Her Majesty the Queen, the Prince Albert, the Queen Dowager, and other Royal Personages, having taken their seats, the Ladies in Waiting, Great Officers of the Household, the Groom of the Stole to His Royal Highness Prince Albert, the Lord and Groom in Waiting to the Queen, the Lord and Groom in Waiting to His Royal Highness Prince Albert, and the Equerries to the Queen and Prince Albert, took their places near the Queen and His Royal Highness.

The Treasurer and Vice-Chamberlain of the Household took their places behind the Sponsors.

Others of the Household, with the Attendants forming the Suites of the Members of the Royal Family and Illustrious Visitors, arranged themselves on either side of the Chapel.

Sir Charles Young, Garter, and Sir William Martins, the Gentleman Usher to the Sword of State, arranged the Company in the Chapel.

The Service then commenced with the performance of Sacred Music.

When the music had ceased, the Lord Chamberlain, accompanied by the Groom of the Stole to His Royal Highness Prince Albert, conducted the Infant Prince from the White Room into the Chapel; His Royal Highness being carried by the Head Nurse, and attended by the Dowager Lady Lyttelton.

The Dowager Lady Lyttelton handed the Infant Prince to the Archbishop, and received the Prince from him again when he had been baptized.

Upon the conclusion of the Baptismal Service, His Royal Highness the Infant Prince was re-conducted from the Chapel in the same way.

As soon as the Ceremony was concluded, Her Majesty and His Royal Highness Prince Albert, Her Majesty the Queen Dowager, the Sponsors, and the other Royal Personages, returned to the Corridor in the same order as they entered the Chapel.

At half past seven o'clock, a Grand Banquet was served in St. George's Hall, previously to which the Foreign Ministers, the Cabinet Ministers, and others invited, assembled in the Grand Reception Room adjoining St. George's Hall; and upon the arrival of Her Majesty and His Royal Highness Prince Albert, with the Queen Dowager, His Royal Highness the Prince of Prussia, and the other Royal Personages, and their Suite, in the Grand Reception Room, the doors were thrown open and, immediately afterwards, the Banquet having been announced, the Queen, conducted by His Royal Highness the Prince of Prussia, entered the Hall, accompanied by His Royal Highness Prince Albert, the Queen Dowager, and the rest of the Royal Family, followed by the Foreign Ministers, Cabinet Ministers, and others invited, the Band playing "GOD save the QUEEN."

At Dessert the Toasts were given by the Lord Steward as follows:

"His Royal Highness Prince Alfred."

"His Majesty the King of Prussia."

"Her Majesty the Queen Dowager."

"The Queen."

"His Royal Highness Prince Albert."

The Queen afterwards left St. George's Hall, accompanied by the Queen Dowager, the Princesses, and the other Ladies present, and returned to the Grand Reception Room, where they were soon joined by His Royal Highness Prince Albert, the Prince of Prussia, the Princes, Foreign Ministers, Cabinet Ministers, and other Guests.

The doors of the Waterloo Gallery were then thrown open for the reception of the Company, and a Grand Musical Performance terminated the evening.

The Foreign Ministers, Cabinet Ministers, and other Visitors, appeared in Full Dress Uniform.
