

# The London Gazette.

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Edinburgh, May 23.

**Y**esterday three Acts were passed in Parliament, One Ratifying the Priviledges of the Senators of the Colledge of Justice. The Second, For applying vacant Stipends of Churches to pious uses, and more particularly for Building and Repairing of Bridges, Repairing of Churches, and entertainment of the Poor, and to the use of the Universities therein mentioned. The Third concerning the Oath of Allegiance is as follows,

Our Sovereign Lord with consent of the Estates of Parliament doth ratifie, confirm and approve what hath been done by His Majesties Privy Council, Justice Court, and those Commissionated by them, in Banishing, Imprisoning or Fining such as refused to take and Swear the Oath of Allegiance, and to assert the Royal Prerogatives mentioned in the Eleventh Act, Parliament the first of King Charles the Second. And further Ordains all the Subjects of this Kingdom to take and Swear the Oath of Allegiance, and to assert the said Prerogatives whenever they shall be required, either by the Privy Council, Justice Court, or any Commissionated by them. And that, under the pain of Banishment, Imprisonment, or such other pains and Punishments as shall be determined by the Privy Council, Justice Court, or Commissioners aforesaid, not reaching to Life or Limb.

Edinburgh, May 25. Since our last we have Intelligence of the late Earl of Argyle's landing in the Island of *Ila* (a Party of 500 of the Kings Forces who had been there being some days before gone to *Argyleshire*) where he had threatned to hang all those at their own doors that would not Rise with him, notwithstanding which very few joined him; From thence he came over to *Kintire*, endeavouring to get the people there to take Arms with him, whilst his Sons *Charles* and *John* were doing the like in other parts of *Argyleshire*; And it is reported that

*Campbel* of *Auchinbreck* (who is married to a Daughter-in-Law of the said late Earl) besides some others of that Name, and an inconsiderable person of the Name of *Macdonnel* are joined with him; and these with what others he has picked up since his first landing, are according to the common report reputed to be between 2 and 3000. In the mean time a considerable part of the Kings Forces (consisting chiefly of *Highlanders*) under the command of the Duke of *Gordon* and the Marquis of *Atbol*, are marching with all possible diligence into that Country to suppress the Rebels, while the main Body of the Kings Army is encamped at and about *Glasgow*, to prevent the joining of people with them from the West; And another Party of the Kings Forces are posted near the Borders to hinder any coming to him from the North of *England*, from whence he expected great supply upon his Landing in *Scotland*. It is hardly to be believed with how much readiness and cheerfulness the Heretors and Militia come from all parts of the Kingdom to demonstrate their Duty and Loyalty to His Majesty upon this occasion.

Venice, May 12. We have advice by a Vessel arrived from *Corfu* that 700 Turkish Horse having advanced near to *Prevesa* the Venetians had fallen upon them and totally routed them, the greatest part of them being killed or taken Prisoners. And that Cap-

tain General *Morofini* had sent Signior *De'sino* with a Squadron of men of War to *Brasso di Maina* to to assist the *Mainotes* who have thrown off the Turkish Yoke, and have put themselves under the protection of the Republick. Prince *Maximilian* of *Brunswicke* who commands the Troops which the Duke of *Hanover* his Father has sent to the assistance of this State, embarked the 10th Instant on a man of War which is to carry him to the Fleet. The Letters from *Rome* of the 5th Instant tell us that the Pop: is perfectly recovered of his late Indisposition.

Genova, May 15. The Doge and the four Senators are expected back from *Paris* the beginning of the next month. They will return by the way of *Marseilles*, and three Gallies of this State are going thither to attend them: And it's said the Squadron of French Gallies will accompany them hither.

Warsaw, May 4. The Dyet has been again prolonged for 8 days, not having yet been able to settle the new Contributions, and several other important matters. In the mean time we have advice that the Turks make great preparations for the Campaign. That the Grand Signior to encourage his Troops, has declared that he will go to *Belgrade* and remain there during the Campaign; That a great many Troops have been brought from *Asia* to serve as well in *Hungary* as against this Crown; and that the *Bassa* who defended *Buda* the last year, is appointed by the Grand Signior to Command his Army in *Hungary*; the late *Serasquier* being in disgrace for having suffered the Imperialists to retire without attacking them. The *Sieur Gninski* Vice-Chancellor of *Poland* Dyed here the 30 of the last month.

Vienna, May 17. It is confirmed that the *Bassa* of *Newbeufel* hath sent 130 Christian Prisoners out of the Town, who it's said do all agree in the account they have given Colonel *Heusser* of the great necessity the place is reduced to; but that the *Bassa* endeavors to keep up the Spirits of the Soldiers with the assurances he gives them of a speedy relief. It is certain the Turks are drawing a great body of men together between *Pest* and *Vicegrad*, and that they have provided a great Convoy of Provisions, which there is no doubt to be made but they will attempt to put into *Newbeufel*; And therefore several Troops are daily sent to reinforce Colonel *Heusser*, who is at present posted with about 10000 men along the River *Gran*, having taken care to secure all the passages of that River, and keeping parties abroad to hinder the Country people from carrying any Provisions to the Town, which they are enticed to do by the great price the Turks give for them; but when discovered, they are severely punished. The Inhabitants of *Gutha* having carried some Provisions to the Enemy, Colonel *Heusser* upon knowledge of it, caused some of the chief of them to be seized and the whole Village to be burnt. They write from Upper *Hungary* that Count *Teckley* is retired to a place called *Thurme* on the other side of the River *Teiffa*, where he assembles what Troops he can together, having sent to the Neighbouring Countries to cause their Militia immediately to march and joyn him; upon which orders have been sent to General *Schultz*, who, our last Letters told us had attacked the Castle of *Ungwar*, to march against *Teckley* and to hinder his joining with the Turks. The Duke of *Lorraine*

is expected back from the next week; the Troops in the meantime are marching to the General Rendezvous; the Duke of Lorraine is to command the main Army in Lower Hungary; And we are told that Prince Waldeck will command the Troops of the Empire. The Count de Saxe is made General of the Imperial Forces in Croatia; and Count Leslie is to command in Stiria. This Week was brought hither from Bohemia four hundred thousand Crowns, part of which according to the Popes permission hath been raised upon the Clergy of that Kingdom. The Imperial Court continues at Newstadt.

Paris, June 2. The 26 past the Doge and the Senators of Genoa had Audience of leave of the King at Versailles, to which they were conducted in the same manner they were to their first publique Audience; after which they were entertained at Dinner by the Kings Officers. The Sieur de Bonzeuil presented to the Doge from the King his Majesties Picture set with large Diamants, and two Suits of very rich Tapistry, and to each of the Senators likewise his Majesties Picture set with Diamants and one Suit of Tapistry. The 28 the Doge parted from hence, and has been since followed by the Senators, intending to return home by the way of Marseilles. We have an account from Thoulon that the Marschal d'Estree Sailed from thence the 25th of the last Month with the Squadron under his Command. The Marquis d'Arcis parted from hence this Week on his Embassy to the Duke of Savoy; and Monsieur d'Amelot who is to go with the same Character to the King of Portugal will very suddenly begin his journey thither. We are told from Germany that the Elector of Bavaria understanding that the Princes of Coni, and de la Roche sur Ton were at Aufbourg, he went thither to visit them, and that these Princes had returned his visit at a House his Electoral Highness has between Munich and Aufbourg, and had promised his Electoral Highness to pass the Campaign with him in Hungary. On Tuesday last arrived an Exprez at Versailles with the News of the Death of the Elector Palatin. The Chancellor of Poland is, it's said, coming hither in quality of Ambassador Extraordinary from that Crown. We are told that the Marquis de Feuquieres the French Ambassador at Madrid has presented a second Memorial to his Catholick Majesty concerning the French Commerce.

Paris, June 6. The Ambassadors of Moscow have had a Conference at Versailles with the Commissioners appointed by the King to receive their proposals, but we do not yet hear what they are. The King has named the Sieur Girardin to be his Ambassador to the Grand Signior in the place of the Sieur de Guilleragues deceased. We have an account that the Duke of Neuburgh, as next Heir Male to the late Elector Palatin, has taken possession of all his Estate as well as of the Electorate; It's said that the Duke of Orleans in right of his Wife, Sister to the Elector deceased, pretends to the Moveables, and to certain Lands which were acquired by the Electors Predecessors, and were not annexed to the Electorate.

Whitehall, May 28. There has been presented to His Majesty very Loyal Addresses From the Bishop Dean and Chapter of the whole Clergy of the Diocess of Bangor. From the Gentlemen of the Grand Jury of the County of Radnor in the behalf of themselves and all the Inhabitants of the said County at the great Sessions held before His Majesties Justices there the 6th of April. From the Chancellor of the Diocess and the Clergy within the Archdeaconry of Chester. From the Aldermen, Recorder, Capital, and Secondary Burgeses, and other Inhabitants of the Corporation of Wokingham in the Counties of Berks and Wilts. From the President and Governors of the Royal Free Grammar School in Bryncham in the County of Warwick. And from the Mayor, Recorder,

Aldermen, Burgeses and Capital Burgeses of the Borough of New-Castle-Under-Line in the County of Stafford: Which His Majesty received very Graciously.

Westminster, May 30. This day Thomas Dangerfield was tryed at the Kings-Bench Bar, upon an Information for writing and publishing a most Villanous and Scandalous Libel, called his Narrative, of which he was upon a clear Evidence found Guilty. And the Court Ordered that an Indictment of Perjury be brought in against him.

London, May 30. This Afternoon at the Nisi Prius held at the Guild-Hall, Mr. Richard Baxter was Convicted upon an Information for writing and publishing Scandalous and Seditious Notes upon the New Testament.

Westminster, May 30. His Majesty being this day seated on his Throne in the Houle of Lords in his Royal Robes, and the Houle of Commons attending, their Speaker Presented to his Majesty an Act for selling the Revenue on his Majesty for his life, which was settled on his late Majesty for his life, to which his Majesty gave his Royal Assent, and then made a Gracious Speech to both Houes of Parliament; which the Commons, being returned to their Houle, took immediately in to consideration, and resolved to give his Majesty a supply for the occasions mentioned in his Speech.
