Esterday his Grace the Lord Lieutenant went hence for Kithenny, intending to have lain this last night at the Earl of Arrans at Meddenston, and is again expected back about 10 or 12 dayes hence. Several Vessels are lately arrived here, pirticularly a Swede of 300 Tuns, laden with Sale and Wine: A Ketch from S. Maios with Sale; a Pink from Plymouth, and a Galliot from Glasgow, her lading Butter and H. rrangs.

Falmouth, Off. 21. Here are now in Port neer 80 fail of Ships outwards bound, but driven in for shiller against the late tempests: about 30 of them, with two M in of Warre, French Snips belonging to the Grand Parry. On Tursday lest appeared before this Harbo. 4 or 5 Offend Men of Warrs with gave them chase hither, and 'tis believed have taken some others of their number, which came out in their company from Rouen. A Welch Vessel of 20 Tuns laden with Cosls for France, was by the violence of the late ill weather driven from her Anchor, and cast upon the Rocks to her great peril and damage; the same h-zard also ran a Freach Ship I iden with Sale.

Plymouth, Off. 22. Yesterday arrived here the Sorlings with several disbanded men from the Isls of Soilly. The spanish Man of War that came over with the Articles of Peace, brought by a Gendeman sent from his Exc II sey the Earl of Sandwich, went yesterday to see, and in the offin boarded an English Merchant, and did some injury to the Men and Goods they sound aboard her, but the Spanish Captain informed of the rudeness of his People, cashe likewise aboard the Merchant, correcting his Suddiess for their uncivil dealing, and forcing them to restore what they had before taken away.

Napies, Off. 11. Some Seamen arriving here la a Feluca, from Legorn, Informus, that two of our Gallies, had after fome imail dispute taken a large French Tarcane of a confiderable value.

The news of the birth of a young Prisce to the Emperor has been received with extraordinary joy by the Vice-Roys who commanded the Guns to be discharged from all his Cafiles and Forts, and dispatche away a Courier to the Vice-Roy of Sicily, to inform him of that happy news.

By the way of Messina we are told that the Vanetian Armats was in pursuit of 7 great Turkish Veisels laden with Corn intended for Canea, which, if taken, might much discourage the Grand Visite: in his Slege, his Army suffering extremely for want of necessary provisions.

Hamburg, Off. 12. Their Majesties of Dennark with the whole Court continue still at Gluckstadt, where allocatived about five days successive this Highness the Duke of Holston whith a great Train, in excellent Equipage, and about 130 horse: He was received by their Majesties with great estimonies of kindness, but intends not to stay there above 4 or 5 dayes longer, after which its believed, the Court will suidenly egain remove for Copenhagen.

The Deputles from this City have bad their Audience from their Majestles, but what their reception was we yet hear not. Queen Christina has now changed her resolution of going this Winter to Rome, having deserted it till the more pleasant time of travailing in the Spring. Rome, Off. 15. On Sunday in the afternoon the Cardinal Landigrave of Heffe, the Protector of Germany went with a Train of about 130 Coaches, filled with Noblemen and Prelates to an extraordinary Audi nee from his Holinels, where he acquainted him with the news of the happy delivery of the Emprels of a Son.

The Abbot Tellier is suddenly expected here from his most Christian Majesty, having in his way been received by the several Princes through whose Countries he passed with extraordinary respect and Civility, and by particular Order treated on the publick account by the Governour of Miland during his stay in that State: A Palace is here prepared for him in the Street Julia, and several Coaches with 6 horses, and a d. zen Footmen to attend him.

The last night arrived at Castel Gondolpho about twelve of the neers it kindred of the P pe from Pistoya, with an bundred persons related and belonging to them, who are all of them treated upon the account of the Camers, and are to continue a month there before they enter into Rome, whither Cardinal Chigi is gone to complement them upon their arrival.

The 6. instant arrived here a French Barque with leveral forts of goods in 50 dayes from Mille, where the left 5 Ghriflian Privateers, two whereof belonging to this place, and three to Maltha: about 6 dayes fince the passed by Maltha, where was arrived a Barque from the Levant, which informed that the Venetian Armate was then at Standia, and the Tunkish Gallies ab ut Malvesia; but the Turks endeavour to avoid all encounters at Sca. That they had made violent of sules upon Gandia, but in exchange the Marquis Ville had saide a brisque Sal y upon them, with great execution; and that the Auxiliary Gallies, with some other of the Venetians, had relieved the place with a considerable addition of mea, and all forts of necessaries: But by a Vessel arriving here in 27 dayes from Candia we are told that the Turks arr more then ever intent upon the Conquest of that place, and had by their mines wholly ruined the Fort of Panigra, and were though with great slaughter of their men, got to the top of the Wall, where they were disputing their Entrance at their swords point.

The 10th Infant the News of the fafe delivery of the Empress was brought to the Great Duke at Florence, who immediately went in person to hear To Deum in the Domo, which beginning, all the Cannon of the Cittadel were discharged, and it ending, the Artillery of the Fortress in the Garden of his Palace proclaimed likewise that pleasing news. Venice, Off. 21. By the way of Zante we bave this farther secount of the Siege of Candia : That the Turks heving made their approaches to the Half-moon of M. cenige and the Fore Panigra, hat lodged themselves in the Trenches 60 them, and in little time iprang feveral Mines under each Work, which fucceeded fo effectually, asto make a wide breach in both places; and then not loting a moment of tine , the fame night made s defperate affault, great numbers of them appearing upon the Bresches, diftingnisht by some white upon their Arms : But the Besieged being in as muc's readin is to receive them, there begin a very tharp fight between them; but by the incredible valour of the Garriton, he Torks were forced to give over their attempi, with a great lo's ofm mand fome Colours. They also tell us that the Enery having been fo frequently fruftrated in their defigns upon the Outwo ks, and discouraged by their great loffes, hive given over those places, en commanded their Pioneers to undermine the Town Ditch, which the besieged Officers taking notice of, have by their Countermines within endesvourd to prevent them, and with good fuccels, met with one of the Enemies Galleries, which they entirely ruined, burying therein all the Turks that were there employ'd

Some Depuths are here arrived from the Town of Courseaf, pericloning for a difcharge from a great Sum of monics demanded of them towards the maintenance of his Majefties Gerrisons, having brought several Papers, evidencing the proportions they were formerly rated at by the Spaniards, and to beg the preservation of their Priviledges upon the same to e. But they are answered, that the Sum demanded of them is not for a standing Tax, but only a prefere advance by reason of the vast expences of his Majesty in the Wars.
