

# The London Gazette.

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From Thursday June 25. to Monday June 29, 1685.

Whitehal, June 28.

**W**E have an account that on *Thursday* last a Party of 100 Horse, Comanded by Colonel *Oglethorpe*, fell upon the Rebels at *Canisham* Bridge between *Bristol* and *Bath*, and cut off two Troops of their best Horse, killing between 80 and 100 of them upon the place; and on our side the Earl of *Newburgh* had the misfortune to be shot in the Belly, but it's hoped he will recover. And that the Parties sent out by the Lord *Churchill* had killed many of the Rebels, and that many more deserted. On *Friday* in the Evening all the Kings Forces joynd near *Bath*, upon which the Rebels who were drawn up on the other side of the Town marched away in much fear and disorder, and are it's said gone back to *Frome*, being followed by His Majesties Forces under the Command of the Earl of *Feverham*.

The Earl of *Pembroke*, Lord Lieutenant of the County of *Wilts*, hath given His Majesty an Account, That being informed that the Rabble at *Frome* headed by the Constable, had put up in the Market-place the Traiterous Declaration Published by the late Duke of *Monmouth*, he marched thither on *Thursday* last with 160 Horse, and mounted behind some of them 36 Musketeers; That being come near the Town, he heard great shooting, and beating of Drums, and was informed that between 2 and 3000, upon the notice they had of his coming, were gathered together from *Warmister* and *Westbury*, some with Muskets, some with Pistols, some with Pikes, and some with Pitch-forks and Sythes. But notwithstanding the small Number he had with him, he marched into the Town at the Head of his Muskets, followed by the Horse; The Rebels seemed at first very resolute, and as his Lordship came in at the Gate, one fired at him, bidding the rest to Fire when his Lordship came to such a place, but in a moment they all threw down their Arms, and fled out at the other end of the Town. His Lordship having caused the Traiterous Declaration to be pull'd down, made the Constable write with his own Hand an Abhorrence of the same, and a Declaration declaring the late Duke of *Monmouth* a Traytor, and put it up at the same place, and then committed him to Prison.

On *Friday* his Lordship, according to the Orders he had received, marched with three Regiments of Militia Foot of the County of *Wilts* to *Bath*, his Horse being ordered to meet the Duke of *Grafton*; having marched about two Miles on a Down between *Trobridge* and *Clarkin*, he came full upon the Rebels, who made a halt at the farther end of the Down, being about a Mile from his Lordship, and sent a Party towards him: His Lordship drew his three Regiments into one Body, lining the Muskets with Pikes, and staid in that place two hours; and whenever he broke that order to march, the Rebels made towards him, but durst not attack him, and at last left him in great confusion, being pursued from *Canisham* Bridge. His Lordship seeing some Straglers left behind, rode after them with two or three Servants, and took one of them, whom he ordered to be Hang'd: He told his Lordship 2000 of the Rebels had deserted that day. After which his Lordship marched to *Trobridge*.

*Edinburgh*, June 24. Since our last, in which you had an account of the late Earl of *Argyle's* being brought Prisoner hither, we have certain Intelligence that the Parties of the Kings Forces which were sent in search of the dispersed Rebels, do daily bring in many Prisoners, some whereof affirm that many of the Rebels were killed the day that *Rumbold* and *Aylosse* were taken, and among others the second Son of Sir *Fohn Cochran*. *Rumbold* continues very ill of his Wounds; but it's thought *Aylosse* may recover.

*Kent*, June 16. The Senate have given out Commissions for the raising several new Regiments of Foot, which it's said the Officers have undertaken to have complet in six weeks. This Morning arrived here an Express with Letters from Captain General *Morosini*, giving the Senate an account that the Pope's Gallies and those of *Tuscany* and *Malib* were arrived at *Corsica*, and had joynd the Fleet; And that he had received advice that the Turkish Fleet consisting of 60 Gallies and 20 Ships of War was at Sea; And that he had thereupon sent Orders to Signior *Delfino* to joynd with the Ships he has with him Signior *Melino* who was with his Squadron at *Cerigo*. The last Letters from *Dalmatia* inform us, that the Bassa of *Bosnia* had received Orders from the Port to march with the Troops of that Country towards *Hungary*. We are expecting here the 2000 Men which the Elector of *Saxony* sends to the assistance of this Republick, and in the mean time Vessels are providing to transport them to *Brussels*. This week was Launched a great Ship, built in the *Arsenal* here, which is to carry 30 Pieces of Cannon, and two large Mortars.

*Warsaw*, June 3. The Dyet separated the 31 of the last Month, having resolved to maintain 30000 men, which are to compose the Army of this Crown, besides the Forces of *Lithuania* and the Auxiliary Troops of *Brandenburg* and *Courland*, which will amount to about the like Number. And in case the *Moscovites* shall reject the Proposals which will be made to them by the Envoye the King is sending to *Moscow*, and shall begin a War against this Crown, the Dyet has resolved that the King shall summon the *Arievban* to make head against them. The Turks and Tartars continue their Incursions into the Frontier Provinces, and have carried the alarm to the very Gates of *Leopol*; upon which the Crown-General is gone thither to give the necessary Orders for the security of those parts against these Incursions, as well as to prepare things for the opening of the Campaign. The Count de *Denuff* having, upon his being made Palatin of *Mariembourg*, quitted the Command of Lieutenant General of the German Forces in the service of this Crown, the King has given the same to Prince *Ferdinand* of *Courland*. The Sieur *Marsinich* is going from hence to the Elector of *Brandenburg*, to sollicite a supply of Money, and a greater Number of Troops, than what his Electoral Highness assisted this Crown with the last Campaign.

*Vienna*, June 17. The Duke of *Lorraine* parted from hence the 11th Instant, and arrived the same day at *Raab*, the 12th at *Gran*, and the 13th at the Camp near *Newbuesel*, where he held a Council of War, and afterwards sent out the Count de *Caprara* with 4000 Horse to learn in what posture the Enemy

is: We are assured that his Highness has at present with him an Army of 30000 Men, which will in a short time be reinforced with the Auxiliary Troops of *Bavaria, Cologne, Lunenburg, and the Circles of Franconia, Suabia, and the Upper Rhin*. This week was sent from hence a very fine Train of Artillery, with a great quantity of Ammunition for *Hungary*; and Orders have been sent to all the Ingenieurs to hasten to the Army. It is said that the Duke of *Lorraine* will endeavour to make himself Master of *Novigrad* before he attacks *Newbeusel*, and that he hath already commanded some Troops that way. We have advice that 30000 Turks have passed the Bridge of *Esseck*, and are marching towards *Buda* to join the Body which is encamped in the Neighborhood of that place; And that they have positive Orders from the Grand Signior to relieve *Newbeusel*. The Letters from *Zendro* in Upper *Hungary* of the 10th Instant give an account that General *Schultz*, after having raised the Siege of *Ungwar*, had sent a strong Detachment to attack the Town of *Osnib*, which they possessed themselves of with the loss of 22 men on their side, and 130 of the Enemy, and took 300 Horses, 1000 Head of Cattle, and a great deal of other Booty.

*Francfort, June 16.* Two Thousand Six Hundred Foot of the Troops of the Elector of *Cologne* have passed the *Main* at *Cosheim*, and from thence continue their march by the way of *Darmstadt* towards *Hungary*. The Infantry of the Troops of *Munster* are now encamped at *Wetzlaer*, and are to pass the *Main* at *Ashaffenbourg*; The Dragoons take their march towards *Alstadt*, and will pass the River *Kientz* at *Gelshausen*, and from thence will continue their march to *Bohemia*; and the Cavalry march by *Heilbron* and *Ulm*. The Troops of *Franconia, Hesse, Wetteravia* and the Upper *Rhin* are about leaving their quarters to march likewise for *Hungary*. And two Companies which this City sends to the Emperors Assistance will part from hence the 25 Instant to join the Troops of the Upper *Rhin*. The Duke of *Croy* parted from hence the 11th for *Hungary*. The Duke of *Holstein Gottorp* is going to the Waters of *Schwalbach*.

*Cologne, June 22.* The last Letters from *Vienna* gave an account that the Duke of *Lorraine* and all the General Officers were gone to *Hungary*. That the Troops of *Brunswicke* had joined the Imperial Forces; And that they would in 2 or 3 days formally attack *Newbeusel*. And that General *Schultz* had raised the Siege of *Ungwar*. They write from *Strasbourg* of the 14th Instant that two Regiments of Horse, who were marching to the Camp on the *Saar* passed the 12 by *Saverne*.

*Paris, June 31.* The King has named the *Secur d'Aubeville* to be his Envoye Extraordinary to the Republick of *Genoua*; And the Abbot *Movel* to go in the same quality to the new Elector Palatin. The Marriage of the Duke of *Bourbon* with *Madamoiselle de Nantes* will its said be celebrated the 3th of the next month. We have advice that the *Tripolins* have lately taken a very rich Ship belonging to *Marseilles*.

*Westminster, June 27.* His Majesty being this afternoon seated on His Throne in the House of Lords in His Royal Robes, and the House of Commons attending, His Majesty gave His Royal Assent to
