THE following is a copy of an Order of Her Majesty in Council, altering the boundaries (assigned by an Order in Council of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, bearing date the 6th of November 1832) of St. John's District, in the parish of Paddington, in the county of Middlesex, under the 6th section of the 3d and 4th Victoria, cap. 60 :

At the Court at Buckingham-Palace, the 31st of January 1844, present, the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto under his hand and seal ; and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses, or other endowments which will by such division arise and accrue, and remain and be, within each of such respective divisions, and also the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits which may arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions ; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division ; provided always, that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided ;" and it is by the 21st section of the said Act further enacted, "that in any case in which the said Commissioners shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish, or extra parochial place, into such complete, separate, and distinct parishes as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts as they, with the consent of the bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending divine ser-

vice, according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, to persons residing therein, in the churches and parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein, the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proposed to be described ; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division :"

And whereas by an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, in the same manner and with the like consents as are required in case of division into ecclesiastical districts under the said recited Act, or this Act, to assign a particular district to any chapel of ease or parochial chapel already existing, or to any chapel built, or which may hereafter be built or acquired under the powers of the said Act, or this Act, and such district shall be under the immediate care of the curate appointed to serve such chapel, but subject, nevertheless, to the superintendence and controul of the incumbent of the parish church ; and all such curates shall be nominated by the incumbent of the parish to the bishop for his licence, except where the right of nomination shall already be legally vested in any other person or persons, and in every such case by the person or persons possessing such right of nomination, subject to all the laws in force relating to stipendiary curates, except as to the assigning of salaries to such curates ; provided always, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, with the consent of the bishop of the diocese, to determine whether any and what part or proportion of the fees or dues for marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials shall be assigned to any such curate ; and whether banns of marriage shall be published, and marriages or baptisms, churchings or burials, shall be solemnized or performed in any such chapel or not ; and in any case in which marriages shall be allowed in any such chapel, the Commissioners shall cause the boundaries of the district assigned to such chapel to be enrolled in the High Court of Chancery, and in the office of the Registry of the diocese, any thing in the said recited Act to the contrary notwithstanding ; and no such chapelry shall become a benefice by reason of any augmentation of the maintenance of the curate, by any grant or bounty

under the provision of any Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws, for augmenting small livings, any thing in such Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws, to the contrary notwithstanding :

And whereas by another Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes ;" and by another Act, made and passed in the first and second years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled 'An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes ;'" and also by another Act, made and passed in the second and third years of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to render more effectual an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes ;'" further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect :

And whereas by another Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the third and fourth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to further amend the Church Building Acts," after reciting, that whereas by the said recited Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, it was provided, that by an Order in Council, upon the representation of the said Commissioners, made with the consent of the bishop of the diocese, the boundaries of a distinct and separate parish, or of a district parish formed under the said Act, might be altered within five years after a description of such boundaries had been enrolled in the High Court of Chancery, and that it was expedient that the power of altering such boundaries should be enlarged, with certain consents, it was, amongst other things, enacted, "that if Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of the said Commissioners, made with the consents of the bishop of the diocese, and of the patron and incumbent of the parish church, signified under their respective hands and seals, should think fit to alter the boundaries of a distinct and separate parish, or a district parish, or a district chapelry (formed under the hereinbefore-mentioned Acts, passed in the fifty-eighth and fifty-ninth years of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, or either of them), at any time after five years from the time the description of such boundaries had been enrolled in the High Court of Chancery, such Order in Council should be good and valid in law for the purpose of effecting such alteration, any thing in the said recited Act, of the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, limiting the power of making such alteration in such boundaries to five

years, from the time the description of such boundaries had been enrolled in the High Court of Chancery," to the contrary notwithstanding, and such Order in Council should be enrolled and registered in the manner directed by the said last-mentioned Acts :

And whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to Her Majesty in Council, bearing date the seventeenth day of January one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, in the words following, viz.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, appointed by virtue of an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes ;" continued by an Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes ;" and further continued by an Act, passed in the first year of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prolong, for ten years, Her Majesty's Commission for building new churches ;" beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-two, your Majesty's said Commissioners made a representation to His late Majesty King William the Fourth in Council, stating that, in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-one, when the last census was taken, the parish of Paddington, in the county of Middlesex and diocese of London, contained a population of fourteen thousand five hundred and forty persons: that there was, besides the parish church, only one consecrated chapel in the said parish, which was built by your Majesty's said Commissioners, and was called Saint John's Chapel: that the parish church afforded accommodation for five hundred persons, of which fifty were free; and the said chapel for one thousand five hundred persons, of which five hundred and thirty-three were free; and that divine service was regularly performed therein: that your Majesty's said Commissioners further represented to His said late Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending this parish, it appeared to them expedient, that a particular district should be assigned to the said chapel called Saint John's Chapel, under the provisions of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His said Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes ;" and that such district should be named Saint John's District, with boundaries as follows: Saint John's District—the boundary to commence in the centre of the road called the Edgeware-road, where the parish of Paddington joins the parishes of Saint Mary-le-bone and Saint George's, Hanover-square, Westminster, and to proceed northward along the centre of the said road as far as the street called Præd-street; thence

to proceed westward to the east end of the basin of the Grand Junction-canal, and along the south side of the basin to its junction with the canal; thence southward, along the east side of the canal, to the termination thereof; thence westward, in a straight line, running along the centre of a proposed road, to be called Bayswater Brook-road, as far as the brook called Bayswater-brook; thence southward, along the east side of the said brook, to the centre of the road called the Uxbridge-road; and thence to return eastward, along the centre of the Uxbridge-road, to the south west corner of Saint George's Burial-ground; and thence round the outside of the said burial-ground, re-entering the Uxbridge-road at the east end of Saint George's-terrace; thence to proceed eastward, along the centre of the Uxbridge-road, to the centre of the Edgeware-road, where the parish of Paddington joins the parishes of Saint Mary-le-bone and Saint George, Hanover-square, Westminster, at which place the boundary commenced, the whole of which is more particularly described in the accompanying map of the parish of Paddington, and is surrounded with a red line :

"That the consent of the Lord Bishop of London had been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, and humbly praying that His Majesty would be graciously pleased to take the premises into His royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to His Majesty should seem meet. Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty, that by an Order of His said late Majesty King William the Fourth in Council, bearing date the sixth day of November one thousand eight hundred and thirty-two, His Majesty, having taken the said representation into consideration, together with the map thereunto annexed, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it was thereby ordered, that the proposed division should be accordingly made and effected, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts :

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty, that a description of the boundaries of the said district was enrolled in your Majesty's High Court of Chancery, in the month of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-two :

"That a new church, called Saint James's, has been lately built by your Majesty's said Commissioners within the said district so as aforesaid assigned to the said chapel called Saint John's Chapel, in the said parish of Paddington :

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances relating to the said parish of Paddington, and the said district which was so assigned to the said chapel called Saint John's Chapel, it appears to them to be expedient, that the boundaries of such district should be altered, under the provisions of the sixth section of an Act, passed in the session of the third and fourth years of your Majesty's

reign, intituled "An Act to further amend the Church Building Acts;" and that such altered district should be named Saint John's District, Paddington, with boundaries as follow : the boundary to commence in the centre of the road called the Edgeware-road, where the parish of Paddington joins the parishes of Saint Mary-le-bone and Saint George, Hanover-square, Westminster, and to proceed northward along the centre of the said road as far as the street called Praed-street; then to proceed westward to the east end of the basin of the Grand Junction-canal, and along the south side of the basin to the boundary wall between the wharfs numbers ten and eleven; thence southerly along the said boundary wall as far as South Wharf-road, which it crosses, and thence proceeds south, along the middle of Cambridge-place, Somers-street, and Radnor-place, including all the houses on the easternmost sides thereof, to Gloucester-square; thence to proceed west, along the south side of that square, including all the houses on the south side thereof, as far as the middle of the street at the north west entrance of Hyde Park-square; thence to proceed by an imaginary line, drawn in a southerly direction across the said square, to the middle of Clarendon-place, down the centre of which it proceeds to the Uxbridge-road, and then returns eastward, along the centre of the Uxbridge-road, to the south west corner of Saint George's Burial-ground; and thence round the outside of the said burial ground, re-entering the Uxbridge-road at the east end of Saint George's-terrace; thence to proceed eastward, along the centre of the Uxbridge-road, to the centre of the Edgeware-road, where the parish of Paddington joins the parishes of Saint Mary-le-bone and Saint George's, Hanover-square, Westminster, at which place the boundary commenced, the whole of which is more particularly described in the accompanying map, and thereon coloured red :

"And Her Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty, that it is expedient that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should continue to be performed in such chapel of Saint John; and that the fees arising therefrom should be received and paid to the present incumbent of the parish of Paddington, during his incumbency; and that, from and after the next avoidance of the living of Paddington, such fees should belong and be paid to the Minister of the said chapel of Saint John: that the consents of the Lord Bishop of London (as the patron and ordinary of the said parish church of Paddington) and of the Reverend Archibald Montgomery Campbell (as the incumbent of the said parish church of Paddington) have been respectively obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of an Act, passed in the session of the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign; in testimony whereof, the said Lord Bishop, as such patron and ordinary, and the said Archibald Montgomery Campbell, as such incumbent, have respectively signed and sealed this present instrument :

"Your Majesty's Commissioners, therefore, beg leave to lay before your Majesty the before-mentioned circumstances, and humbly pray that your

Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your royal wisdom, shall seem meet."

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the premises into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of the said representation, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the recommendations of the said Commissioners therein contained be carried into effect, and that the proposed alteration of the boundaries of the said district chapelry of Saint John, Paddington, be made and effected pursuant to the provisions of the said Acts.
