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His Majesties most Gracious Speech to both Houses of Parliament, On Saturday the 30th of May, 1685.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

Thank you very hearthy for the Bill you have presented Me this day; And I assure you, the Readiness and Chearfulness that has attended the Dispatch of it, is as acceptable to Me as the Bill it self; After so happy a Beginning, you may believe I would not Call upon you unnecessarily for an extraordinary Supply; But when I tell you that the Stores of the Navy and Ordnance are extremely Exhausted, That the Anticipations upon several Branches of the Revenue are Great and Burthensome, That the Debts of the King My Brother to His Servants and Fami y me such as deserve Compassion, That the Rebellion in Scotland, without putting more weight upon it than it really deserves, must oblige Me to a Considerable Expence extraordinary: I am sure such Considerable Expence extraordinary: I am sure such Considerations will move you to give Me an Aid to provide for those Things, wherein the Security, the Ease and the Happiness of My Government are so much Concerned But above, all, I must Recommend to you the Care of the Navy, the Strength and Glory of this Nation, That you will put it into such a Condition, as may make Us Considered and Respected abroad: I cannot express My Concernupon this Occasion more sutable to My own Thoughts of it, than by assuring you. I have a True English Heart, as Fealows of the Honour of the Nation as you can be; And I please My Self with the Hopes, That by Gods Blessing, and your Assistance, Imay carry the Reputation of it yet higher in the World, than ever it has been in the Time of any of My Ancestors; And as I will not Call upon you for Supplies, but when they are of Publick Use and Advantage, so I promise you, That what you give Me upon such Occasions, shall be Managed with good Husbandry; And I will take Care it shall be Employed to the Uses for which I ask them.

Three Vessels are hired to carry 2000 Sacks of Coin, which the Pope gives the Morlaques, to Dalmatia. The 13 Instant two Brothers of the Family of Boolini were received into the number of the Nobility, they paying each 100 thousand Duca's; and Signior Sandi has offered a like Sum to be admitted to that 'ignity. 4000 Foot were encamped near Clin: And that Signior Paulo Michiel General of the Cavalry hath had a conference at Spalatro with the Proveditore General Falier, who was there indisposed; and that

We have an account by a Vessel come from Athens, that the Turks who had deseated the Mainotes, being reinforced with some Troops brought them by a Bassa, had pursued them several miles, but that the Mainotes rallying, and being strengthned with some fresh sroops, had returned to the charge with so much vigor and courage, that of 3500 Turks there escaped but 140, and but 2 of a Company of Athenians of 130 men.
