This is to give notice, that the Poor Law Commissioners did, on the 23d day of December instant, in pursuance of the powers given to them by an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, and with the consent of the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and with the approval of the Right Honourable Sir James Graham, Bart. one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, appoint Sir Francis Hastings Doyle, Bart. of the Inner-temple, Barrister at Law, to be an Assistant Commissioner, for the period of thirty days from the 2d day of January next, for the purpose of inquiring, specially, into the employment of women and children in agriculture.
