under the provision of any Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws, for augmenting small livings, any thing in such Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws, to the contrary notwithstand-

And whereas by another Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and by another Act, made and passed in the first and second years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled 'An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and also by another Act, made and passed in the second and third years of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to render more effectual an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect:

And whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to Her Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-second day of October one thousand eight hundred and forty-two, in

the words following, viz.
"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, appointed by virtue of an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" continued by an Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and further continued by an Act, passed in the first year of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prolong, for ten years, Her Majesty's Commis-· sion for building new churches;" beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, when the last census was taken, the parish of Huddersfield, in the county of York and diocese of Ripon, contained a population of thirty-eight thousand three hundred and ninety-seven persons:

" That, besides the parish church, which affords accommodation to one thousand eight hundred persons, there are nine consecrated churches or chapels in the said parish, in which divine service is regularly performed, viz. St. Paul's Church, Trinity Church, Christ Church, Woodhouse; Saint James's, Slaithwaite; Dean Head Church, in Scammonden; St. Mark's, Longwood; All Saints, Paddock; St. Stephen, Lindley; and St. John, Golcar; that St. Mark's, Longwood, will accommodate three hundred and fifty persons, including fifty free seats appropriated to the use of the

poor; All Saints, Paddock, will accommodate eight hundred and sixty-seven persons, including four hundred and fifty-nine free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; St. Stephen's, Lindley, will accommodate eight hundred and sixty-seven persons, including four hundred and fifty-nine free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; and St. John's, Golcar, will accommodate nine hundred and fifty persons, including four hundred and thirty free seats appropriated to the use of

Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending this parish, it appears to them to be expedient, that particular districts should be assigned to the said four last-mentioned chapels. under the provisions of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and that such districts should be named, respectively, "The Chapelry District of Long-wood," "The Chapelry District of Paddock,"
"The Chapelry District of Lindley," and "The Chapelry District of Golcar," with boundaries as follow:

" The chapelry district of Longwood is bounded on the north by the township of Lindley, in the parish of Huddersfield, and the township of Fixby, in the parish of Halifax; on the south by the township of Golcar, in the parish of Huddersfield, and the parish of Almondbury; on the east by the township of Paddock, in Huddersfield; and on the west by the township of Stainland and Old Lindley, in the said parish of Halifax:

The chapelry district of Paddock is bounded on the north by a lane connecting Luck-lane with a stream running in front of Gledholt, by the stream itself, and by Greenhead-lane, as far as the north west corner of the vicarage grounds; on the south by the parish of Almondbury; on the east by the vicarage garden wall, and that part of the estate of Sir John Ramsden which adjoins the property of the late Captain Fenton, and is drawn in a direct line to the river and the parish of Aldmondbury; and on the west by the townships of Lindley and Longwood, both in the said parish of Huddersfield:

The chapelry district of Lindley is bounded on the north by the township of Fixby, in the parish of Halifax; on the south and west by the township of Longwood, in the parish of Huddersfield; and on the east by the township of Hudders-

field, including Paddock and Fartown:

"The chapelry district of Golcar is bounded on the north and north west by the township of Longwood, on the south west by the township of Slaithwaite, both in the said parish of Haddersfield; and on the east by the parish of Almondbury:

" That baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized and performed in each of the said
