**W**E the most Dutiful Subscribers of this Paper, burn of a Sense of what we owe to God and to Your Sacred Majesty, for the Blessings we enjoy under Your Royal Protection and Government, after the deplorable Loss of our late Dread Sovereign of your happy Memory; Do most Humbly lay our selves at Your Majesties Feet, and declare with one Voice and Heart, That we will Live and Dye in the Service and Defence of Your Majesties Person, Crown and Dignity, and in the Maintenance of the Hereditary and Unalterable Right of Succession, by a Lineal Descent to this Imperial Monarchy, Inherens in Your Royal Family.

And we the Loyal Subscribers of this Humble Address do likewise Unanimously Joyn in a Firm and Unchangeable Vow and Resolution of Embroying all Occasions of becoming Serviceable to Your Majesty, in what Station soever it shall please Almighty God to place us; And through all Hazards and Extremities, without any Exception or Reserve, unto our Lives end.

There have been likewise Presented to His Majesty very Loyal Addresses, From the Gentlemen and Clergy, and others of the Town and Port of Portlock in the County of Somerset, together with the Parishes of Luckham and Seshworthy, and other Adjacent Places bordering upon Severn. From the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgeses of the Corporation of Great Grimby in the County of Lincoln. From the Borough of Wreham in Dorsetshire. From the Inhabitants of the Parish of Halifax in the County of York; Which His Majesty received very Graciously.

Lisbonne, Feb. 26. Yesterday arrived here the James Galley Captain Shouel Commanter, from Cruising on the Coast of Sally; He Chased some days ago a Man of War of 28 Guns into that Port, and forced a Sally Merchant man ashore. He had notice that there are hidden out at Sally 4 men of War, one of 40 Guns, another of 30, and the other two of 24 Guns; he intends to Carcne and then go out again. The last Week several Portuguese Ships Sailed from hence for Brazil; The Successors for the East Indies are preparing with all expedition, and will it is believed be ready to depart in March next.

Vienna, March 18. The account we had of the late success of Colonel Heussler against the Turks in disappointing their Design to relieve New-

beusei is confirmed; but because the Troops he has with him are much inferior in Number to those the Enemy have drawn together, and that they will doubtless make fresh attempts to succor a place of so great importance, Orders have been sent to several Troops to joyn Colonel Heussler with all the haste they can; and we hear they are already on their March for that purpose. The Envoy from the Prince of Transilvania has not yet had Audience; It is said he comes, to make Proposals of Peace; but the Emperor will not receive any but what are made to him and his Allies together. There is a report that Count Teckley is in disgrace with the Grand Signior; and that the Visier of Buda hath caused the Bassa of Novi-grad to be Strangled, for having held a private Correspondence with Teckley.

Cologne, March 20. The Deputies these Magistrates sent to Dusseldorp to pray the Duke of Julier's Mediation for the Composing Matters with their Elector, ( who is much displeas'd at their conduct in several late occasions, and has demand'd satisfaction of them thereupon ) are come back with an Answer that does not at all please them. The Duke of Julier's having told the said Deputies, that this City hath shew'd very little respect for the Emperor's Commission, and the Orders of their Elector; And that they will do well to submit themselves to the first; And to give His Electoral Highness entire satisfaction upon his complaints against them, and that without delay. Our Magistrates have sent Deputies to the Elector of Trier to desire his good Offices.

Hague, March 30. The States of Holland and West-Friesland, are Adjourn'd till Wednesday next, without coming to a resolution concerning the reduction of the Troops, which is so much press'd by the City of Amsterdam. The Heer Van Duyvenvoorden, and the Heer Dyckvelt Ambassadors Extraordinary from this State, parted from hence this Day for England; whither they will be suddenly followed by the Commissioners for the Affair of Bantam. This Day Mr. Chudleigh Envoy Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great Britain, had his Audience of leave of the States-General.

Brussels, March 30. The Princes de Conti, de la Roche Sur Ton, and de Turanne, arriv'd this Week at Antwerp, from whence they parted again this Day for the Hague, intending to pass 10 or 12 Days in Holland, and then to continue their Journey for Poland. The Duke d'Arschot and the Marquis de Bedmar General of the Artillery will part from hence in two or three Days for Spain. The last Letters from Vienna told us that the Venetian Ambassador had desired the Emperor to permit the Troops which the Princes of Lunenburg are sending to the assistance of the Republick to pass through the Country of Tyrol, which was very readily granted, and Orders given to provide for them all things necessary in their March at reasonable rates. That Colonel Heussler had Defeated near Vaccia a great Convoy designed for Newbeusei, Commanded by the Bassa of Agnia, and taken 80 Wagons which he caused to be burnt. And that General Rabata is made Commissary General of the Emperors Army.

Paris, March 31. The Doge and the Four Senators of Genoua are in their journey; and are expected here about the middle of the next Month. The 28 instant the Count Bagliani Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of Mantua had Audience of the King to acquaint him with the Death of the Dutchess Dowager of Mantua. The Marquis de Torcy is returned from Portugal, whither he was sent by the King in quality of his Envoy Extraordinary

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
