Whitehall, April 1.

THE following Address was Presented to His Majesty by *Richard Verney* Esq (upon whom His Majesty was pleased to confer the Honor of Knighthood) and several other of the principal Gentlemen of the County of *Warwick*, being Introduced by the Right Honorable the Earl of *Sunderland*, Lord-Lieutenant of that County.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The Humble Address of your most Loyal and Obedient Subjects, of the Grand Inquest for your Majesties County of *Warwick* at the Assizes there held on the 23. of *March* in the First Year of your Majesties Reign.

Grief and Tears though a Duty to the Sacred Altes of our late Dread Sovereign, are too mean and transient a Tribute to that invaluable loss.

That Grace of God which hath placed his Scepter in your hands, hath taught your Subjects the best way to Testifie our Sorrows is by a steady Obedience to you, Sir, our Sovereign Leige Lord, his undoubted Heir and Successor, according to the Rights of this Hereditary Monarchy which hath ever been in England since our Ancestors were civilized by Governm^{nt}.

Permit us therefore, Great Sir, to prostrate our selves at your Sacred Feet; acknowledging a full acquiescence in your Gracious Promises, not doubting, but that the Church of England, shall flourish in all her Legal Priviledges, and Establishments, and that your Crown shall enjoy all that Fame and Power, both at home and abroad, which it ever had in the best days of your most renowned Ancestors.

This Sir, you being our Monarch is our Belief and Hope, we therefore with faithful Hearts, cheerfully offer the willing Sacrifice of our Lives and Fortunes, to serve your Majesty, with a most entire obedience and exact fidelity.

We desire the Concurrence of the Honorable Bench and each of the Nobility and Gentry as are present at the said Assizes.

Whitehall, April 1. There have been likewise presented to His Majesty very Loyal Addresses, From the Lord-Lieutenant, High Sheriff, Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury, and Inhabitants of the County of *Berks*. From the two Grand Juries for the County of *Suffolk* at the Assizes holden at *Ipswich* the 18th of *March* 1684. From the Grand Jury for the County of *Kent* at the Assizes holden at *Rocheſter* the 24th of *March* 1684. From the Bayliff and Burghers of the Borough of *Knaresbrough* in *Yorkshire*. From the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesſes of the Corporation of *Macclesfield* in the County of *Cheſter*. And from the Mayor, Justices of the Peace, and Burgesſes of the Town of *Tenby* in the County of *Pembrok*, which His Majesty received very Graciously.

Venice, *March* 17. The 13th Instant a Vessel arrived here from the *Levant*, by which we had an account that the Turks make great preparations for the Campaign; That the Grand Signior had sent Orders to the Dey of *Tripoli* to fit out a certain number of Men of War to joyn the Turkish Fleet; And that the Caimacam had caused several Merchant

Ships, that were at *Constantinople*, to be stopp'd, intending to employ them for the Transporting the Troops from *Asia* to *Theſſalonique*. We have advice that General *Morofini* is gone from *Preveſta* to *Sancta Maura* to visit that Fortrefſ and to hasten the new Fortifications that are making there. Vessels are providing to Transport severl Companies of Dragoons and 500 Foot, raised in *Germany*, to *Dalmatia*. The Republick hath made a Treaty with the Elector of *Saxony*, for 3000 Men, which it's hoped will be here by the beginning of *May*. His Electoral Highness parted from hence this Week in his return home.

Genova, *March* 24. The Doge and the four Senators begun their Journey the 21 Instant for *France*; They will pass through *Viteri*, *Mazone*, *Aqui* and *Carignan*, without entering into the great Towns to avoid Ceremony; The Eldest Senator is to supply the place of the Doge during his absence. This Week sailed from hence the *Fly* for *Naples*; and the *Vine* for the *Riviera*. The *London Merchant*; The *Britton*; and the *Daniel*, are arrived in this Port.

Warsaw, *March* 13. The Dyet hath not yet made choice of their Marschal or Speaker, the Deputies of *Lithuania* insisting to have it first declared that the two next Dyets shall be held at *Grodno*, which the Nobility of *Poland* are willing to agree to, so that their time has been hitherto spent very fruitlessly. We have advice that the Turks and Tartars are preparing to bring a great Army into the Field.

Vienna, *March* 20. The Garrison of *Newbusefel*, as we understand by the Prisoners, lately taken by Colonel *Heusler*, are notwithstanding the several supplies of Provisions they have received this Winter, in great want; which the Turks are so sensible of, that they are drawing what Troops they can together, to relieve the place. At the same time all imaginable care is taken on this side to frustrate their Design. The Preparations for the Campaign advance very successfully; The general rendezvous of the Emperors Troops and those of the Empire is appointed to be on the 27th of *May*. The Count *de Staremberg* Governor of this City and Marschal de Camp General, will part from hence the beginning of the next Month, for *Croatia*, to Command the Emperors Forces there in the place of Count *Lſlie*, who is to Command the Imperial Infantrie under the Duke of *Lorraine*. The Ingenier that came from *Flanders* made the 16th Instant a Second Tryal, in the presence of the Emperor, of his Bombes and Carcasses of a new Invention, with which his Imperial Majesty was very well satisfied. The Letters from *Hungary* tell us that the Turks have prepared a Convoy of 1200 Wagons laden with Ammunition and Provisions for *Newbusefel*; and that they have drawn together 20000 Men near *Buda*.

Hamburg, *March* 26. The Endeavours that have been used for the composing the differences between the Duke of *Zell* and this City have not as yet had any success; The Goods belonging to some Merchants of this Place that were lately seized at *Harbourg* and *Lunenbourg* have by Order of the Duke of *Zell* been sold there; And these Magistrates have thereupon Published an Order for the securing the effects his Highnesses Subjects have at present here. The Troops which the Princes of *Lunenbourg* send to the Emperors assistance will begin their
