

Lambton Staiths, whence the boundary commenced, as shewn on the plan, and thereon coloured green :

"That marriages, baptisms, and churchings should be solemnized and performed in each of the said chapels; and that the fees arising therefrom should be received by and belong to the respective Ministers thereof:

"That the consent of the Lord Bishop of Durham has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third; in testimony whereof, the said Lord Bishop has signed and sealed this present instrument:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignments be accordingly made, and the recommendations of the said Commissioners, in respect of the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, and churchings, and the fees arising therefrom, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.

#### Barnsley and Grange Moor Turnpike Road.

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament during the next session, for leave to bring in a Bill, and to obtain an Act to continue the term, and to alter, amend, and enlarge the powers and provisions contained in an Act passed in the sixth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act for more effectually improving the roads from Barnsley-common to Grange-moor and White-cross; and for making a diversion of the said roads, from or near to Redbrook, in the township of the Barugh to Barnsley, all in the west riding of the county of York;" and also to obtain powers to enable the trustees of the said turnpike road to alter, widen, improve, add to, or divert certain parts of the said turnpike road, and the diversion authorized to be made by the same Act, which said turnpike road and the diversion of road lie in or pass through the several townships, hamlets, or places of Barnesley, Bargh otherwise Barugh, Darton, Kexbrough, Woolley, Bretton West, Midgley, Flockton, and Whitley upper otherwise Denby, and the several parishes of Silkstone, Darton, Roystone, Sandall, Thornhill, and Kirkheaton, all in the west riding of the county of York.—Barnsley, sixth November 1844.

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#### Tranmere Docks.

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the next session, for leave to bring in a Bill or Bills, and to obtain an Act or Acts, to enable certain parties, therein to be named, or certain Trustees or Commissioners to be thereby appointed, or a company to be thereby incorporated, to make, build, and construct one or more wet dock or wet docks, and one or more graving dock or graving docks, with all necessary and proper basins, canals, piers, wharfs, shipping and landing-places, bridges, sluices, and works, convenient and adjoining thereto, or connected therewith, in or near a certain place called Tranmere Pool, in the county of Chester; and to form a sea wall adjoining the river Mersey, between the piers of certain ferries called Tranmere and Birkenhead Ferries, which said docks, basins, and other works, will be situated within or adjoining to the parishes, townships, and extra-parochial places of Tranmere, Birkenhead, Babbington otherwise Babbington, and Bidston, all in the said county of Chester; and to construct a cut, drain, or culvert, with proper sluices, and other works in connection therewith, for the purpose of carrying off the drainage waters, which now usually flow through the said pool from the lands to the west and north-west of the same, and within the said last-mentioned parishes, townships, or extra-parochial places, or some of them.

And notice is hereby also given, that it is intended to obtain powers, by the said Act or Acts, for the compulsory purchase of lands, houses, tenements, and hereditaments, and to vary or extinguish all existing rights and privileges connected with such lands, or with the lands immediately abutting on the said pool, dock or docks, or with the waters of the said pool, or which would in any manner interfere with or impede the carrying the said Act or Acts into execution; and it is also intended to apply for power for the parties to be named in, or trustees or commissioners to be appointed, or the company to be incorporated by the said intended Act or Acts, to levy tolls, rates, and duties, for and in respect of the use of the said docks, basins, and other works and conveniences.

And notice is hereby further given, that, on or before the thirtieth day of November in the present year, a plan and section of the said intended docks, basins, and other works, with a duplicate of the same, and a book of reference thereto, containing the names of the owners or reputed owners, lessees or reputed lessees, and occupiers of the lands upon which the said intended docks, basins, and other works are intended to be made, will be deposited at the office of the Clerk of the Peace of the said county of Chester, at Chester; and, on or before the thirty-first day of December next, a copy of so much of the said plan and section, as relates to each of the parishes in which such docks, basins, and other works, will be situated, together with a book of reference thereto, will be deposited with the parish clerk of each such parish, at his respective place of abode.—Dated the 9th day of November 1844.
