in such manner as they lawfully may under the Acts hereinafter mentioned or referred to, or some Law of Navigation now in force:

OTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the next session, for a Bill to alter, amend, and enlarge the powers and provisions of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for paving, gravelling, lighting, cleansing, draining, and improving the hamlet of Kentish-town and its vicinity, in the parish of St. Pancras, in the county of Middlesex," or to repeal the said Act, or some part or parts thereof, and to grant further and other powers in lieu thereof, for better paving, gravelling, lighting, cleansing, draining, and improving the said hamlet of Kentish-town, and such parts of its vicinity as are described or comprised within the external limits or bounds of a plan deposited with the Clerk of the Peace of the county of Middlesex, pursuant to the directions of the said Act, and whether included within the limits of the said Act or not; and also all the land and property situate on the north of the present limits of the aforesaid Act, and which is bounded by land in the occupation of Richard Barnett Esquire and Millfieldlane on the south, by Millfield-lane aforesaid on the west, by a road leading from Millfield-lane into the Kentish Town and Highgate road near Hollyterrace on the north-west, by Holly-terrace and by land in the occupation of William Cutbush on the north, and by the foot-road leading from Swaineslane to that part of Highgate which lies on the south-west side of Highgate Church on the east, and for extending to the said Bill the provisions of an Act, passed in the fifty-seventh year of the reign of King George the Third, intituled "An Act for better paving, improving, and regulating the streets of the Metropolis, and removing and preventing nuisances and obstructions therein.
