He 12 inftant arrived here the Nancy of London, with four or five more thips to lade Pilchards. Yeferday came in a Fleet of 30 French Merchants fhips, with two Men of War, one of 6, the other of 20 Gins, from Haure de Grace, all of them belonging to the Grand Party, and defigned to lade falt. same day arrived here the Mary of Rochel, laden with Wine and Sait, bound for Waterford in Ireland.

Lyme, Off. 19. Yesterasy arrived here two vessels of this place, one from Amflerdam, the other from S. Maloes, which laft tells us, that they are there making preparations against the nex: Spring for purluing their defign upon the Netherlands, encouraging all frangers that will lift themselves for that Service, but are full of complaints for the loss of leveral thips taken by the Oftenders, which much discourages their Trade, and makes them afraid to adventure from Port to Port.

Newcasile, Off. 19. A Fleet of 50 fail of laden Colliers are put to Sea out of this Harbor, and as many light ships come in the laft evening Tyde to lade.

One of the thips that went from bence, after fome few hours endeavoured to return again in o Port, but the Tyde not ferving her, was forced upon a place called the Hard, and there eaft away, with all her men.

Port mouth, Off. 20. Several fhips are by the violence of the weather forced to fhelter themfelves in this Port and Road, among tothers a fastl Barque with Piece Gods from Middleburgh, bound for Merlaix, was in her entring forced upon the Sands called the Horfe, and in much danger to have been left, towards the evening the got off agair, but was by Tempest in the night in great hazard of a Wreck, had the not been timely affifted by our Boats, and brought into Harbour without damage.

This morning arrived at Spithead the Mermaid from the Coasts of France, and is now putting into Habour to

Naples Oftob. 4. Orders are here iffued forth for the raifing of twenty Companies of Neopolitan Stuldiers in this Kingdom to be employed in the fervice of his Catholick Majefty, the care of which Leavies are committed to Serjeant Major Marco Antonio Magno : and on Friday next by Order of the General of the Franciscans the Sacrament is to be publickly expoled and publick prayers made for the prosperity and good fuccels of his Catholick Majefiv.

The Prince della Rocca Filomarino having been lately killed in a Duel, the Dukes of Mataloni, Popoli and St. Georgio, who were engaged therein having been committed to the Fort of Gaeta are fince removed to Caftel Nuovo where they are using their endeavors, and employing their Intereft for their Liberties.

A Post striving from Otranto brings Letters from Candia, informing us the the Turks proceed in the Siege with all the vigor imaginable, and have by the forluging of their Mines and frequent affigults wholly deftroyed the left horn of the Fort Panigra, and by another of their Mines blown up the Counterica p, which with the violence thereof, everth ew . confiderable part of the adjacent work, burying in the ruines thereof Seigni r Giuftiniano the Commiffary of the Armada, with many Souldiers; and that the Crand Vifer more intent then ever upon the taking of the City, had ordered materials to be brought to the Leagure for the building convenient Ladges for the Souldiers, intending to lie before the Town all this Winter, being unwilling to leave the Siege til he has either taken the Town, or loft his whole Agmy in the Attempt.

Rome, Oct. 8. On M inday laft his Holiness held a Confiftory, wherein feveral Bishopricks we e proposed by the re-Spective Cardinals their Protectors, which done, the Pope licentiated many of the Cardinals to repair to their respective Churches and Legations.

The Pep: on Saturday laft fent for the French Ambaffador to whom he in obliging Language acknowledged the favou-done him by his Most Christian Majesty, in that he was plea led to lend a Gentleman of his Court to vifit his Nephew du ring his late indisposition at Sufa; falling afterwards upon the discourse of his pretentions to the N therlands, expressing the great defire he had of being instrumental in the composure of the Diffe ences with Spain ; to whom the Ambeliador profeffed his Mafters inclinacions to Peace, which be had in fome measure demonstrated, by drawing off his A my in Planders two morths before the usual time, and that the Abbet de Teltier was by his Maje fly disparche with I fructions to his Holines, upon whose arrival his Maffers inclinations would be more evidently manifeffed.

Our late news from Candia gives us reason to suspect the condition of that place, the Turks having made themselves Masters of some part of the Out-works, of which the Venetian Ambassador Cavaliero Querini having given an account to the Pope, his Holinels immediately ordered 500 Foot to be embarqued from Dalmatia, to be forthwith fent to Candia,intending to supply them with as many more upon his own ex-pence, ordering moreover two ships with great flore of Bisker and Cheefe, and 1 2000 pleces of Eight to be fent away from Ancona, befides a large fun remitted to Venice upon the fame

Vienna, Odob. 9. His Imperial Maj: Ry having removed the Count de Weiffenwolfe to the Government of Tyrol, has bestowed his Vacant Charge of Landhauftman among the States of the Upper-Austria upon the Count de Starenburg, whose place of Marcshall of the Court, is conferred on the Count de bottingen, at prolent Ambiffador in the Court of Spain, but is remanded by the Emperor to take poffeffion of his new Employment.

The States of the Lower-Auffria being upon the Emperors Summons arrived here, have been acquainted with his Imperial Maj flies plea ure touching the proportions charged on them for the Militis, who have accordingly consented to raise the Sum desired of them, and tis believed their Example will Encourage the other Provinces to a Complyance for their proportionable affiltance.

A Courier from Sprin brings to the Ambaffador of his Catholique Maj fly the certain news of the happy arrival of their Well-India Fleet, affuring him of the speedy return of a large Sum for the Encouragement of the Levies for the N .therlands.

The Council of War has ordered the drawing a number of or 15 Companies to be fent into both Auftrid, for the reinforcing their respective Gerrifors : And have resolved to

have by the next Spring a Body of 14000 men in readines to rake the Fleld, which joyning with other Forces raised by the other parts of the Empire, will make up a confi erable Army.

From Comorra we are advised, that the Company of our Eastern Merchants are fill at Greek Wiffenberg, and have lately had a confiderable loss by the casting away of a Visiel laden with rich Mirchandise: that several persons of that Company are lately dead, and others sick, and that they defire to take in other persons to supply the room of the deceased, for the better carrying on of the Trade.

Yekerday the Sieut Gramprecht, newly arrived from the Court of Poland, had his Audience : the Count de Schafgorfeb being uddenly expected from the same place, by whom we may know somewhat of the Resolution of that King.

Genoua, Offob. 11. The 5 h in flant one of the Duke of Dona's Gillies missking the Port of Sauona in the night, unfortunately tan ashore neer Arbigola, and was lost. The same day intelligence was brought up, that two Ships belonging to this place, and bound for Lisbon. Was sifed by the French, under the pietinse of carrying Goods for Alicant, and men put aboard them to bring them off for Thoulon; and that one of them was by some accident put into Vada Road. Whereupon sour of our Gillies were immediately sent out to have retaken her, but were prevented by a B ignatine of Majorca, which having taken in men at Finale, assumed the Vesselin the night, and after two hours fight with the French, seiled and carried her off.

The action of the French has put a flop to the going out of a Ship of this place of 44 Guns, and 150 men, intended for Lisbon, but now flayes to go in company with other Merchants and two Men of Warre of 50 or 60 Guns apiec, which may

be really to put to fea by the end of this Month.

The Popes N phew the Abbot Roffigliofi was lately at Rively, where he fell again in some distemper of his Fevor.

From Milan we are told that the Governor had by his

Proclamation Banished all the French and Subjects of his most Christian. Majesty out of that State; commanding all other strangers living within the Spanish Jurisdiction, within 15 dayes to give 1, to such Officers as were appointed for that purpose, a Note of their perions and qualities. The Camp-Master General Count Trotti, was by the Givetnors Order gone to visit Nougra, Mortara, and other places upon the Frontiers of Piedmont and Montserat, and to take care that they be supplyed with all necessaries for their desence.

The Abbot Tellier is arrived at Milan, on his way for Rome, where he is by his most Christian Majety Ordered to treat with the Pope about the Reconciliation of the Differen-

ces between the two Crowns.

Antwerp, Oct. 24. The Field-Service being now ended, and the Souldiery on both fides withdrawn into their Winter-Quarters, care is taken for the mutual exchange of prisoners, and three Diumi for that purpose are sent from the Freich to Brussels, where are also arrived 300 of our men which were taken formerly at Oudenard, and are sent to refresh themselves ofter their imprisonment, in Bindsant. The Count Le Montreer Regiment of 1400 men, and three Companies of Don Antonio Fortado are to continue all the Winter at Brussells, the rest disposed of to other places. The 18th instant a party of our men sell upon the French Quarters near Aleren, giving a hot alarum to the Marshal de Turense himself, and returning with about 80 prisoners, having done is me execution on his Guards. The French horse have now left the field as well as the foot, and retired to their Winter-Ouarters.

Paris, Oct. 26. The Duke de Beaufort is suddenly expeted here, several Coaches being sent to attend him in his journey, to whom his Majisty has lately dispatche a Courier about some business of concernment, telating, as this believed, to the Fleet. Manifeur de Turenne is ordered by his Majisty to continue for a longer time in the Netherlands. From Lille we are told of a great quarrel between the Civizens and the Garrison, which had like to have occasioned a very dargerous disorder, had it not been timely appealed by the prudence of

be Officers.

On Sunday laft the Emperors Ambaffieder publickly telffied his joy for the bappy delivery of the Empressand the bith of the young Prince.

The King has ordered the Light horsemen and Min at Arms belonging to the Duke of Orleans, to take up this Quarters in sunergne, with some other Forces, where they are to be in readiness upon all occasions to be employed in Catalonia.

Cardinal Anthonio is gone from Lyons to his Archlifhoprick at Rheims, where he will continue from time. Hague, Off. 28. The Envoy from Mucovy having ben

The Ratification of the Articles with the Crewn of Swelland is now arrived, and the States are taking order for the payment of those monles thereby controlled for, towards the damage received by them in Guiny. A Trumpeter is newly arrived here from the Marquis de Castel Rodrigo, but his bu-

finefe not yet known.

The States seem much dissatisfied in the Demands made by Portugal, but its yet hoped that one will be taken on hot fides to prevent a Rupture. The King of Denmark has by Missive complained that the moneys charged upon the Prevences, are not paid in according to Agreement, desiring the States to take some speedy course for his satisfaction in that point.

The East-India S' ips are fasely arrived, though in several Ports, only the Walcheren lost, and the Arms of Amsterdam which straggled from the rest about Fero, not yet heard of, but its hoped may have put in in some Port of Norway.

Plymouth, Oct. 20. Several ships are put in here outward bound, as also a Privateer belonging to Offend, who with much hazard and danger of a wreck, came into this Harbor; two other ships are now at an Anchor in the Sound, but when

they are we yet know nor.

Hull, Oct. 21. The 19 his fisher arrived two V. fiels from Rosterdam. Yesterday came in two ships from London, leaving the rest of their company off the Humber, who all of them outrid the late storms with little or no damage. Three others are also come in from Newcastle, and as many Swedes lye ready laden to pass for Gottenburgh, waiting only the opportunity of a fair wind.

Weymouth, Oct. 21. The last night arrived in this Road a Privateer of Offend, Capiain Derickston Commander, bringing with him a Prize, being a French Barker of 50 tuns, full laden, and is the fifth Prize he and his fellow have taken
