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Whitchal, June 21.

WE have an account from *Chard* of the 19th. instant; that my Lord *Churhill*, having upon his Arrival there with His Majesties Forces under his Command; sent out Lieutenant *Monaux* with twenty Commanded Men and a Quartermaster of the Earl of *Oxfords* Regiment, they came up, within two Miles of *Taunton*, with a Party of the Rebels of the same number, and charging them killed 12 of them upon the place, and wounded most of the rest, and then perceiving another Party of the Rebels, they retired. Lieutenant *Monaux* was shot in the Head so that he cannot live; and three of his Men were wounded; this party of the Rebels were very well Armed, being their best Men.

We are Informed that the Rebels are between *Taunton* and *Bridgewater*. His Majesties Forces Commanded by the Earl of *Feversham*, are Marching towards them, and we doubt not to have in few days a very good account of them.

Edinburg, June 18. This Day at Noon. We have an Account this day that the late Earl of *Argile*, upon the notice he had of the arrival of His Majesties Ships, had resolved to cause his Ships and Boats to Sail into *Lochfyne*, but being detained by contrary winds, His Majesties Ships the *King-Fisher*, and *Falcon* came up to the Entrance of *Lochrowan*, where the Rebels Ships lay, by which they were so discouraged, that laying aside the design of Sailing into *Lochfyne*, they began upon the 10th instant, to fortifie a little Castle, called *Ellengreg*, and a Rock that lies near to it in a little Island; for securing their Ships in *Lochrowan*; which done, himself marched away towards the head of *Lochfyne*, leaving 150 Men for the Guard of the Ships, having first put his Cannon, Arms, and Ammunition into the Castle. Upon the 11th, a Party of His Majesties Forces under the Command of the Marquis of *Arbol*, consisting of 300 Foot, encountered a Party of the Rebels of 400 Foot and 80 Horse, and defeated them; some of the Rebels being Killed upon the place, several wounded, and some of their Horses and Arms taken; upon which they marched back to *Ellengreg*, where they continued until the 15th, at which time the Rebels having passed *Lochlong*, marched towards the *Lenox* in the Shire of *Dumbarton*.

The same day His Majesties Ships came up to the Castle (where the Rebels Arms and Ammunition still lay) with a Resolution to batter it, and to destroy their Ships; but upon the firing of the first Gun two Men came off in a Boat with a white Flag, and told them they might save their labour; for there were none to oppose them, all the Rebels having Fled; whereupon they sent a Boat on Shoar, and finding it to be so, took possession of the Castle, Ships and Boats, with all the Arms, Ammunition, Cannon, &c. A particular Account whereof cannot be given at present, but what are already found, do amount to 5000 Arms, 400 Barrels of Powder, with Ball and other Stores in proportion, besides the Cannon, some whereof are mounted, and others sunk,

though easily recoverable. The Rebels had a design to Blow up the Powder; but it was prevented. On the 16th they marched by the head of *Gairloch* towards the Fords of the River *Levis*, betwixt *Loch-tomond*, and the Town of *Dumbarton*. On the 17th in the Morning the Earl of *Dumbarton*, having an Account of their passing that River, and of their being entred into the Shire of *Dumbarton*, sent 3 Troops of Dragoons to prevent their crossing the River *Chyde*, under the Command of the Lord *Charles Montague* their Lieutenant Colonel, while the Earl of *Dumbarton*, with the Army under his Command is marching with all diligence from *Glasgow* towards the Rebels (who are about 12 miles distant) to attack them. The Rebels have the River of *Clyde* on the right hand (guarded by the aforementioned Dragoons, and the Troops of that Country) the Duke of *Gordon* on their left, and the Marquis of *Arbol* in their Rear.

An Express from the Marquis of *Arbol* does inform us, that he met considerable numbers of the Rebels deserting, not only for fear, but also for hunger, having no sort of Provisions: On the other part; the Noblemen and Gentlemen now in Arms for His Majesties service, shew great zeal and forwardness, and when any of them are sent home (their Auxiliaries being judged unnecessary) they repine to be deprived of the Honor to serve His Majesty upon this occasion.

We have just now received Letters from the Borders, assuring us, that all is in perfect Peace there, both on the Scotch and English side.

Warsaw, May 25. The King of *Poland* has sent orders to the several Regiments to march with all the diligence possible towards *Leopol*, near which place the general Rendezvous its believed will be appointed. The *Turks* and *Tartars* make daily incursions in the *Ukrain*; and it's reported, that the *Moscovites* have committed divers Hostilities upon the Subjects of this Crown, and that they are marching in a considerable Body towards the Frontiers of *Lithuania*; Whereupon the King we are told has with the advice of the Senate resolved to send an Envoy to *Moscov* to endeavour to prevent a Rupture between the two Nations in this Conjunction. We have yet no certain account of the Force the *Turks* will have on this side this Campaign; It's said indeed that they turn their chief strength towards *Hungary*, and that they will not joyn above 25 or 30000 Men with the *Tartars* to act against this Crown, but these are reports that cannot be relied upon. The Dyet is still assembled, but it's believed they will separate to-morrow. They have desired the King, whenever he thinks it necessary, to summon the *Archieb*, as has been heretofore practised in great and pressing occasions; and have laid great Penalties upon such Gentlemen as shall not appear in pursuance of the said summons. The Sieur *Zdziewsky* Bishop of *Warmie* is made Vice-Chancellor of *Poland*; the King having given him the Seal the 19th instant. The Count de *Denosse* Colonel of the Kings Regiment of Guards is made *Palatin* of *Marienburg*.

Naples, May 24. The Pope Gallies who arrived in this Port the last week Sailed again the 22d In-

went for *Messina* where they joyned those of *Tuscany* and *Malta*, and then sailed together to joyn the *Venetian* Fleet. The Gallies of this Kingdom and of *Sardinia* are arriv'd here from *Genoa*.

Venice, May 30. Several Vessels that were sent with Provisions and Ammunition for the service of the Fleet, are come back, by which we have an account that the great Convoy with the Troops of *Hanover* arriv'd at *Carfu* the 20th of the last Month. And that the Popes Gallies and those of *Tuscany* and *Malta* were daily expected there to joyn the Fleet. We have no fresh news from *Dalmatia*; but several Companies of Foot have been sent thither this Week from the *Lido*. The Letters from *Constantinople* brought from thence by a Dutch Vessel, say, That Provisions began to be very scarce in that City, especially Corn; They not being supplied as they used to be from *Alexandria*, by reason their Ships cannot pass without great hazard of falling into the hands of the Christians; to prevent which the Turks were fitting out several Gallies and other light Ships to serve for Convoys.

Venice, June 2. The 31st past, being *Ascension* day, the Doge accompanied with the Senate, performed the accustomed Ceremony of Marrying the Sea; and afterwards gave the Senators and the persons of Quality that were present a Magnificent Entertainment. The last Letters from *Dalmatia* gave an account that several Turkish Troops which were marching towards *Hungary* had been met and defeated by a Party of *Venetians* Commanded by the Chevalier de *Lauca*; And that many of them were killed upon the place. That the Hostilities continue between the *Venetians* and the *Turks*; and that the latter having taken an Abbot out of a Monastery near the Gulf of *Prevesa*, had impaled him, for having very much contributed to the relief of the Greeks. We have also advic'd from *Constantinople* that the *Turks* have fitted out six Gallies, putting on board each of them a 100 Janizaries; and that they are design'd to be sent to *Yapund*.

Vienna, June 3. The 20th of the last month the Imperial Court returned thither from *Neubad*; and the next day the Emperor was present at a review of the Regiment of *Baden*, consisting of 2000 men which embark'd the 11th instant on the *Danube* for *Hungary*. On Monday last a Council of War was held here, at which the Duke of *Lothain* and all the general Officers in Town were present; who are now on their departure to the Army. The Letters from the Imperial Camp near *Neubad*, confirm the Advice we had the last week that the Seraskier *Bassa* had ordered the Convoy of Provisions which had been provided at *Viccia* for the relief of *Neubad* to be sent to *Buda*; near which place we are told, there are encamp'd 30000 *Turks*. General *Hausler* has brought his Troops nearer to *Neubad*; and we are assured that he will in few days be joyned by the Troops of *Luzemburgh*. The Troops of *Bavaria* are likewise on their march towards *Hungary*; and part of his Electoral Highnesses Artillery is already arriv'd here. The Emperor will have three Armies in the Field this Summer in *Hungary* and *Croatia*; That Commanded by the Duke of *Lorraine* will be of 40000 men, and the other two of 15 or 16000 each. Prince *Charles* of *Baden Dourlach* who is to Command the Troops of the Circle of *Swabia* in the quality of Major General arriv'd here the 11th instant; He expects here to morrow the Infantry of the said Circle; and the Cavalry towards the end of this week. Yesterday arriv'd here an Express from Upper *Hungary* with an account that General *Schultz* hath taken the Lower Town of *Ungwar*, but that the Garrison defends the Upper Town with great obstinacy; and that the Imperialists have already lost above 300 Men and several Officers before the place. It is reported, that the *Turks* have now ap-

pointed the general Rendezvous of their Army to be near *Buda*, and that there will be about 60000 Men at it. The Emperor has named the Count de *Laborowits* to go in quality of his Envoy Extraordinary to the Most Christian King Cardinal *Borviss* the Popes Nuncio at this Court has given 100 thousand Florins towards the Expenses of the Blockade of *Neubad*, and hath promised the Emperor a much greater Sum from the Pope when that place is taken.

Hamburg, June 13. The Marquis de *Torcey* Envoy Extraordinary from his Most Christian Majesty to the King of *Denmark*, arriv'd the eighth instant at the Court of *Zell*, and is in few days expected here in his way to *Holstein*, where he purposes to meet the King of *Denmark* at his return from *Norway*. They write from *Stockholm* that the Marschal de *Koningsmark* was gone over to *Pomeran*, from whence its said he will go for *Hungary* to pass the Campaign there. The Letters from *Berlin* of the 11th instant say, the Troops which the King of *Sweden* sends to the Emperors assistance were on their march towards *Breslaw*, and that the Elector of *Brandenburgh* having been inform'd that they had pass'd within his Territories without his leave, had sent an Officer to enquire into the Truth of it. The Letters from *Warsaw* confirm that the Dyet is separated, having concluded the most important matters that were before them to the Kings satisfaction. And that his Majesty would very suddenly take the field.

Hague, June 19. There was yesterday a review at *Scwylong* of the Regiment of Guards and other Troops quartered heere and at *Delf*, where they exercised in the presence of the Prince of *Orange*, and divers persons of Quality. His Highness will part from hence to morrow or next day for *Breda*. Prince *Waldeck* is gone from his House of *Culembourg* for *Germany*.

Marseilles, June 25. The Doge and Senators of *Genoa*, arriv'd yesterday from *Paris* and are now *Incognito* at a Country House in the Neighborhood of this City; Its believed they will in two or three days Embark on the *Genoue* Gallies which are arriv'd on this Coast, and are expected here this Evening.

Whitehal, June 18. This Afternoon a Chapter being held of the Most Noble Order of the Garter to fill the Vacant Stall, the Right Honourable the Earl of *Peterborough* was Elected Knight Companion of that Order, and was Invested with the *George* and *Garter*.

Whitehal, June 19. This day the Marquis *Augustin de Pallavicini* Envoy Extraordinary from the Republick of *Genoa*, had his first Audience of the King, being Conducted to it in his Majesties Coach by Sir *Charles Cotterel* Master of the Ceremonies.
