HIS Majefly being come yesterday into the House of Lords and Seated on His Throne in his Róyal Robes, the Black Rod was tent to re quire the immediate attendance of the House of Commons, who being come up, His Majefly made a most Gracious Speech to both Houses of Parliament, as follows:

My Lords and Gentlemen,



Fier it pleafed Almigbty God to take to bin Mercy the late King, my Dearest Brother, and to bring Me to the Peaceable Poffeffion of the Throne of My Anceflors : I immediately Réfolved to Call a Parliament, as the best Means to Settle every Thing upon

thole Foundations that may make my Reign both Eafle and Happy to you, towards which I am Difposed to Contribute all that is Fit for Me to do; What I faid to My Privy Council at My first Coming there, I am destrout to Re-new to you; Wherein I fully Declared My Opinion con-cerning the Principles of the Church of Figland, whose Members have shemel there to Eminently Loyal in the World of Times, In Defence of my Fisher and Jupport of My Brother, of Bleffed Microry, This I will always tike Care to Defend and Support it: 1 will make it My Endeavour to Preferve this Government both in Church and State, as it is now by Law Established; and as \hat{I} , will never Depart' from the Fush Rights and Prerogative of the Crown, So I will never Invide any Mans Preperty; And you may be sure. That beding beretofore Ventured My Life in the Defence of this Nation, I shall still Go as far as any Man in Pre-ferving it in all its fust Rights and Liberties. And baving Given you this Affurance, concerning the Care I will have of your Religion and Property, which I have chosen to do in the fame Words I ujed at My first Coming to the Crown, the hetter to Evidence is your that I spoke Them not by charter and tonfequently, That you may the more Firmly Rely upon a Promife fo Solemniy Made; I cannot Doubt that I shall fall of Sultable Returns from you, with all imigliable Duty and Kindneys on your Puts! and parti-cularly, in what relates to the Settling of my Revenue, and cularly, in whit relates to be Settling of my K-venue, and Continuing it during My Life, as it was in the Time of the King MJ Brother ! I might Use many Arguments to En-force this Demand from the Benefit of Trades The Sup port of the Navy. The Neverity of the Cown, and the Well being of the Guvernment it self, which they inos fuffer to be Precarious. But I am aonfident, your own Confideration of which is Full and Readable, will Sup Conjustation of what is full and head about the source of convenient; And this Argument, It being the First Time I Speak to you from the Throme, I will answer Once for All : That this wou d be a very improper Method to Take with Me, and, That the best Way to Engage Me to Meet you Oftenis, Always to Use Me Well; I Expect there-

fore, That you will Comply with the in what I have Defired, and, That you will Do st speedily, That the may be a foort Seffion, and That We may Meet again to all Our Sariefastions.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I must acquaint jou, That I have bud News this Morning from Scotla: d, That Argile is Landed in the Welt High-Lands, with the Men be brought with him from Holland, and that there are two Declarations Published, one in the Name of all those in Arms there, the other in his own; it would be too long for Me to Repeat the Substance of them, it is sufficient to tell you I am Charged with Usurpation and Tyranny? The shorter of them I have Directed to be forthwith Communicated to you; I will take the best Care I can that this Declaration of their own Treason and Rebellion may meet with the Reward it deserves, and I will not doubt but that you all will be the more Zealous to Support the Government, and give Me My Revenue, as I have Defired it without Delay.

The Commons being returned to their Houle; The first thing the two Houles did was to resolve to return their most Humble and hearty thanks to His Majesty for his most Gracious Speech and Declaration. And the Houle of Commons taking into confideration that part of His Majesties Speech which relates to the Revenue, Resolved, Nemine Contradicente, That the Revenue which was granted to the late King, be fetted on his present Majesty for bis Life, and that a Bill should be brought in for that purpose.

In the afternoon the two Houles attended His Majefty in a Body in the Banquetting Houle at *Whitehall* to return their I hanks to His Majefty.

This day the Houle of Lords refolved to make the following Address to His Majefly.

His Majesty baving graciously imparted to this House, That be is informed that the late Earl of Argule attainted of Treason, with divers other Rebels are Landed in Scotland, and are in Altual Rebelion. It is ordered by the Lords Spiritual and Temporal in Parliament Assobled, That this House do wait upon His Majesty at five a Clock this afternoom in the Banquetting House at Whitchall, to give His Majesty which thus is thus as for howing imparted the same to this House; And do bumbly offer to assist the said Rebels and all other his Enemies whitsever.

The Houle of Commons likewife after Reading of Argik's Declaration mentioned in his Majestics Speces. Refolved, Nemine Contradicente, That this House mill fand by and affif his Majesty with their Lives and Fortunes against Archibald Campbel the pretended Earl of Argile and his Adherents, and all Rebels and Traytors and all others whatfoever that shall affif him or any of them. And that this House will in a Body attend his Majesty with this Fote.
