THE following is a copy of an Order of Her Majesty in Council, assigning a consolidated district, under the 6th section of the 59th Geo. 3., cap. 134, to Trinity Chapel, at Newcastle Emlyn, in the parish of Cenarth, in the county of Carmarthen, taken from contiguous parts of the said parish of Cenarth, and of the adjoining parish of Llandyfriog, in the county of Cardigan:

At the Court at Buckingham-Palace, the 10th of June 1843, present, the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply
