The following Address hath been presented to his Majesty, who received it very Graciously.

To the Kings most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Consul and Merchants residing in the City of Lubon.

Most Gracious and Dread Sovereign,

**W**E your Majesties most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects do with all thankfulness render to Almighty God our Praises for his great mercies vouchsafed to our Nation in placing your Majesty upon the Throne of your Fathers, maugre all the wicked attempts of some bad men that would have opposed it; A mercy to be remembered to all Posterity, that after it pleased Almighty God (who hath the hearts of all men in his Hands) to take our late Sovereign from us, under whose Government for many years we enjoy'd such abundance of his Blessings both Spiritual and Temporal, as no Nation under Heaven could equal; A loss never enough to be lamented; Yet blessed be his holy Name that hath wiped the Tears from our Eyes, and made us to see Joy and Gladness in our Land, by your Majesties Rightful and happy Succession, under whose blessed Government, if we by our Obedience seek Peace, we cannot doubt but that both Peace, Righteousness and Plenty will flourish in all your Majesties Dominions, and we shall still be the happiest People upon Earth.

Great SIR, In all humility according to the Duty of Faithful and Loyal Subjects, we thus presume to joyn in the Universal Acclamations of our fellow Subjects, prostrating our selves, our Lives and Fortunes at Your sacred feet, with resolution always to be ready to our Duties in the defence of Your Royal Person, Your Rights and Prerogatives against all pretences whatsoever,

And we humbly implore at the Throne of Grace, that God will give your Majesty the Mercies he swore to David, that your Posterity may endure for ever, and Your Throne as the days of Heaven.

There have been likewise presented to his Majesty very Loyal Addresses from the Bishop, the Dean and Chapter, and Clergy of the Church and Diocess of St. Asaph. From the Bishop and Clergy of the Diocess of Landaffe. And from the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen and Capital Burgeses and other Gentlemen, Freemen and Inhabitants of the Borough of Stamford, which his Majesty received very graciously.

Vienna, April 29. The Bassa's of Buda and Agria are drawing all the Troops they can together to succour *Nembeusel*, for which purpose 10000 men are already in a body near *Buda*; To prevent their design Colonel *Heuster* has posted himself near *Lewents*, having with him about 9000 men reckoning the Troops of *Hungary* commanded by Count *Palfi*; And he has sent an Express hither to desire a speedy reinforcement; Upon which orders have been sent to the Troops of *Zell*, *Hanouer* and *Wolfembussel*, who make together 10000 men; and are now in quarters of refreshment in *Moravia*, to stay there but eight days, and then to march towards *Lewentz* to joyn Colonel *Heuster*: And 1000 Bavarians, who passed the last week by this place going for *Hungary*, have likewise orders to joyn him. We have advice that the Troops of *Croatia* have made an Incurision into the Turkish Territories, and that they have plundered and burnt the little Town of *Buzin* and several Bourgs and Villages, and that they are returned with a great number of Prisoners and a very considerable Booty. We have not lately had any certain news of Count *Teckelej*, but the general report is, that he is retired with his Wife and Children to *Thourne*, where he expects succor from the Turks. The 25th Instant the Baron *de Leydel*, Count *Fug-*

*ger*, and the Baron *de Berghem* Ambassadors Extraordinary from the Elector of *Bavaria*, had publick Audience of the Emperor to demand the Archduchess *Mary* in Marriage for his Electoral Highness, after which they had Audience of the Archduchess who was accompanied with a great many Ladies of the first Quality and the Prince of *Dietrichstein*, Great Master of the Emperor's Household, and other the principal Ministers of this Court. The Ambassadors having made their Compliment to the Archduchess and prayed her to give her consent to the demand they came from making to his Imperial Majesty, She answered, That She would follow the Will of the Emperor; Whereupon the Ambassadors having given her thanks, presented her in the Name of his Electoral Highness, with a Jewel, a Ring, and Necklace of Pearl to a great value. In the Evening there was a Ball and Comedy at Court, to which his Electoral Highness's Ambassadors with the other Foreign Ministers were invited. The Emperor, the Empress, and the Archduchess have since been Complimented by all the Foreign Ministers residing here, and the fourth of *June* is appointed for the Celebration of the Marriage. The Duke of *Lorraine* parted from hence the 26th Instant to accompany the Queen his Wife to *Insprucke*.

Ratisbonne, May 1. The Bishop of *Passaw*, whom the Emperor has nominated to be his Principal Commissioner at the Dyet, is expected here the next week, his Baggage being already arrived. The 29th past 2000 men of the Troops which the Electors of *Mentz* and of *Trier* and the City of *Cologne* send to the Emperor's assistance, arrived here: They came by Water from *Vim* commanded by the Count *de Daun*, and having refreshed themselves in this City, they continued their way in the same manner towards *Hungary*. The Envoy from the Duke of *Zell* hath sent from hence nine Vessels laden with Ammunition and Provisions for the service of the Troops with which that Prince does assist his Imperial Majesty. The Troops of *Suabia*, *Franconia*, and the Upper *Rhin* having not yet begun their march.

Brussels, May 20. The Letters from *Liege* of the 17th Instant give us an account, that the Elector of *Cologne's* Troops began their march the day before towards *Hungary*, being to pass through the Dutchy of *Limburg*. The Marquis *de Grana* is gone with the whole Court to *Marimont*, where they will stay a month or six weeks. The Marquis *de Bedmar*, General of the Artillery, parted from hence this day on his journey for *Spain*. The Letters from *Vienna* of the 30th past tell us, That Colonel *Heuster* had taken 400 head of Cattle designed for the relief of *Nembeusel*, the Garrison whereof was reduced to that necessity that they had begun to send out of the Town all persons that were unfit to bear Arms.

Marseilles, May 14. The Duke *de Mortemar* is expected here this Evening from *Paris*, to command the Gallies which as well as the Men of War and Galliot with Mortar Pieces, fitted at *Toulon*, are now ready to sail. This week the Envoy of *Argiers* returned hither from *Paris* with an Order for the releasement of the Algerine Captives that remain in the French Gallies, which was accordingly performed, and a Man of War from *Toulon* is appointed to carry them home.

His Majesty has been likewise pleased in consideration of the Faithful Services of the Right Honorable John Lord Churchill of Eyemouth in Scotland, Gentleman of his Majesties Bedchamber, to grant him the Title and Dignity of a Baron of this Kingdom, by the Name and Style of Baron Churchill of Sandridge in the County of Hartford.

His Majesty graciously considering the great Services which the Right Honorable Sir George Jeffries Knight and Baronet, Lord Chief Justice of England, has rendered the Crown, and his firm and unshaken Duty and Fidelity to the late King of ever blessed Memory, and to his Majesty in the time of greatest Difficulty, has been pleased to confer upon him the Title and Dignity of a Baron of this Kingdom, by the Name and Style of Baron Jeffries of Wem in the County of Salop.

The Baron de Kgtlaer Envoy from the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel, and the Baron de Velbrucke Envoy from the Duke of Newburgh, have had Audience of her Majesty and of the Queen Dowager, conducted by Sir Charles Cotterel.

Westminster, May 16. Titus Otes, who was Convicted on the 8th and 9th Instant upon two several Indictments of Perjury, being this day brought to the Kings-Bench-Bar, the Court awarded Judgment against him as follows, That he shall be divested of his Canonical Habit for ever, That on Monday next he be carried round Westminster-Hall with a Paper on his Head declaring his Offence in these Words, Titus Otes Convicted upon full Evidence for two Horrid Perjuries, And that afterwards he stand in the Pillory before Westminster-Hall Gate, and on Tuesday before the Royal Exchange, That on Wednesday he be Whipt from Aldgate to Newgate by the Common Hangman, and on Friday following from Newgate to Tyburn, That he stand in the Pillory on every 24th of April during his Life before Tyburn, on every 9th of August in the Palace-Yard at Westminster, on every 10th of August at Charing-Cross, on every 11th of August at Temple-Bar, and on every second of September before the Royal-Exchange, unless any of these days happen to be Sunday and then on the day following; That he pay a Fine of 1000 Marks for each Perjury, and that he suffer Imprisonment during his Life.
