THE following Address, having been received by His Royal Highness Prince Albert, on the occasion of His visit to Birmingham, for presentation to Her Majesty, the same was presented by His Royal Highness to Her Majesty, who was pleased to receive the same very graciously:

To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, your Majesty's most loyal and devoted subjects, the Governors of the Free Grammar School of King Edward the Sixth, in Birmingham, desire humbly to present to your Majesty our assurances of continued loyalty and affection, and of the unfeigned satisfaction with which we welcome your Majesty's august presence in the midland districts of your Majesty's dominions in this island.

We gratefully acknowledge the blessings which, by the favour of Divine Providence, we enjoy under your Majesty's auspicious Government, entrusted as we are, by a beneficent predecessor of your Majesty, with the charge of diffusing the principles of religion and sound knowledge, according to the doctrines of the Church of England, among the inhabitants of a most populous and important manufacturing portion of this kingdom, we hail, with unmixed pleasure, the arrival, in these parts, of your Majesty, whose deep interest for the welfare of your people, and attachment to the Protestant Religion, cannot but remind us of our pious and venerated Founder; while your Majesty's domestic virtues no less demand our affection and esteem.

For the honour conferred on King Edward's School, this town and neighbourhood, by the late visit of your Majesty's Royal Consort, and the interest taken by His Royal Highness in our manufactures, we are deeply grateful. The encourage-
