His Grace the Duke of Norfolk and the Right Honorable the Earl of Tarmouth, accompanied with several of the Principal Gentlemen of the County of Norfolk, presented to His Majesty the following Address, Signed by about 6000 Gentlemen and Freeholders of the said County, which His Majesty received very Graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Lord-Lieutenant, High Sheriff, Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury, Militia Officers, Chief Inhabitants, and Freeholders of the County of NORFOLK.

Great SIR,

Should we only reflect upon the Death of your Royal Brother our late Gracious Sovereign, we might forget our present Duty, but when we see your Sacred Majesty justly and peaceably Enthron'd, the Designs of Your Implacable Enemies defeated, our Rights and Religion secured by your Majesties most Gracious Declaration, these pleasing Thoughts are so Transporting, that we cannot find Expressions full enough for our Joy and Gratitude.

And we do assure your Majesty, that whatever can be in the power of the most resolved Loyalty to preserve your Sacred Majesty and Government, and to support the Honour and Grandure of your Majesty and Monarchy, shall be faithfully and readily effected by,

Whitehall, April 11. There have been likewise presented to His Majesty very Loyal Addresses, From the Lord Bishop, Dean and Chapter and Clergy of the Diocess of Exeter. From the Grand Jury for the County of Cornwall. From the Grand Jury for the County of Devon at the Assizes held at the Castle of Exon the 10th March 1684. From the Grand Inquest for the County of Hereford at the Assizes held at the City of Hereford the 14th of March. From the Grand Jury for the County of Stafford, with the Concurrence of the Lord-Lieutenant, Deputy-Lieutenants, and Justices of the Peace at the Assizes held at Stafford the 24th of March 1684. From the Bayliff and Burghers of the Borough of Stockbridge in Hampshire. From several Reformed Officers that faithfully served His Majesty's Royal Father of Blessed Memory. Which His Majesty received very Graciously.

Venna, March 20. The Ambassadors for England are preparing for their departure. The Senate have ordered 40 thousand Ducats to be paid to the Elector of Saxony for the 3000 Foot that Prince is to send to the assistance of the Republick. The Troops of the Princes of Lunenburg begin to arrive. We have advicethat the Turks will have 60 Gallies, 40 men of War, and 10 Galeasses at Sea this Summer; And that they will have 70000 men in Hungary, 12000 in the Morca, and 60000 Tartars and 15000 Turks against the Poles.

Vienna, March 18. The account was had of Colonel Heussler's having defeated 6000 Turks who were going with a great Convoy to Newbusek is confirmed; and we are assured that the Garrison of that place cannot subsist longer then six Weeks, without a very considerable supply of Provisions.

Alba Regalis, Camisia, and Buda are in great want of all Necessaries, Count Teckely is in great fear of being abandoned by those that have hitherto taken part with him. The Envoy from the Prince of Transylvania has made some Proposals of Peace; but the Emperor will not hearken to them.

Vienna, March 25. All possible care is taken to Block up Newbusek; for which purpose several Troops are on their March to reinforce Colonel Heussler, and two Forts are raised upon the River Gran: At the same time the Turks we are told make great preparations to succor the place. General Schuita, who commands in Upper Hungary, desires some Troops may be sent to his Assistance, that in he may be in a condition to execute his design upon Esperies. The Turks, its said, will have a great Army in Hungary this Summer, but their men are most of them raw and undisciplined, and are forced into the War. The Ambassadors from the Elector of Bavaria are not yet arrived.

Hamburg, April 10. We have an account from Zell that the Troops of Lunenburgh are on their March for Hungary. From Stockbolme they write of the 31 past that Count Bigke Lieutenant General in the Service of the King of Sweden was going with his Majesty's leave to serve the Elector of Bavaria. The Letters from Copenhagen give an account that the King of Denmark is reducing his Troops; That 5000 Regiments of Horse are put into one, and 30 Men disbanded in every Company of Foot: and that the King intends to be the next Month in Halstein. We are told from Berlin that an Envoy was arriv'd there from the Emperor to sollicite succor against the Turks: And from Dresden that the Elector of Saxony had sent Orders to draw out of his Troops 3000 Men for the assistance of the Republick of Venice who are to begin their March the first of the next Month. The Letters from Warsaw of the 26th past, say, the Dyer was to sit but 8 days longer, but that it was hoped they would in that time come to a conclusion in the most important matters before them.

Hague, April 13. The 11th Instant Mr. Skelton Envoy Extraordinary from his Majesty of Great-Britain had publick Audience of the States General, being conducted to it with the usual ceremony. The Count the Baron Foel Ambassador Extraordinary from the King of Denmark had a long Conference with the Deputies of the States concerning the Duties to be paid by our Ships in the Sound; but we do not hear that they came to an agreement therein. The Commissioners for the Business of Bantam have had several Conferences here this Week, and will depart in few days for England. The Regiment lately commanded by Monsieur de Lavergne, who is gone into the Emperors Service, is given to the Sieur Faget, Nephew to the Pensionary Faget, who was a Captain in the Regiment of Guards. The States of Holland are at present assembled, but have not yet taken a resolution concerning the State of the War for this year.

Hague, April 17. Prince Casimir of Nassau Stadtholder of Friseland and Grovingen arrived here on Friday last; The next day he was to visit the Prince of Orange; and afterwards assisted in the Council of State. The Prince and Princesses of Orange are gone to Dieren. The States of Holland are adjourn'd till the 25th of the next Month, without coming to a conclusion concerning the State of the War, Amsterdam.
