

whereof hayling them, informed them that they were all design'd for the relief of *Candia* with 2000 Souldiers and 200 thousand Crowns for the encouragement of the besieged.

The young Prince with a Train of about 40 persons intends the 22. instant to leave *Florence*, to pass by the way of *Inspruck* for *Stratsburgh*, and afterwards to *Holland*.

The 15. Instant arriv'd the *Marabotto* from *Venice*, and had in her way touch'd at *Zante*, being a large Vessel of 1000 Tun, 150 Men, and 60 Guns, intended for *Spain*.

Hague, Nov. 4. The States of *Holland* dismiss their Assembly on Saturday last, intending to meet again the 22 of this Month; having sufficiently inform'd themselves of the whole Negotiation of the Heer *Van Beuninghen* in his late Embassy into *France*: but are not come to any final resolution, as to the Affairs between the two Crowns. The Baron de *Tergerck* arriv'd here on Monday last from *Brussels*, being deputed from the Marquis de *Castil Rodrigo*; and on Monday sevensight that Affair will again fall under debate. In the mean while the States General are pressing the respective Provinces to come to a speedy Nomination of such persons as they shall think fit to Command in the Army, in case our Affairs should oblige us to take the Field, and of others to be employ'd in the Character of Ambassadors to the Emperour, King of *Sweden*, and the Dukes of *Lunenburg*.

The *Here Boreel* is not yet gone off for *England* as intended, but waits onely for the arrival of the Yacht from *Zealand*, design'd for his Transportation, and will in few days after be follow'd by another person, sent upon the same Employment from the States of *East-Friesland*.

On Sunday last arriv'd here Lieutenant-Admiral *Van Ghent*, and Lieutenant-Admiral *Aluwa*, vvhich were both of them the next day present at a meeting of the States, to vvhom they gave an account of their late voyage.

On Wednesday last the Envoy from *Muscovy* had his last Audience, and received the Presents made him by the States Order of a Chain of Gold, with a Medal to the value of 500 Guilders.

On Saturday arriv'd here the Heer *Romswinkel*, Envoy from his Highness the Elector of *Brandenburgh*, with the Heer *Blaspyl* from *Cleve*.

The Ratifications of the Treaty made with the King of *Suedeland* are not yet mutually exchanged, but in order thereunto, the East-India Company, who are order'd to pay the Sum of monies agreed on for the losses received by the *Suedes* in *Guiney*, are ready to acquit themselves of that Duty.

The States of *Holland* have before their late Separation choen four of the Council of State, who are to consider of the fitness of such persons as are to be employ'd to command in the Army, and what pay shall be allotted to them, and are to make their reports to the States.

From *Amsterdam* we are told of the arrival of several ships from *Norway* at the *Uly*; but as yet they have no certain news of the East-India Ship the *Arms of Amsterdam* that was separated from the rest of the Fleet near *Fero*; the Directors of that Company have us'd all possible diligence to get intelligence of her, which has hitherto prov'd ineffectual, and have lately dispatch'd away several Gallions, with provisions and all sorts of necessaries for her supply in case they can meet with her. Some hopes there were that she might have put in about *Islandt*; but this is also vanish'd, a Vessel newly arriv'd from thence bringing no news of her.

Plymouth, Oct. 27. Yesterday arriv'd here two small French Ships laden vvvith Wines, one of them for this place, the other bound for *Topsam*. This day came in a Vessel from *New England*, vvhich all things continue in a good condition; Here are also forced in by foul weather eight or ten Ships, *Hollanders* and *Suedes*, all of them outward bound, and may sail vvvith the first fair wind.

Portsmouth, Octob. 27. Care is still continued for the

discharging the Ships that are here in Harbour. This day the *Tork* is paying off, as vvvill be all the rest of them in their Order. Yesterday arriv'd at *Spitt-head* the *Paradox* from the *Isle of Jersey*, and the *St. David*, a large fourth Rate Ship from *Kinsale*. Here is also put in a small *Norman* vvvith Wines from *Burdeaux*, bound for *Chichester*, having by the late ill weather spent her Mizen Mast.

The 27 instant, arriv'd at *Westcomes* the Hunter of *Wijmar* from *Rotterdam* with Ballast, bound for *Burdeaux*, somewhat damaged, and grown leaky by ill weather at Sea, and is novv on ground to repair; as also a Ship of *Stetin*, and three *Hollanders*, vvhich speak of a considerable Fleet that has three or four times endeavour'd to get out of the *Maes*, but have been as often driven back by contrary winds.

Hull, Oct. 27. By several Vessels arriv'd here yesterday from *Yarmouth*, we are told of eight Wrecks seen by them in their passage. Four days since a Vessel of 180 Tuns, laden from this place vvvith Cloath and Lead, being out at Sea in company vvvith a great Collier, was vvvith her companion forc'd into *Humber*, vvhich the Collier had the misfortune to run upon the Stone banks, vvhich she was beaten to pieces, the men sav'd; but the Hull vessel vvvith much difficulty and some damage came up again hither, where she lies to be repaired.

Weymouth, Oct. 28. Yesterday arriv'd here two Vessels from *Cherbury*, vvhich by their description of a wreck at Sea, give us cause to fear it might be an old Vessel of this place, vvvith several Passengers intended for *Jersey*.

Lyme, Oct. 28. Yesterday arriv'd here three Vessels from *Moriaix*; vvhich the Coast is much infested vvvith the *Ostend* Privateers, no Man of War being order'd to secure them, till the Merchants of the Ports concerned shall oblige themselves to maintain them. They tell us also, that a Squadron of the French Fleet are sail'd from *Rocheli* intended for the *Streights*; that several Officers were employ'd to take an account of all Religious Houses lately erected, vvvith their Revenues, vvhich is believed vvvould be suddenly dissolved.

London, Octob. 29. This day Sir *William Peak*, Lord Mayor of this City for the ensuing year, attended by the Aldermen his Brethren, and the two Sheriffs, with several Companies of the Livery-men, came in their Barges to *Westminster*, where, in the Court of the Exchequer his Lordship took his Oath with the usual Solemnities.
