

represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending the parish of Saint Michael, in the city and diocese of Lichfield, it appears to them to be expedient, that particular districts should be assigned to the consecrated churches or chapels of Saint John at Wall, and Christ Church at Burntwood, in the said parish, under the provisions of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and that such districts should be named, respectively, "The Chapelry District of Burntwood," and "The Chapelry District of Wall," with boundaries as follows:

"The boundary of the chapelry district of Burntwood commences at the bottom of a lane adjoining Wall Chapelry District (leading from Pipe-marsh, in a north easterly direction, by a house called Pipe-grange), to a gate leading to the inclosed lands on the Pipe-hall Farm; and from thence turning off, in an easterly and south easterly direction, to the centre of a small plantation adjoining a sheet of water in Maple-hayes-lawn, down which plantation it extends to nearly the bottom, and then turns off in an easterly direction, crossing two meadows, till it reaches the water by Leamonsley-mill, through which it passes, and then, in a northern direction, passing through the water again, and taking in Leamonsley-mill, it keeps the boundary fence between Burntwood township and Saint Chad's parish, Lichfield, till it reaches the intakes adjoining the London and Liverpool turnpike road, which it leaves out, and comes into the turnpike road (opposite a certain lane called Featherbed-lane, leading to Uttoxeter) along which turnpike road it proceeds, in a north westerly direction, till it joins the boundary of Longdon parish, which it keeps for the length of one field, and then proceeds in a southerly direction along the boundary lines of the parishes of Farewell and Chorley, until it enters the township of Elmhurst, in the said parish of Saint Chad, along which boundary it proceeds, in a southerly, westerly, and north westerly direction, till it again enters the said parish of Chorley, the boundary of which it keeps till it joins the said

parish of Longdon, along the boundary of which it extends by Longdon-common to Coney-mill, and then includes a certain tract of common land adjoining Cannock-chase (called Burntwood-common), marked by metes and stones (which includes a piece of inclosed land near the Norton Reservoir, and another piece, with a house called Coney-lodge), and there, taking the boundary of the common, joins the boundary of the township of Hammerwick, and extends along the boundary of such township, in a south easterly direction, to the boundary of Wall Chapel District, where it crosses fields to the gate at Broad-lane, and along Broad-lane, crossing the Ediall-road, along Pipe-marsh to the Pipe-grange-lane, from where the boundary commenced, as is more particularly delineated on the map hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured blue:

"The boundary of the chapelry district of Wall commences at Muckley-corner Public-house, proceeds in a south westerly direction along the boundary of the extra parochial place of Ogle Hay, crosses the Wyrley and Essington Canal, keeping the boundary of Ogle Hay, down a certain road called Red Gap-road; and from thence, in a north easterly direction, along the boundary fence between Wall township and Shenstone parish (including a piece of waste land called Wall-butts) till it reaches the Watling-street-road, along which it proceeds by Wall, crossing the Birmingham and Lichfield turnpike road till it reaches the Hill-hall Farm-gate on the boundary of Swinfen township, when it proceeds along a fence, in a north westerly direction, for the length of one field, when it leaves the Swinfen boundary and takes the boundary of Saint Michael's parish, Lichfield, in the same direction, till it gets to a certain old road called the Icknield-street-road, along which it proceeds till it reaches the Birmingham and Lichfield turnpike road, and from thence (still keeping the boundary of Saint Michael's parish), along a fence till it reaches an old lane, now disused, formerly part of the Icknield-street-road, where it keeps along the Saint Michael's boundary, in a north westerly direction, for some distance, and then turns short off, in a circuitous direction, along one fence, and through three fields, till it reaches a road leading from Wall to Lichfield, which it crosses, in a north westerly direction, passing through the ground near Aldershaw-house till it reaches a certain field
