Vienna, March 18. The Turks we hear are preparing another great Convoy for Newbessel; and several Troops are Marching to joynt Colonel Heuster that he may be in a condition to oppose them. Of the last action he was engaged in with the Enemy we have now these particulars; Colonel Heuster having had information by a person who came out of Newbessel, that the Turks were resolved to relieve that place whatever it cost them; that for this purpose they had drawn together 8000 men between Novigrad and Vaccia; and that they were by a Signal of a certain number of Guns to give notice of their march to the Garison of Newbessel, who were thereupon to send out 200 Horse to meet the said Convoy, and to conduct it, by the best and most convenient way to the Town; He was very watchful to prevent the Enemies design; and having heard the Signal, sent a Detachment to meet the party that came out of the Town, which succeeded as he desired; for they defeated the Turks and took 50 of them Prisoners, by whom they understood the way the Convoy was to take; whereupon Colonel Heuster, having with him about 2000 men marched towards the River Ipol, and posted himself there. The Enemy advancing, he first attacked their Van-guard with three Field Pieces, and put them into disorder, and then charged them with that Success, that after a short Dispute he put them to flight, leaving 500 slain upon the place, but Colonel Heuster knowing their main Body was not far off did not think fit to pursue them. The Envoy from the Prince of Transylvania has not yet been admitted to Audience. The Count de Staremberg is to Command the Imperial Troops in Croatia. And Count Leslie will have the Command Count Staremberg had the last Campaign in the Imperial Army under the Duke of Lorraine.

Hamburg

*Hamburg, March 27.* The Troops of the Duke of Zell are ordered to be the 5th of the next month at *Burgdorf*, where those of *Hanouer* and *Wolfenbutzel* are to joyn with them in order to their march for *Hungary*. We are told from *Berlin* that the Elector of *Brandenburg* hath named the Count of *Dobnau* to go for *England* in the Quality of his Envoy Extraordinary.

*Cologne, March 27.* The Troops of our Elector will now very suddenly begin their march for *Hungary*. The 600 Men raised by this City for the Emperor's Service, are ready and stay only for Orders to march. They write from *Municke*, that their Preparations for the Campaign are in great forwardness; And that his Electoral Highness will part the beginning of the next month for *Vienna* to Celebrate his Marriage with the Arch-Duchess the Emperor's Daughter. We are with some impatience expecting the return of the Deputies which our Magistrates have sent to *Coblentz* to desire the Elector of *Trier's* Interposition for the composing matters between the Elector of *Cologne* and this City.
