E have an account that on Thurfday last à Party of 100 Horle, Commanded by Colonel Oglethorpe, fell upon the Rebels at Canifbam Bridge between Briffoland

Bath, and cut off two Troops of their beft Horfe, killing between 80 and 100 of them upon the place; and on our fide the Earl of Newburgh had the misfortune to be shot in the Belly, but it's hoped he will recover. And that the Parties tent out by the Lord Charchill had killed many of the Rebels, and that many more deferted. On Triday in the Evening all the Kings Forces joyned near Baib, upon which the Rebels who were drawn up on the other fide of the Town marched away in much fear and diforder, and are it's faid gone back to Frome, being followed by His Majeffies Forces under the Command of the Earl of Feversham.

The Earl of Pembroke, Lord Licutenant of the County of Wilts, hath given His Majefly an Account, That being informed that the Rabble at Frome, headed by the Conffable, had put up in the Market-place the Traiterous Declaration Publiched by the late Duke of Monmouth, he marched thither on Thursday haft with 160 Horse, and mounted behind some of them 36 Musketeers; That being come near the Town, he heard great shooting, and beating of Drums, and was informed that between z and 3000, upon the notice they had of his coming, were gathered toge-ther from Warmifter and Wellbury, fome with Muskets, fome with Pillols, fome with Pikes, and fome with Pitch-forks and Sythes. But notwithflanding the fmall Number he had with him, he marched thro the Town at the Head of his Muskets, followed by the Horfe; The Rebels feemed at first very refolute, and as his Lordfhip came in at the Gate, one fited at him, bidding the reft to Fire when his Lordfhip came to fuch a place, but in a moment they all threw down their Arms, and fled out at the other end of the Town. His Lordfhip having caused the Traiterous Declaration to be pull'd down, made the Constable write with his own Hand an Abhorrence, of the fame, and a Declaration declaring the late Duke of Mosmouth a Traytor, and put it up at the fame place, and then committed him to Prifon.

On Friday his Lordship, according to the Orders he had received, marched with three Regiments of Militia Foot of the County of Wilts to Bath, his Horfe being ordered to meet the Duke of Grafton; having marched about two Miles on a Doron between Trobridge and Clarkin, he came full upon the Rebels, who madea halt at the fasther end of the Down, be-ing about a Mile from his Lordhip, and fent a Party towards him : His Lordhip drew his three Regi rowards him : His Lordfhip drew his three Regi-ments into one Body, Lining the Muskets with Pikes, and flaid in that place two hours; and whenever he broke that order to march, the Rebels made to wards him, but durft not attack him, and at laft left him in great confution, being purfued from Ganifam Bridge. His Lordfhip freing fome Straglers left be-i hind, rode after them with two or three Servants, and took one of them, whom he ordered to be Hang'd: He told his Lordfhip 2000 of the Rebel's hall defirt-ed that day. After which his Lordfhip matched to Trobridge. Trobridge.
