Venice

Pienna, April 8. Several Conferences have been held between the Imperial Commissioners and the Elector of Bavaria's Ambassators. His Electoral Highnels is himself expected here the beginning of the next Month. A Christian who lately got out of Newheusel, is come hither and reports that the Garison is very much weakned, many dying daily through want of necessaries; That the Janisaries begin to be very diforderly, and that they have forced the Balla to open the chief Magazine of Provisions, and that these will be spent in three Weeks. At the same time we have advice that the have prepared a great Convoy at Novigrad under the conduct of the Bassa of Agria. Several new raifed Troops passdaily through this place for Hungary to fill up the Old Regiments quartered there; And great quantities of Ammunition and Provisions have been sent to Gran and other places where General Rabata has Orders to provide Magazines. Letters from Upper Hungary which fay, that an Imperial Party that was going to Zatmar had met Count Teckley coming with 800 Horse from Tokay and had defeated them, but give us no farther particulars of this action.

Bruffels, April 24. The Marquis de Grana went this Morning to Marimont, being accompanied with the Prince de Vaudemont, and the Duke d'Aerfebot, to pais 5 or 6 days there. They Write from Leige that the new Cittadel is Building with all pessible genee; That it will not be so large as the former was, but that it is in the same place: That the Elector of Cologne's Troops have not yet begun their march for Hungary; And it is thought they will not move till the City of Cologne hath given his Electoral High-ness satisfaction. We have an account from Municke that the Elector of Bavaria will on the first of May begin his Journy for Vienna to celebrate his Marriage with the Archdutchess the Emperors Daughter; all things relating to it being agreed by his Ambalfadors at Vienna according to their de-The Letters from Vienna of the 12th Instant tell us that divers at empts have been of late made by the Turks and Rebels of Hungary to fuccor Newbeusel but that they have been all unsuccessful, their Parties having been still descated by the Troops Commanded by Colonel Heuster; The last rencounter they had was with 300 Horse and 500 Janisaries of the Garison of Newbeusel who came out to meet and conduct to the Town several Wagons laden with Provisio s, which were brought by another Party f om Novigrad; The Turkish Horse were no momer charged by the Christians but they fled leaving the Janifaries, who drew behind their Carriages, to defend themselves as well as they could, which they did till the greatest part of them were flain; the rest were made Prisoners, and Colonel Heuster capsed all the Peasants that were taken with the Wagons to be immediately hanged.

Hague, April 24. The Baron Foel Ambassador Extraordinary from the King of Denmark, presented on Fryday fast a Memorial to the States General, wherein he defires they will give him in Writing the reasons that keep them from Ratifying the Treaty of Commerce he lately concluded with their Deputies, that he may be the better able to lay them be-The Deputies of the fore the King his Malter. States and the Elector of Cologne's Resident have, after several Confe ences, regulated matters concerning the passage of their Troops through each others Territories. Prince Casimir of Nassam is at present with the Prince of Orange at Dieren. write from Cologne, that the Prince de Conti, and the Prince de la Roche sur Ton, were fassed through that City Incognito, intending to go to the Court of the Elector of Bavaria.

Paris, April 25. The Doge of Genoua continues here Incognito till his Equipage be ready; He is Lodged in the House of Beauvais in the Fauxburg of St. Germains. The Money which the Republick is

to pay to the Count de Fielque, lies ready in the hands of a Banker of this City.
