Vienna, March 25. The Armenian, who larcly arrived here from Buda, hath been fent back with this Answer, That the Emperor will not enter into any Negotiation of Peace, but joyhtly with his Allies, he King of Poland, and the Republick of Venice. The Count de Breuner parted fron hence the 23 i flaat to receive on the Frontiers, the Froops which the Princes of Lunenburg fend to the Empero s alliltance. The Letters from Hungary affare us that the Turks in Newbeusek are reduced to that condition, that they will not be able to lubfift many weeks longer without a very confiderable fupply; And that the Visier of Buda is therefore preparing to make his utmost effort for the relief of this important place. Colonel Heusler in the mean time has tak n what care he can to fecure the paffages of the River Gran and Ipol; And when the Troops that are now marching have joyned him, he will be in a condition to go and m et the Enemy. They write fr m Upper Hun-gary that the Imperialis bave def ated a Party of Rebels that were going with a great Convoy of Provisions to Esperies.

Hamburgh, April 6. The Letters fiom Warfaw of the 13 pass tell us that there had yet been nothing concluded in the Dyct, the diffutes between the Deputies of *Lithuinia*, and those of *Poland* having teken up all their time. The Troops of the Princes of Lunenburg are drawing together in order to their march for Hungary, Hague, April 6. The States of Holland and West-

Friefland realiembled the 3d inftant; and refumed the debate concerning the reform of the Troops, which Amsterdam and five Towns more continue to piels with much earneffness, and the Nobles and the other 13 Towns as zealoufly to oppofe; Some of these demand that the matter may be concluded by plurality of voices; but it's believed a middle way will be taken that may content both fides, Mr. Skelton Envoy Extraordinary from His Majefly of Great Bri-tain to this State arrived here on Tuesday last; And the next day Mr. Chudleigh parted from hence for Monfieur de Lavergne late Governor of England. Deventer is going into the Emperors Service, where it's faid he will have a very confiderable Command. Monfieur Owerkerke returned hither the 4th inftant from England.

Bruffels, April 3. We hear from Liege that the Bishop of Strasbourg is gone from thence to Bonne to be prefent at the Affembly of the States of the Arch-Bishoprick of Colegne, as well as to endeavour a composure of the differences between the Elector and The Prince de Salme is arfived City of Cologne. Sentry and Freeholders of the County of Kent, herefrom Germany, and will flay at this Court till From the Lord Bilhop and Clergy of the Diocels the Elector of Cologne's Troops are feady to begin their helf March for Hungary, the Emperor having com-mitted them to his conduct.
