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Genoa, May 2.

They write from Milan that the Count de Meigan, their Governour, has put the Troops of that Country into a very good posture; and that it's believed some of them will be sent to the assistance of the Emperor. We have advice that the Venetians have suffered some loss before Singu; and that the Senate hath resolved to make only a defensive War in Dalmatia and an offensive one by Sea. We have an account from Leghorn that four Gallies are fitting out there, which the Great Duke intends to send to the Levant with the Popes Gallies to joyne the Venetian Fleet.

Venice, April 21. The last Letters from Dalmatia gave an account, That the Proveditore General *Vallier* after having made himself Master of the Fort of *Cettina*, marched to attack *Singu*, where there was a Garrison of 500 Turks, That having posted his Troops round the place and raised several Batteries, he sent to Summon the Garrison, but that the Governour answered he was resolved to defend the place to the last, upon which the Venetians began to fire upon the Belieged, and employed their Cannon with that success, that having made large breaches in the Wall of the Town, the Enemy hung out a White flag; but a great body of Turks commanded by three Bassa's arriving before *Singu* at the time the Garrison was going to Capitulate, the Venetians were forced to retire in some haste and disorder with the loss of 200 men, two Pieces of Cannon, and part of their Baggage. This week 16 Vessels laden with Troops and Ammunition sailed for *Corsu* to joyn the Fleet. The 26th Instant 2600 men of the Troops of *Hanover* arrived at the *Lido*; They are put into quarters of refreshment, and are to embark in few days for *Dalmatia*. The Pyrates of *Dulcigno* have lately taken 3 or 4 Fisher Boats and some other small Vessels.

Vienna, April 26. The Articles of Marriage between the Elector of *Bavaria* and the Archduchess are all agreed; and his Electoral Highness's Ambassadors have thereupon had their publick Audience of the Emperor, the Emperess, and the Archduchess. We have advice from the Turkish Territories that the Turks intend to have a very great Army in *Hungary* this Summer; and that the Grand Signior will be in Person at the general Rendezvous near *Belgrade*, but that they will act only defensively on the side of *Polsatz* and *Dalmatia*. The Prince of *Hanover* is come into *Moravia* with the Troops under his command, where they are to go into quarters of refreshment for 10 or 14 days, and then they are to march towards *Nambusel*; which place will, it's believed, be formally Belieged before the end of the next month; all our advices confirm that the Turks there are in great want of Provisions.

Hamburg, May 6. The Differences between the Duke of *Zell* and this City are not yet composed, but the Negotiation is in such a state, that there is no reason to doubt the good success of it. We have an account from *Berlin*, that the Baron *Freytag*, the Emperors Minister at that Court, does sollicite a success of 7 or 8000 men against the Turks, which his Electoral Highness does not refuse, but proposes Con-

ditions which the Emperor does not very well like. They write from *Copenhagen* that the Count de *Roye* Marechal de Camp-General of the King of *Denmark's* Forces, was returned thither from *France*. And that The Kings journey to *Holfstein* is put off till towards the end of this Month. The Letters from *Warsaw* of the 13th past, told us, that the Dyet was prolonged for several days notwithstanding the opposition of some of the Deputies, and that it was believed it would be continued till *Easter*; That as yet they had not taken any resolutions concerning the War against the Turks, and that consequently there was not any preparations made for the Campagne, so that it was feared the King would be only able to act defensively this Summer.

Brussels, May 11. His Catholick Majesty has made four new Serjeants-General of Batallia, Count *Tilly de Serclaes*, the Baron *d'Autell*, Monsieur *de Preux*, and Monsieur *Salcedo*; And the first of these is going for *Hungary* with a Troop of a hundred reformed Officers to serve there this Campagne. They write from *Liege* of the 9th Instant, that the Electors Troops were to begin their march towards *Hungary* the next day. The Letters from *Vienna* of the 26th past tell us, that the Serajquier who commanded the Turkish Army in *Hungary* the last Campagne, is removed from that Command, and made Bassa of *Caminice*; and that the Bassa that defended *Buda* the last year is made Serajquier; And that the Turks pretend to have a great Army in *Hungary* this Summer.

Hague, May 18. The States of *Holland* and *West-Frizeland* re-assembled the 16th Instant; And it's believed they will now come to a resolution concerning the state of the War. The Sieur *Camprich* the Imperial Minister, has given in another Memorial to the States General, demanding payment of the Ar-rears of Subsidies that remain due to the Emperor. The Prince and Princess of *Orange* returned hither last Saturday from *Dieren*. And on Monday Prince *Cassimir* of *Nassau* Stadtholder of *Frizeland* arrived here from *Leeuwerden*.

Paris, May 9. On Friday last arrived here an Express from the Princes *de Conti* and *de la Roch-Sur-Ton*, by whom we understand, That they have changed their intension of going for *Hungary*, and that they are now resolved to pass the Campagne in the Venetian Army in *Dalmatia*. The Count de *Soissons*, it's said, is to command the Troops which the Duke of *Savoy* gives to that Republick. We have an account of the death of the Sieur de *Guilleragues*, Ambassador from this Crown at *Constantinople*, where he died suddenly.

Paris, May 16. Yesterday Signior *Francisco Maria Imperiale Lercaro*, Doge of *Genoa*, and the four Senators, Signior *Gianettino Garibaldi*, Signior *Ago-stino Lomellino*, Signior *Maria Salvago*, and Signior *Marcello Durazzo*, had Audience of the King being conducted by the Sieur de *Bonneuil* Introdutor of Ambassadors, (not having with them a Marechal of *France*, as was offered, because the Doge refused to give him the Hand in his own House.) They were carried to *Versailles* in the Coaches of the King and the Dauphines, followed by two of the Doges own Coaches (which were very magnificent, the first being drawn by eight Horses) two of the Senators, one of the Genouesse Minister residing here, and a numerous Train
