To the Kings most Excellent Majesty,  
The Humble Adress of the Lord Lieutenant, High Sheriff, Deputy Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, Grand-Jury, and the Inhabitants of the County of Berks.

May it please your Majesty.

As we were most sensibly affeeted at the surprizing loss of our late most Gracious Sovereign, so we cannot but with all Thankfulness acknowledge the great Mercy of God, and Congratulate our own happiness in your Majesties Peaceable Succession to the Imperial Crown of these Realms, notwithstanding the malicious oppositions of Gods, your Majesties, and our Adversaries.

And we do render our most humble and hearty Thanks for your Majesties most Gracious Declaration of Maintaining the Church of England, and the Laws as now Established, upon which we Build our Confidence as on a Rock, the Truth of your Royal Word having ever been as undoubted as your Courage in the greatest dangers hath been undented.

Wherefore we most cheerfully lay our Lives and Fortunes at your Majesties Feet, fearing no danger while under the Protection of your approved Valour and Justice. And our Interest as well as Duty doth and ever will oblige us sincerely to Pray, for your Majesties long Life, and happy Reign over us, and our Posterities, as becomes, Your Majesties most Loyal and Obedient Subjects.

To the Kings most Excellent Majesty,  
The Humble Adress of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses, of your Majesties Antient Borough of Wotton Bassett in the County of Wilts.

That as we cannot but be deeply sensible of our great loss in the Death of your dear Brother and our most Dread Sovereign of Blessed Memory; so we do thankfully adore that Divine Providence, which hath so peaceably seated your Majesty our undoubted Lord upon the Throne of your Ancestors to the Joy of all your Majesties Loyal Subjects. And we most Humbly presume to tender your Majesty our most hearty Thanks and Acknowledgments for your great Grace and Condescension, vouchsafed in your late Gracious Declarations, for which we acknowledge our selves for ever bound in all Duty and Gratitude to Pray for your Majesties long and happy Reign over us, and although this our humble and Loyal Adress comes not so early as it ought to have done, yet it is with this most humble and Dutiful assurance, that we shall ever be ready to render your Majesty our humblest Duty and Obedience, and to serve your Majesty in our Stations, with our Lives and Fortunes. In Testimony whereof we have hereunto set our Common Seal of our said Corporation, the Six and Twentieth Day of March, in the First Year of your Majesties Reign.

There have been likewise Presented to His Majesty very Loyal Adresses, From the Nobility, Gentry and Freeholders of the County of Kent, From the Lord Bishop and Clergy of the Diocess

of Norwich. From the Dean and Members of the Cathedral Church of Sarum, together with the Clergy within the said Deans exempted and peculiar jurisdiction. From the Grand Juries at the Assizes held for the County of York March the Ninth, 1684. From the Grand-Jury of the County Palatine of Lancaster at the Assizes held at Lancaster the 21st of March, 1684. From Ferdinando Ho-dgkinston of Millom Castle in the County of Cumberland Esq; with his Free holders, Tenants and Inhabitants within his Lordship and Seigniorly of Millome, which His Majesty received very Graciously.

Vicenna, March 25. The Armenian, who lately arrived here from Buda, hath been sent back with this Answer, That the Emperor will not enter into any Negotiation of Peace, but jointly with his Allies, the King of Poland, and the Republick of Venice, the Count de Breunert parted from hence the 23 instant to receive on the Frontiers, the Troops which the Princes of Lunenburg send to the Emperors assistance. The Letters from Hungary assure us that the Turks in Newbusek are reduced to that condition, that they will not be able to subsist many weeks longer without a very considerable supply; And that the Visier of Buda is therefore preparing to make his utmost effort for the relief of this important place. Colonel Heusler in the mean time has taken what care he can to secure the passages of the River Gran and Spol; And when the Troops that are now marching have joined him, he will be in a condition to go and meet the Enemy. They write from Upper Hungary that the Imperialists have defeated a Party of Rebels that were going with a great Convoy of Provisions to Esperies.

Hamburg, April 6. The Letters from Warsaw of the 23 past tell us that there had yet been nothing concluded in the Dyct, the disputes between the Deputies of Lithuania, and those of Poland having taken up all their time. The Troops of the Princes of Lunenburg are drawing together in order to their march for Hungary.

Hague, April 6. The States of Holland and West-Friesland reassembled the 3d instant; and resumed the debate concerning the reform of the Troops, which Amsterdam and five Towns more continue to press with much earnestness, and the Nobles and the other 12 Towns as zealously to oppose; Some of these demand that the matter may be concluded by plurality of voices; but it is believed a middle way will be taken that may content both sides. Mr. Skelton Envoy Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great Britain to this State arrived here on Tuesday last; And the next day Mr. Chudleigh parted from hence for England. Monsieur de Livergne late Governor of Deventer is going into the Emperors Service, where it is said he will have a very considerable Command. Monsieur Owerkerke returned hither the 4th instant from England.

Brussels, April 3. We hear from Liege that the Bishop of Strasbourg is gone from thence to Bonne to be present at the Assembly of the States of the Archbishoprick of Cologne, as well as to endeavour a composition of the differences between the Elector and City of Cologne. The Prince de Salme is arrived here from Germany, and will stay at this Court till the Elector of Cologne's Troops are ready to begin their
