WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues;" duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of March one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, in the words and figures following, that is to say :

" We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues;" have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for making better provision for the cure of souls in certain parishes.

" Whereas it is by the said Act enacted, with an especial view to the better care of populous parishes, that arrangements may, from time to time, be made by the authority therein provided for improving the value or making a better provision for the spiritual duties of ill-endowed

parishes or districts, by means of such alterations in the exercise of patronage as may be agreed upon by patrons, with the consent of the bishop :

" And whereas the benefices or churches, mentioned and described in the schedule hereunto annexed, are all situate in populous parishes; but, being respectively in the patronage of the patron or patrons named in the sixth column of the said schedule, they are not within the provisions of the several Orders of your Majesty in Council respecting grants in augmentation of benefices and churches out of the monies in our hands under the said recited Act, so far as such provisions relate to unconditional grants; and, in order to bring them within such provisions, the said patrons respectively desire to transfer such their patronage as hereinafter mentioned :

" We, therefore, recommend and propose, with the consent of the bishops of the respective dioceses, and of such present patrons respectively, and also with the consent of the proposed patrons respectively named in the seventh column of the same schedule (in testimony whereof all the said consenting parties have signed and sealed this scheme), that the patronage of and right of nomination or presentation to such benefices and churches shall respectively become and be transferred to and absolutely vested in such proposed patrons so named in the said seventh column, and their respective successors for ever :

" And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measure for making better provision for the cure of souls within the said parishes, or otherwise, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Act."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrars of the several dioceses of Winchester, Chester, Lichfield, and Ripon.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by a certain Act of Parliament made and passed in the session of Parliament holden in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the better government of Her Majesty's subjects resorting to China," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by any Order or Orders made, with the advice of Her Majesty's Privy Council, to ordain for the government of Her Majesty's subjects, being within the dominions of the Emperor of China, or being within any ship or vessel at a distance of not more than one hundred miles from the coast of China, any law or ordinance which to Her Majesty in Council may seem meet, as fully and effectually as any such law or ordinance could be made by Her Majesty in Council for the government of Her Majesty's subjects being within the island of Hong Kong:

And whereas by a certain other Act of Parliament, made and passed in the session of Parliament holden as aforesaid, intituled "An Act to remove doubts as to the exercise of power and jurisdiction by Her Majesty within divers countries and places out of Her Majesty's dominions, and to render the same more effectual," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that it is and shall be lawful for Her Majesty to hold, exercise, and enjoy any power or jurisdiction which Her Majesty now hath, or may at any time hereafter have, within any country or place out of Her Majesty's dominions, in the same and as ample a manner as if Her Majesty had acquired such power or jurisdiction by the cession or conquest of territory:

And whereas Her Majesty hath power and jurisdiction in the dominions of the Emperor of China; now, therefore, in pursuance of the above recited Acts, or either of them, Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and is hereby ordered, that Her Majesty's Consuls and Vice-Consuls resident within the said dominions, or such other persons, as by warrant under the hand and seal of the Chief

Superintendent of the trade of Her Majesty's subjects in China for the time being, shall be appointed to act provisionally as Consuls or Vice-Consuls, shall severally, in the districts within which they may respectively be appointed to reside, have and hold all necessary power and authority to exercise jurisdiction over British subjects within such districts as aforesaid, for the repression and punishment of crimes and offences by them committed within the dominions of the Emperor of China, and for the arrangement and settlement of all and all manner of differences, contentions, suits, and variances that may or shall happen to arise between them, or any of them; and shall moreover have power and authority, as far as in them lies, to compose and settle all and all manner of differences, contentions, suits, and variances that may or shall happen to arise between British subjects and the subjects of the Emperor of China, and between British subjects and the subjects of any foreign power, and which may be brought before them for settlement:

And whereas, by the above first recited Act, it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by any commission or commissions under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom, or by any instructions under Her Majesty's signet and sign manual accompanying and referred to in any such commission or commissions, to authorize the Superintendent of the trade of Her Majesty's subjects in China (so long as such Superintendent shall be also Governor of the island of Hong Kong) to enact, with the advice of the Legislative Council of the said island of Hong Kong, all such laws and ordinances as may from time to time be required for the peace, order, and good government of Her Majesty's subjects, being within the dominions of the Emperor of China, or being within any ship or vessel at a distance of not more than one hundred miles from the coast of China, and to enforce the execution of such laws and ordinances by such penalties and forfeitures as to him, by the advice aforesaid, shall seem fit; and whereas Her Majesty has been pleased to grant such commission as aforesaid to John Francis Davis, Esq. appointed by Her Majesty Superintendent of the trade of Her subjects in China, or the Superintendent for the time being of such trade:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that Her Majesty's Consuls and Vice-Consuls in China, or any persons acting provisionally as such Consuls or Vice-Consuls as aforesaid, shall, in the exercise of the jurisdiction granted unto them by this present Order, be governed by such laws and ordinances in that behalf as may be enacted in the manner and form aforesaid by the Superintendent of the trade of Her Majesty's subjects in China for the time being, being the Governor of Hong Kong; and in further exercise of the powers in Her Majesty vested by the above-recited Act, for "removing doubts as to the exercise of power and jurisdiction by Her Majesty within divers places out of Her dominions, and for rendering the same more effectual," Her Majesty is

pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to appoint the colony of Hong Kong as the British colony wherein crimes and offences committed by British subjects within the dominions of the Emperor of China, which it may be expedient should be inquired of, tried, determined, and punished within Her Majesty's dominions, shall be so inquired of, tried, determined, and punished, and that Her Majesty's Consuls, Vice-Consuls, or other persons provisionally acting as such, under warrant from the Chief Superintendent of British trade in China as aforesaid, shall have authority to cause any British subject, charged with the commission of any crime or offence the cognizance whereof may at any time appertain to them, or any of them, to be sent for trial to the said colony of Hong Kong; and it is further ordered, that the Chief Justice of the colony of Hong Kong for the time being, or other person provisionally acting as such, shall, when duly required by the said Superintendent, proceed to the dominions of the Emperor of China, and shall have power and authority, within the said dominions, to inquire of, try, determine, and punish any crimes or offences committed by British subjects within the said dominions :

And the Right Honourable the Earl of Aberdeen, and the Right Honourable Lord Stanley, two of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

Rear Admiral of the Blue Squadron of Her Majesty's Fleet; the Honourable William Gordon, Captain in Her Majesty's Navy; and the Right Honourable Henry Thomas Lowry Corry, to be Her Majesty's Commissioners for executing the office of High Admiral of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and the dominions, islands, and territories thereunto belonging.

This day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by Her Majesty, for declaring Her Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read*; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for raising the sum of eighteen millions four hundred and seven thousand three hundred pounds, by Exchequer Bills, for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-four.

An Act to amend the law relating to international copyright.

An Act to extend, until the first day of January one thousand eight hundred and forty-five, and to the end of the then next session of Parliament, the time within which conveyances may be made on behalf of the Crown of, and disputes settled with regard to, encroachments in the Forest of Dean.

An Act to effectuate the sale, by the Bolton and Preston Railway Company, of their railway and other property and effects to the North Union Railway Company, to incorporate with such last-mentioned company the proprietors of the Bolton and Preston Railway, and to consolidate shares into stock.

An Act to amend the several Acts relating to the Great Western, the Cheltenham, and Great Western Union and Oxford Railways, to amalgamate the two last-mentioned railways with the Great Western Railway, and to authorize the formation of additional works, at Cheltenham, by the Great Western Railway Company.

An Act for making a railway from Norwich to Brandon, with a branch to Thetford.

An Act for making a railway from the London and South Western Railway to Guildford, in the county of Surrey.

An Act to enable the Eastern Counties Railway Company to make a railway from the Northern and Eastern Railway, at Newport, by Cambridge to Ely, and from thence, eastward, to Brandon, and, westward, to Peterborough.

An Act for maintaining a railway from the Manchester and Leeds Railway to Heywood, and for amending the Acts relating to the Manchester and Leeds Railway.

THE following is a copy of an Order of Her Majesty in Council, assigning a district chapelry to St. Peter's Chapel, in the parish of St. Andrew, Newcastle-on-Tyne, in the county of Northumberland, under the 16th section of the 59th Geo. 3, cap. 134:

At the Court at Buckingham-Palace, the 4th of March 1844, present, the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto under his hand and seal; and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses, or other endowments which will by such division arise and accrue, and remain and be, within each of such respective divisions, and also the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits which may arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always, that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided;" and it is by the 21st section of the said Act further enacted, "that in any case in which the said Commissioners shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish, or extra parochial place, into such complete, separate, and distinct parishes as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts as they, with the consent of the bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending divine service, according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, to persons residing therein,

in the churches and parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein, the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proposed to be described; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division:"

And whereas by an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, in the same manner and with the like consents as are required in case of division into ecclesiastical districts under the said recited Act, or this Act, to assign a particular district to any chapel of ease or parochial chapel already existing, or to any chapel built, or which may hereafter be built or acquired under the powers of the said Act, or this Act; and such district shall be under the immediate care of the curate appointed to serve such chapel, but subject, nevertheless, to the superintendence and controul of the incumbent of the parish church; and all such curates shall be nominated by the incumbent of the parish to the bishop for his licence, except where the right of nomination shall already be legally vested in any other person or persons, and in every such case by the person or persons possessing such right of nomination, subject to all the laws in force relating to stipendiary curates, except as to the assigning of salaries to such curates; provided always, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, with the consent of the bishop of the diocese, to determine whether any and what part or proportion of the fees or dues for marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials shall be assigned to any such curate; and whether banns of marriage shall be published, and marriages or baptisms, churchings or burials, shall be solemnized or performed in any such chapel or not; and in any case in which marriages shall be allowed in any such chapel, the Commissioners shall cause the boundaries of the district assigned to such chapel to be enrolled in the High Court of Chancery, and in the office of the Registry of the diocese, any thing in the said recited Act to the contrary notwithstanding; and no such chapelry shall become a benefice by reason of any augmentation of the maintenance of the curate, by any grant or bounty under the provision of any Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws, for augmenting small

livings, any thing in such Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws, to the contrary notwithstanding :

And whereas by another Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled " An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes ;" and by another Act, made and passed in the first and second years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled " An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled ' An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes ;' " and also by another Act, made and passed in the second and third years of His said late Majesty, intituled " An Act to render more effectual an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled ' An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes ;' " further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect :

And whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to Her Majesty in Council, bearing date the seventeenth day of February one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, in the words following, viz.

" Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, appointed by virtue of an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled " An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes ;" continued by an Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled " An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes ;" and further continued by an Act, passed in the first year of your Majesty's reign, intituled " An Act to prolong, for ten years, Her Majesty's Commission for building new churches ;" beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, when the last census was taken, the parish of St. Andrew, Newcastle-upon-Tyne, in the county of Northumberland, and diocese of Durham, contained a population of seventeen thousand seven hundred and fifty-three persons :

" That, besides the parish church, which affords accommodation to one thousand four hundred and eighty persons, there are two consecrated chapels in the said parish, one of which, called St. Peter's, and built partly by a grant from your Majesty's said Commissioners, affords accommodation to one thousand one hundred and thirty-four persons, including six hundred and fifty free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; and that divine service is regularly performed therein :

" Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty, that, having

At the Court at Buckingham-Palace, the 31st of January 1844, present, the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto under his hand and seal; and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses, or other endowments which will by such division arise and accrue, and remain and be, within each of such respective divisions, and also the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits which may arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always, that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided;" and it is by the 21st section of the said Act further enacted, "that in any case in which the said Commissioners shall be

of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish, or extra parochial place, into such complete, separate, and distinct parishes as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts as they, with the consent of the bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending divine service, according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, to persons residing therein, in the churches and parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein, the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proposed to be described; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division:"

And whereas by an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, in the same manner and with the like consents as are required in case of division into ecclesiastical districts under the said recited Act, or this Act, to assign a particular district to any chapel of ease or parochial chapel already existing, or to any chapel built, or which may hereafter be built or acquired under the powers of the said Act, or this Act; and such district shall be under the immediate care of the curate appointed to serve such chapel, but subject, nevertheless, to the superintendence and controul of the incumbent of the parish church; and all such curates shall be nominated by the incumbent of the parish to the bishop for his licence, except where the right of nomination shall already be legally vested in any other person or persons, and in every such case by the person or persons possessing such right of nomination, subject to all the laws in force relating to stipendiary curates, except as to the assigning of salaries to such curates; provided always, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, with the consent of the bishop of the diocese, to determine whether any and what part or proportion of the fees or dues for marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials shall be assigned to any such curate; and whether banns of marriage shall be published, and marriages or baptisms, churchings or burials, shall be solemnized or performed in any such chapel or not; and in any case in which marriages shall be allowed in any

such chapel, the Commissioners shall cause the boundaries of the district assigned to such chapel to be enrolled in the High Court of Chancery, and in the office of the Registry of the diocese, any thing in the said recited Act to the contrary notwithstanding; and no such chapelry shall become a benefice by reason of any augmentation of the maintenance of the curate, by any grant or bounty under the provision of any Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws, for augmenting small livings, any thing in such Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws, to the contrary notwithstanding."

And whereas by another Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and by another Act, made and passed in the first and second years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled 'An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;'" and also by another Act, made and passed in the second and third years of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to render more effectual an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;'" further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect:
