**T**Hought we appear not so early (compar'd with others) in paying the just Tribute of publick Sorrow for the Death of our late Gracious Sovereign, yet do we humbly presume to assure your Majesty, that nothing could have allayed our Grief, or ballanc'd to mighty Misfortunes, but our happy Contemplation of Your Royal Self (the undoubted Heir of His Crown) peaceably seated upon the Throne of Your Ancestors, which fills our Hearts with solid Joys, and our Mouths with loudest Acclamations; Blessing God and your Majesty who have so Graciously declar'd, that You will defend Your People in all their just Rights and Liberties, and the Church of England as by Law Established, which Church (to its everlasting Honour) is the strongest Assertor of the inviolable Rights of Kings; In conformity to the Doctrine whereof we will never forget that good opinion your Majesty hath conceiv'd of us, and our Church, acknowledging our selves oblig'd as well by our Religion as the Laws, to defend your Sacred Person and Government with the utmost hazard of our Lives and Fortunes; And we are assur'd to send such Members to Parliament as shall approve themselves Loyal to your Majesty, under whose Auspicious Reign may this Kingdom and all other Your Dominions ever flourish, to the utter disappoyntment and confusion of all Your Enemies.

**W**ith Souls divided betwixt Joy and Grief, we presume to come into Your Royal Presence, to deplore at once the most fatal Affliction that could have happened, and thankfully to adore that Providence, which after so severe a Stroke has cheer'd us with an unspeakable a Blessing, by giving us a means for our CHARLES a JAMES the Second. Thanks be to God that such a Matchless Pair, whose mutual Love no Story can parallel, were separated by a natural Death; That your Precious Lives and all your Liege People, were so signally deliver'd from the violent designs of the Crafty Achitophel, from the deep and Hellish Projects of the Council of Six, from Blunderbusses, Inkerrections, and Massacres, and from all the dire effects of that Exclusive Bill so impudently, unrighteously, and ungratefully preferred against one that had not only the most unquestionable Title to the Succession, but that for His many Services done these Kingdoms, and for His incomparable Qualifications, was apparently the most deserving Prince in the World. However, S I R, we hope in this You'll pardon Your misguided Subjects, and admit us to Address You among our ever Lov'd Brethren; since our Sorrow is unfeign'd, and our Repentance is as evident and publick as our Crimes. We do all to a Man desert him and all such Seducers, looking upon them as State-Interlopers; nor will we suffer batow a Voice upon any hereafter who are likely either to invade the Prerogative or disregard the Wants of our King, whose Power is our Bulwark, whose Wealth is our certain Treasure. For we are sure that we and all our dear'd Concerns are

safe in You! being convinc'd by Your Promise, that's like Your Person, Sacred

May then Your Life, Mighty Prince, be long and Glorious, may You many Kingly Virtues, as they needs must, make us a Considerable People; May You be fear'd abroad, and rever'd at home; and since You Your Self will't a Subject, who to Exemplary in Your Obedience, may every Man in the Three Kingdoms imitate so great a Pattern.

*The humble Address of the Bishop, Chapter, and Clergy of the Diocess of Oxford, to the High and Mighty Prince JAMES the Second, by the Grace of GOD King of England, &c.*

**W**E Your Majesties most Loyal and Obedient Subjects the Bishop, Chapter, and Clergy of the Diocess of Oxford; though we have in conjunction with our University and County, made early Congratulations of your Majesties peaceful possession of Your Imperial Crown; notwithstanding the Rebellions attempts of Wicked Men, who set themselves against it: Yet being now expressly call'd together, by the command of your Sacred Majesty, for the choice of our Pructors in Convocation; we thought the opportunity was not to be pass'd over, to make in our own names and entirely of our selves, a particular profession of Duty. Therefore in all humility, prostrate at your Majesties Feet, we desire to offer our grateful acknowledgments of Your singular Clemency express in Your Gracious Declaration to maintain our Religion, as now by Law Established; wherein are bound up our best and highest Interests: Also adoring the Divine Goodness, which hath put it into your Majesties Royal Heart, to repress the profligate Immoralities of the Age; and stop that Issue of Blood, the barbarous cowardize of Duelling, which in defiance of the Laws of God and of the Land, made the License of our peace, more unreasonably inhumane, then the Cruelty of War; We take leave to look upon these first Essays of Your Government, as lure Prefages of future blessings: And render our heartiest thanks to God and to your Majesty for them. Also we pray that the Divine Goodness which has given your Majesty to the Three Kingdoms a great Example of Heroical and Princely Virtues; will give Your People grateful Hearts to value their Enjoyments, and express their thankfulness in suitable returns of Submission and Obedience. Lastly, we solemnly promise our faithful and unwearied endeavour in our Stations, that Your People may imbibe into their minds, those two great Lessons, of Fearing God, and Honouring the King; and fully understand, that nothing can make Your Reign easie and happy to them, but their making it first so unto your Sacred Majesty.

**A**fter our unspeakable loss of the best of Princes, to remain in the Possession of the same Peace and Plenty, with Hopes of greater, is a Blessing so inestimable and undeserv'd, that we cannot but wish the highest Transports of Joy and Zeal, acknowledge the great Bounty of Heaven, in placing you (by a rightful Succession) on the Throne of your Royal Progenitors, where after having stemm'd the Torrent of a proud and long pamper'd Faction, and bazz'd the secret and deep Conspiracies of your Enemies, in despite of all Popular Tumults, Bills of Exclusion, Associations, Comprehension, and Black Boxes, you are become a Terror to the wicked, and an Example to the good and Virtuous; But above all the most Memorable Acts of your Life; we value that of your Gracious Declaration in Council, giving us a full Assurance of Protecting and Preserving our Established Religion and Government, by the indisputable Testimony and Character therein confirm'd, of the Principles and Members of the Church of England; wherein you shew'd your unparalleled Condescension, by preventing

There have been likewise Presented to His Majesty very Loyal Addresses from the Grand-Jury for the Body of the County of Salop at the Assizes held the 19th of March 1684. From the Mayor, and the rest of the Magistrates, Burgesses, and Officers of the Borough and Garrison of Barwick upon Treweede. From the Bayliff, Burgesses, and Commonalty of the Borough and Corporation of Bewdley in Worcester-shire. From the Bayliff, and Burgesses of the Borough of Cockermouth in Cumberland, Presented by Sir Christopher Musgrave, all which His Majesty received very Graciously.

Venice, March 30. The 24th Instant six new raised Companies arrived at the Lido, where there are now 2000 Foot and 200 Dragoons which will be Transported to Dalmatia. Part of the Auxiliary Troops of Brunswick are arrived on the Frontiers of this State. By a Vessel arrived from the Levant we have advice that the Turks are making preparations to have a great Fleet at Sea this Summer; but that the Tripolins have excited their sending any of their Ships to joyn the Turkish Fleet, for that they shall have need of them for their own defence. The 25th Instant, Signior Sarotti formerly Minister from this State in the Court of England, and his Son, were deliver'd out of Prison and set at liberty, having clearly proved their Innocency of the Crimes imputed to them.

Genova, April 10. The Senate have Named Signior Agostino Pallavicino to go for England in quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the Republick to Condole the Death of the late King of Ever

Blessed Memory, and to Congratulate His Majesties Succession to the Crown. The five Gallies of Naples are preparing to return home with two new Gallies which the King of Spain has bought of this Republick. Several French Ships arrive daily in this Port; and most of the Merchants of that Nation, who left this City upon the French Fleets appearing before it the last year, are returned to reside here. This Week Sailed from hence the *Daniel* for Naples; The *Diamond* and the *Elizabeth* are on departure for Legborne; And the *Essex* Merchant and the *Providence* for the *Riviera*.

Hague, April 27. The Baron *Foel* Ambassador Extraordinary from the King of Denmark parted from hence this Morning on his return home; The Treaty of Commerce he concluded with the Deputies of this State is not yet ratified, nor is there at present any appearance of removing the difficulties that hinder it. Prince *Casimir* of Nassau is returned to *Leewerden* after having spent several days with the Prince of Orange at *Dieren*. The *Sieur Norfe* the Elector of *Salagne* Resident has Presented a Memorial to the States General, wherein he gives them an account of his Electoral Highnesses pretentions upon the City of *Cologne*. The Commissioners for the *Bantam* business will its said depart for England in the beginning of the next week.
