Letters from Colonel Heuflers Camp affured us that the place is reduced to the laft extremity. We have in account from Gran that 15000 Turks are in a Body near Novigrad, and that they have with them a great many Wagons laden with Provisions; That they expect other Troops from Buda to joyn them, and that it's believed the Vifier of that place will commind them in perfon, having politive orders from the Grand Signior to relieve Newheufel. This day parted f. om hence Prince' Louis of Baden General of the Cavalry for Hungary, whither he will in few days be followed by the Count de Caprara Mareschal de Camp. Several Troops are marching to reinforce Colonel Heusler who continues entamped near Barkan, and when they have joyned him it's foid he will formally Attack Newbrusel. The Regiments that are to ferve this Campigne in Cromia have orders to haften their march thither, upon the advice the Emperor has received that the Turks are drawing together on that fide with a defign to attack Virouitza. The Imperial Miniflers have had feveral conterences with the Envoy from the Landgrave of Heffe Caffel, who offers to aililt the Emperor with 4 500 men upon condi ion that the Emperor do pay to the Landgrave an hundred and fifty thousand Florins; that he maintain these Troops during the Campagne; and that, at the end of it, the Companies be at the Emperors charge filled up to the fame number they are at prefeat.
