters.

Paris, March 24. The Princes de Conti, de la Roche sur Ton, de Turenne, and de Tingry with several others of the first Quality are going for Poland to pass the next Campagne in the Army of that Crown.

The Duke de Mortemar is upon his departure for *Messines*, to command a Squadron of 16 Gallies that are fitting out there. The Count de Roye will part from hence in 8 or 10 days to return to Denmark. The Marquis de Mairi Envoye from Genoux has hired the House of *Beauvais*, in the *Fauxbourg* of *St. Germain* for the Doge and the Four Senators of that Republick, who are expected here about the the middle of the next month. A great *Caroussel* is preparing to divert this Court at *Easter*.

Desa, March 14. The *Loyal Fama* which arrived the 10th instant from the *East Indies*. ver. What was said of two ships coming home in her Compa-

ny, upon further esquity, proves to be a mistake the coming along.

Heddon, March 11. This Day the Corporation of *Heddon* received His Majesties most Gracious Charter; which was met 3 Miles from this Town, by the Mayor, Aldermen, Bayliffs, and about 80 Horsemen; when they came within the Limits of the Corporation, they were met by the whole Town, and so went in their Formalities and in a very regular procession to the Town Hall; where the Charter was Read, and the Mayor, Aldermen, and all other Officers Sworn, which being done, the remainder of the Day was spent in Feasting, publick acclamations, and all possible demonstrations of Joy and thankfulness to His Majesty, for His several Acts of Grace and Bounty bestowed upon them in their Charter.

There hath been lately taken, and now in the Custody of the Keeper of Newgate, these Persons following, all Suspected to have committed several Robberies on the Highway, particularly about *Fyburn* and *Tottenham* Court Road, and about the middle of February last near *Ilford* in *Essex*, viz. Peter Roach, a luty tall Man with black Hair, fresh coloured, brown Clothes faced with brown Shag, and about 22 years of Age; Edward Gardner a middle sized man with a light short Perriwig, a fair Complexion, a brown upper Coat and a Close bodied Coat of Cinamon colour with Gold Buttons, and a blue Flowered Silk Waistcoat, about 24 years of age; David Ansonleck a tall strong well-set man with a fresh Colour and black lank Hair, about 29 years of age, with a brown Coat faced with Shag, and Gold Buttons; Gabriel Sheers of a large stature, fair Complexion, full suddy faced, with short brown curled Hair, about 25 years of age, he had a great gray Coat over his other Clothes. John Colward wounded in the shoulder with a Fowling Piece, a middle sized man, fresh coloured, about 25 years of age, with a light short Perriwig, and two sad Coloured Coats bloody. These things were taken in their custody, a mixt coloured Worsted Camblet Coat, Lined with a Lyeer coloured Lining, the Cape and sleeves faced with Hair Shag, and Hair Buttons; a Red Coat, two Silver hilted Swords, one with a single Shell Cuttore Hilt cut in the Shell with a silver Gilt Wire Handle, and a plain Cuttore Blade. The other a small Rapier with a plain Silver Hilt and half round Bow, with Silver gilt Pugl Handle, marked in several places in the Hilt with S. P. and a plain Three square Blade, several Gold Rings with these Poesies (viz.) One, Let Love abide, another, Content supplies all Want; Another Hair Ring, Regard is my Reward. Another Hair Ring with no Poesie. A small Ring with a Firestone. Another, Respect is due only to you. Several pair of silver Buttons, some with Hair the rest plain. There is also taken by directions of some erone of the Persons above-mentioned, an old brown Gelding with a fore Back, some White on his face, very poor, 14 hands and half high, with a Leather Saddle, a Bitt, and a Bridle.

What Person or Persons, soever, that hath been Robbed of any of these things, may come to Capt. Richardson (Keeper of Newgate) and see the Persons, and things, and have the things again Prosecuting the Offenders.
