That the King his Malfor having ic. ceived Everal Advices of a great Change that was going to be made in the Low Countries by the King of spines yielding the Sovering it of them to the Elector of Bavaria, or by giving him the Government thereof io foon as he shall have married the Arch-Durchess; His Mo t Christian Majerly was the more fur prized a. it, for that it would be making a breach in the Truce while his Most Christian Majesty em-ploys his whole care inviolably to observe it; And that therefore his faid Majetty out of a delice to pre-vent all occasions that may diffurn the good correlpondence established between the two Crowns, had commanded him (his Ambassador) to declare in his Name, That while his Catholick Majesty observes the Truce, the Conditions whereof impose a necesfity of leaving the Low Countries in the stare they were in, and continues to possessand govern them as heretofore, his Most Christian M jesty will not moleft, at least during the Layers of the fruce, the Low Countries nor any other of the King of Spain's Dominions; But on the contrary, if the Sentiments of those that defire the War prevail to far that the Dake of Bavaria becomes Soveraign or only Govern nor of the laid Low Countries, which will be the lame thing, and that the Mon-rohy of Spain is leff curt by so considerable a part of his Dominions in savour of a Prince that has nothing to pretend, and to the prejudice not only of the Children the King of Spain may have, but likewife of those of the Dauphin and his Distendents, his Most Christian M. July not being able to look upon it but as a Formal Contravention of the Truce, there will be danger by what may folg low, that Spain will find it felf embarraffed to preserve the Countries that concern it the near-sk, Which Memorial having been read and confidered of in the Council of State the King being present, his catholick Majesty caused this Aniwer to be returned. That the Suppositions contained in the said Memorial, are News to his Majesty; That his Maje, sties intention is punctually to observe the True, to adjust all things according to the t. ue meaning of it, and for the performance of those Treaties of Peace to which the Truce refers and which are included in it, and that his Catholick Majelty believes the Most Christian King will observe it in the same manner.
