Her Majesty's royal licence and authority, that he and his issue may henceforth take and use the surname of Wynne only, and no other surname whatsoever, and that he and they may quarter the arms of Wynne quarterly, in the first quarter, with his and their own family arms, in compliance with a proviso contained in the last will and testament of his late kinsman, Robert-William Wynne, of Garthewin aforesaid, Esq. deceased, and in testimony of grateful and affectionate respect for his memory; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Heralds' Office, otherwise the said licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And also to command, that the said royal concession and declaration be registered in Her Majesty's College of Arms.

The Lord Chancellor has appointed Charles Butlin, of Snenton Hermitage, in the county of Nottingham, Gent. to be a Master Extraordinary in the High Court of Chancery.

W HEREAS by an Act of Parliament, made and passed in the ninth and tenth years of the reign of His Majesty King William the Third, intituled "An Act for the increase and preservation of timber in New Forest, in the county of Southampton," it was required, that one thousand acres, part of the waste lands of the said forest, should be enclosed and kept in severalty, for the growth and preservation of timber for the supply of IIis Majesty's Royal Navy, forthwith after the passing of the said Act; and that in the year following one thousand acres more, part of the said waste lands, should be in like manner enclosed; and that two hundred acres more, part also of the said waste lands, should ycarly, and in every year, for the term or space of twenty years from and after the time that the several inclosures of the two thousand acres above mentioned should be made and completed, be in like manner enclosed, and kept in severalty as aforesaid, in the actual possession of the Crown; freed and discharged of and from all manner of rights, title, and pretence whatever, and should be called, made, and kept as a nursery for wood and timber only :

And whereas it was also directed by the said Act, that whenever the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lord High Treasurer of England, or Chancellor of the Exchequer, for the time being, should be satisfied and should determine that the woods and trees which should be growing on any of the inclosures made under and by virtue of the said Act, or any part thereof, are become past danger of browsing of deer, cattle, or other prejudice, and shall think fit to lay the same, or any part thereof, open and in common, then and so often it may be lawful for His Majesty, his heirs and successors, from time to time, to inclose, in lieu of so much of the said inclosures as shall be so laid open, the like quantity of the waste of the said forest, to be holden freed and dis-charged of and from all manner of common or other rights for so long time as the same shall remain and continue to be inclosed; and whereas by another Act, of the forty-eighth George the Third, cap. 72, the powers of the before-mentioned Act were revived and confirmed, and inclosures and plantations were made to the full extent of six thousand acres, authorized by the Acts :

And whereas the quantity of three hundred and ninety four acres, three roods, and thirty-six perches, part of the waste lands of the said forest, was inclosed, pursuant to the provisions of the said last-mentioned Act, and it has been certified to the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, on the authority of Lieutenant-Colonel Thornhill, Deputy Surveyor of New Forest, Thomas White, D. Whitbourne, John Brown, and Frederick Fuller, Regarders of the Forest, that the woods and trees growing on the said three hundred and ninety-four acres, three roods, and thirty-six perches, are become past danger of browsing of cattle, deer, or other prejudice, viz.

We, being three of the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, think fit to lay the same open and in common, and do hereby declare and make known, that the inclosures above mentioned are laid open and in common accordingly, to the intent that an equal quantity of other waste lands of the same forest may be inclosed in lieu thereof, and kept in severalty for the growth and preservation of timber, agreeably to the directions of the said Acts.
