IT is hereby notified, that the Right Honourable the Earl of Aberdeen, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has received from General Sancho, the Spanish Minister at Her Majesty's Court, a circular dispatch from the Spanish Government, relative to the of Alicante and Carthagena by the forces of Her Catholick Majesty, to the following effect: "Whereas, it is one of the dispositions made by Her Majesty in a royal order of this date, for terminating as speedily as possible the criminal insurrection which has broken out at Alicante and Carthagena, that some ships of the military marine, and of the coast guard should establish the most rigorous blockade along the line comprehended between the two points; and whereas Her Majesty desires that, in the carrying out of this disposition with the exactitude and precision required by the mportance of its object, care should as much as possible be taken to avoid giving any molestation to national and foreign maritime commerce, as well as the prejudices that might result from any doubt as to the time, manner, and circumstances in which this blockade is to be understood, Her Majesty has thought proper to determine, in conformity with the opinion of the Council of Ministers, that the following rules shall be observed:

"1st. The blockade shall subsist only as long as necessary, and as the state of insurrection of those two cities may continue, and shall cease the moment that the empire of the law and obedience to the Government of Her Majesty shall be established in them.

2dly. During the blockade, the said ships shall prevent the entrance of vessels into those ports of whatsoever kind their cargo may be; detaining, nevertheless, those which carry warlike effects, in order to their being tried according to the laws.

"3dly It shall be lawful for foreign vessels, happening to be at the blockade points when the present disposition begins to be in force, to depart freely to their respective destinations.

"4thly. Every vessel which, after the declaration of the blockade, shall proceed to the said ports from ignorance of this determination, shall not be subject to any penal responsibility, unless it have been warned or advised.

"5thly. Those which have been warned, of the impossibility to enter the blockaded ports, shall be allowed to proceed to any other Spanish port, but effects of illicit commerce shall not be admitted or disembarked in them.

"6thly. Every vessel carrying warlike effects to the rebels, as well as every vessel knowingly violating the blockade, shall be a good prize.

- "7thly. The commanders of the blockading ships shall search the vessels for the purpose of preventing the introduction of the above effects, as also the escape of the leaders and agents of the rebellion; but they shall protect the flight of those who remain loyal.
- "8thly. It is to be understood, that the line blockaded, in virtue of the Royal Order of this date, is that comprehended between the port of Benidarme, exclusively, up to the river Almanzora, above Vera.

THE following is a copy of an Order of Her-Majesty in Council, assigning chapelry districts to the chapels of Saint Anne, at Tottington, and to All Saints, at Elton, in the parish of Bury, in the county of Lancaster, under the 16th section of the 59th Geo. 3., cap. 134:

At the Court at Windsor, the 13th of December 1843, present, the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fiftyeighth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that in every case in which the Com-

missioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto under his hand and seal; and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses, or other endowments which will by such division arise and accrue, and remain and be, within each of such respective divisions, and also the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits which may arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always, that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided;" and it is by the 21st section of the said Act further enacted, "that in any case in which the said Commissioners shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish, or extra parochial place, into such complete, separate, and distinct parishes as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts as they, with the consent of the bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending divine service, according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, to persons residing therein, in the churches and parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical super-intendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein, the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proposed to be described; and it, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division:"

And whereas by an Act, passed in the fiftyninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, in the same manner and with the like consents as are required in case of division into ecclesiastical districts under the said recited Act, or this Act, to assign a particular district to any chapel of ease or parochial chapel already existing, or to any chapel built, or which may hereafter be built or acquired under the powers of the said Act, or this Act; and such district shall be under the immediate care of the curate appointed to serve such chapel, but subject, nevertheless, to the superintendence and controul of the incumbent of the parish church; and all such curates shall be nominated by the incumbent of the parish to the bishop for his licence, except where the right of nomination shall already be legally vested in any other person or persons, and in every such case by the person or persons possessing such right of nomination, subject to all the laws in force relating to stipendiary curates, except as to the assigning of salaries to such curates; provided always, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, with the consent of the bishop of the diocese, to determine whether any and what part or proportion of the fees or dues for marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials shall be assigned to any such curate; and whether banns of marriage shall be published, and marriages or baptisms, churchings or burials, shall be solemnized or performed in any such chapel or not; and in any case in which marriages shall be allowed in any such chapel, the Commissioners shall cause the boundaries of the district assigned to such chapel to be enrolled in the High Court of Chancery, and in the office of the Registry of the diocese, any thing in the said recited Act to the contrary notwithstanding; and no such chapelry shall become a benefice by reason of any augmentation of the maintenance of the curate, by any grant or bounty under the provision of any Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws, for augmenting small livings, any thing in such Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws, to the contrary notwithstanding:"

And whereas by another Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and by another Act, made and passed in the first and second years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled 'An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and also by another Act, made and passed in the second and third years of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to render more effectual an

Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;'" further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect:

And whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to Her Majesty in Council, bearing date the eighth day of December one thousand eight hundred and forty-three, in the words following, viz.

- "Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, appointed by virtue of an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" continued by an Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and further continued by an Act, passed in the first year of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prolong, for ten years, Her Majesty's Commission for building new churches;" begleave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, when the last census was taken, the parish of Bury, in the county of Lancaster, and diocese of Chester, contained a population of sixty-two thousand one hundred and twenty-five persons:
- "That, besides the parish church, which affords accommodation to one thousand nine hundred persons, there are nine consecrated churches or chapels in the said parish, one of which, called St. Anne's Chapel, at Tottington, will afford accommodation to eight hundred and forty persons, including five hundred and seventeen free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; and another, called All Saints' Chapel, at Elton, which will afford accommodation to seven hundred and twenty persons, including three hundred free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; and that divine service is regularly performed in the said chapels respectively:
- "Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending this parish, it appears to them to be expedient, that particular districts should be assigned to each of the said chapels, under the provisions of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and that such districts should be named, respectively, "The Chapelry District of St. Anne, Tottington," and "The Chapelry District of All Saints, Elton," with boundaries as follow:

- " The chapelry district of Saint Anne, Tottington, is to consist of the southern part of the township of Tottington-lower-end (which town-ship now forms the chapelry of Holcorne); the boundary thereof to commence at a bound stone, placed a little to the north of a place called Eccles Wife; from which stone it proceeds in an easterly direction across the township of Tottington-lowerend, to another bound stone placed a little to the north of Crichley-fold; it then proceeds in a south easterly direction to a point in the three cross roads opposite to the Bull's Head public-house, and continues down the middle of the lane in a south easterly direction till it meets the boundary line which separates the township of Tottingtonlower-end from the township of Elton; and then pursues such boundary in a southerly, westerly, and north westerly direction, till it meets the boundary line of the township of Bradshaw, in the parish of Bolton; it then proceeds in a north westerly direction along the boundary line which separates the said township of Bradshaw, and parish of Bolton, from the township of Tottingtonlower-end, to the point where the boundary commenced at the stone placed near Eccles Wife, as is more particularly delineated by the map hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured yellow:
- "The district of All Saints, Elton, is to consist of that part of the township of Elton which lies on the west side of the river Irwell; and is bounded on the east by the river Irwell, on the north east, north, and north west by the township of Tottington-lower-end; on the west by the townships of Bradshaw and Harwood, both in the parish of Bolton; and on or towards the south west, and south, by the township of Ainsworth, in the parish of Middleton, and by the parish of Radcliffe, as is more particularly shewn by the map hereunto annexed, and thereon tinted red:
- "That marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized and performed in each of the said chapels of St. Anne, at Tottington, and All Saints, at Elton; and that the fees arising therefrom should, during the continuance of the present incumbency, be received by and belong to the Minister of the said parish of Bury, and, from and after the next avoidance of the said rectory, should be received by and belong to the respective Ministers of the said chapels:
- "That the consent of the Lord Bishop of Chester has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third; in testimony whereof, the said Lord Bishop has signed and sealed this present instrument:
- "Your Majesty's Commissioners, therefore, beg leave to lay before your Majesty the before-mentioned circumstances, and humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representa, tion, together with the map thereunto annexedinto consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignments be accordingly made, and the recommendations of the said Commissioners, in respect of the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

Pilot Station off the Mouth of the River Hooghley.

THE experience of a second season's trial of L the new pilot station off the South Channel having established that it can be made by vessels from False Point with the greatest facility, and that pilots can also be readily supplied, and the same causes existing which, during last south west monsoon, rendered necessary the removal of the pilot station from off Point Palmyras to a position about fifteen miles S.W. by W. of the outer floating light, in latitude 20° 56′ N., longitude 88° 03′ E., and in from seventeen to twentytwo fathoms water; notice is hereby given, that this latter station will in future be continued during the S. W. monsoon, viz. from 15th March to the 15th September.

No difficulty can possibly be felt in passing from False Point to the new station, if common attention be paid to the lead, and to the following directions prepared by Captain Lloyd, late officiating Marine Surveyor of the ground between the two points:

" False Point Light House is in latitude 20° 19½' N., and longitude 86° 47' E., and the South Channel Buoy in latitude 25° 59' N., and longitude 88° 4' E., and bears from the light house N. 61 E. true, or N. E. by E. ½ E., by compass, distant eighty-three miles, and is laid in twelve fathoms.

" A bank of soundings extends from off Point Palmyras, in a direction towards the tail of the Western Sea Reef; and the nature of the bottom (as distinguished from that of the Hooghley deposit, which is sand and mud, with shining specks) is a gravelly substance, composed of sand, shells, and small pebbles, discharged from the 'Kunka,' and other rivers near Point Palmyras; the lighter material of which being carried further out is deposited, and forms what is called the Pilot's Ridge, which in crossing to the N.W., shews a little less water than on either side; coming from seaward, you shoal rather suddenly from twentyeight to twenty-three fathoms upon its eastern edge. It is composed of a shelly sand, or minute gravel of a reddish or rusty brown colour.

" The best guide, therefore, to enable a vessel to direct her course from False Point to the vessel at the new station, will be to run down the edge of the Pilot's Ridge, which can readily be done by making the light house, and bringing it to bear about W. S. W., or S. W. by W., distant by computation from ten to fifteen miles; then steering to the E. N. E., and having gradually increased the depth of water to twenty-three fathoms upon the eastern edge of the ridge, regulate the course to keep between it and twenty-seven fathoms, when by attention to the lead, and nature of the soundings, course, and distance run from the light house. it is almost impossible to miss the pilot vessels (if the above limits are kept within), either by getting too far to windward or falling to leeward, for the soundings increase so rapidly to seaward from the proposed new station, that twenty-eight fathoms will not be more than three or four miles to the southward of it; and twenty-three fathoms the same distance to the westward of it.

" The soundings to seaward of the ridge are in general a greenish or olive coloured mud, with occasionally a few bits of broken shells mixed

with it."

Vessels approaching the station during the day are required to shew the usual signal for a pilot, and by night to give as early and as much warning as possible by firing guns, burning blue lights, and by exhibiting two lights in a vertical position where best seen; but commanders are strictly enjoined to avoid as much as possible making the station during the night.

To mark the station (until a proper light vessel is built, of which due notice will be given), one of the pilot vessels will show, during the day, a large St. George's Jack (white with red cross) at the main top gallant mast head, and a good mast head light during the night, and will burn a blue light and a maroon alternately every half hour, and fire a gun at eight P. M., at midnight, and at four A. M. Vessels approaching the station, and while there, as well as when approaching the light and buoy

station vessels, are warned to be careful in avoiding collision by night or by day, and in communicating with either of the above vessels, either at anchor or hove to, when it is necessary to cross her, to pass under the stern*; several instances of serious damage having occurred during the S. W. monsoon, whereby the outer floating light was more than once compelled to leave her station for repairs, to the great inconvenience and risk of vessels entering and quitting the river.
