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Dublin, October 19.

Yesterday his Grace the Lord Lieutenant went hence for Kilkenny, intending to have lain this last night at the Earl of Arrans at Maddenston, and is again expected back about 10 or 12 dayes hence. Several Vessels are lately arrived here, particularly a Swede of 300 Tuns, laden with Salt and Wine: A Ketch from S. Matos with Salt; a Pick from Plymouth, and a Galliot from Glasgow, her lading Butter and Herrings.

Plymouth, Oct. 21. Here are now in Port near 80 sail of Ships outward bound, but driven in for shelter against the late tempests: about 30 of them, with two Men of Warre, French Ships belonging to the Grand Party. On Thursday last appeared before this Harbour 4 or 5 Offend Men of War, which gave them chase hither, and 'tis believed have taken some others of their number, which came out in their company from Rouen. A Welch Vessel of 20 Tuns laden with Coals for France, was by the violence of the late ill weather driven from her Anchor, and cast upon the Rocks to her great perill and damage; the same hazard also ran a French Ship laden with Salt.

Plymouth, Oct. 22. Yesterday arrived here the *Sorlings* with several disbanded men from the Isle of Scilly. The Spanish Man of War that came over with the Articles of Peace, brought by a Gentleman sent from his Excellency the Earl of Sandwich, went yesterday to sea, and in the afternoon boarded an English Merchant, and did some injury to the Men and Goods they found aboard her, but the Spanish Captain informed of the rudeness of his People, came likewise aboard the Merchant, correcting his Soldiers for their uncivil dealing, and forcing them to restore what they had before taken away.

Naples, Oct. 11. Some Seamen arriving here in a Feluca, from Legorn, inform us, that two of our Gallies, had after some small dispute taken a large French Tartane of a considerable value.

The news of the birth of a young Prince to the Emperor has been received with extraordinary joy by the Vice-Roy, who commanded the Guns to be discharged from all his Castles and Forts, and dispatched away a Courier to the Vice-Roy of Sicily, to inform him of that happy news.

By the way of *Messina* we are told that the Venetian Armata was in pursuit of 7 great Turkish Vessels laden with Corn intended for *Canea*, which, if taken, might much discourage the Grand Visier in his Siege, his Army suffering extremely for want of necessary provisions.

Hamburg, Oct. 12. Their Majesties of Denmark with the whole Court continue still at *Gluckstadt*, where also arrived about five days since, his Highness the Duke of Holstein with a great Train, in excellent Equipage, and about 130 horse: He was received by their Majesties with great testimonies of kindness, but intends not to stay there above 4 or 5 dayes longer, after which 'tis believed, the Court will suddenly again remove for *Copenhagen*.

The Deputies from this City have had their Audience from their Majesties, but what their reception was we yet hear not. *Queen Christina* has now changed her resolution of going this Winter to *Rome*, having deferred it till the more pleasant time of travelling in the Spring. Several English Merchants by ready to put to sea, and may set sail the next Monday. Yesterday arrived five Ships of this place of 30 and 32 Guns apiece, and near 300 Tuns, richly laden

from *Marseilles*, *Genova*, and *Legorn*, to the great satisfaction of our Merchants.

Rome, Oct. 15. On Sunday in the afternoon the Cardinal Landgrave of Hesse, the Protector of Germany went with a Train of about 130 Coaches, filled with Noblemen and Prelates to an extraordinary Audience from his Holiness, where he acquainted him with the news of the happy delivery of the Emperess of a Son.

The Abbot *Tellier* is suddenly expected here from his most Christian Majesty, having in his way been received by the several Princes through whose Countries he passed with extraordinary respect and Civility, and by particular Order treated on the publick account by the Governour of *Milan* during his stay in that State: A Palace is here prepared for him in the Street *Fulia*, and several Coaches with 6 horses, and a dozen Footmen to attend him.

The last night arrived at *Castel Gondolpho* about twelve of the nearest kindred of the Pope from *Pistoja*, with an hundred persons related and belonging to them, who are all of them treated upon the account of the Camers, and are to continue a month there before they enter into *Rome*, whither Cardinal *Chigi* is gone to complement them upon their arrival.

Legorn, Oct. 15. The 2. Instant arrived a Feluca of Naples from that place, who the Evening before discovered the Admirals Gally, and one other in her company of the Neapolitan Squadron, with a Barque, all of them full of Souldiers, putting into *Porto Longone*, intending to pass farther this way. The next day came in here a Tartan of *Finale* from *Palermo*, having in her way touched at *Givisa Vecchia*, where she took in some Souldiers which she is to carry to *Finale*. The 2d. instant she saw the two Naples Gallies putting out from *Porto Longone*, going in search after some French Privateers, but in their way had seized on a Ship belonging to this place, and sent her into *Porto Longone*, suspecting her to have been French, but upon farther Inquiry and Examination we find they dismiss her again the next day, with all her Cargo.

The 6. instant arrived here a French Barque with several sorts of goods in 50 dayes from *Millo*, where she left 5 Christian Privateers, two whereof belonging to this place, and three to *Maltha*: about 6 dayes since she passed by *Maltha*, where was arrived a Barque from the *Levant*, which informed that the Venetian Armata was then at *Staudia*, and the Turkish Gallies abut *Malvesia*; but the Turks endeavour to avoid all encounters at sea. That they had made violent assaults upon *Candia*, but in exchange the Marquis *Ville* had made a brisk sally upon them, with great execution; and that the Auxillary Gallies, with some other of the Venetians, had relieved the place with a considerable addition of men, and all sorts of necessaries: But by a Vessel arriving here in 27 dayes from *Candia* we are told that the Turks are more then ever intent upon the Conquest of that place, and had by their mines wholly ruined the Fort of *Panigra*, and were though with great slaughter of their men, got to the top of the Walls, where they were disputing their Entrance at their swords point.

The 10th Instant the News of the safe delivery of the Emperess was brought to the Great Duke at *Florence*, who immediately went in person to hear *Te Deum* in the *Domo*, which beginning, all the Cannon of the Citadel were discharged, and it ending, the Artillery of the Fortress in the Garden of his Palace proclaimed likewise that pleasing news. That Evening by his Highness Command, Bonfires were made through all the Streets, and this publick rejoicing ordered
