

called the Conduit-meadow, where it takes the fence at the bottom, in the same direction, to the corner of the field, and then turns off in a northern direction till it reaches a certain road called Fosseyway, along which it extends in a north westerly direction till it reaches a certain piece of waste land called Pipe-marsh, opposite Fosseyway-house, where it proceeds in a northern direction, keeping the outside or eastern boundary of the marsh, which it includes, crossing the Lichfield and Walsall boundary turnpike road, till it reaches the bottom of a lane leading to a house called Pipe-grange, when, instead of proceeding up the lane, it keeps the outside boundary of the marsh, in a south easterly direction, till it reaches a lane leading to Ediall and Burntwood, up which it proceeds, in a north westerly direction, as far as a certain lane called Broad-lane, along which it extends till it reaches a gate leading to the inclosed lands, and then turns off, in a south easterly direction, for the length of two fields, when it extends in a southerly direction till it reaches the brook on the Hammerwick Broadway, along which it continues, in an easterly direction, crossing the Wyrley and Essington Canal, till it reaches the Lichfield and Walsall turnpike road, down which it extends till it reaches Muckley-corner, which is the point where the boundary commenced, as is more particularly delineated on the map hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured red :

“ That banns of marriage should be published, and also that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized and performed in the said two chapels; and that the fees arising therefrom should be received by and belong to the respective Ministers of the said chapels :

“ That the consent of the Right Reverend John Lord Bishop of Lichfield has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third; in testimony whereof, the said John Lord Bishop of Lichfield has signed and sealed this present instrument :

“ Your Majesty’s Commissioners, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet.”

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment be accordingly made, and the recommendations of the said Commissioners, in respect of the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, and the fees arising therefrom, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Act.

WHEREAS Her Majesty’s Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the fourth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty’s reign, intituled “ An Act concerning banns and marriages in “ certain district churches or chapels,” duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the nineteenth day of March one thousand eight hundred and forty-five, in the words following, that is to say :

“ Your Majesty’s Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, under the provisions of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled “ An Act to amend “ and render more effectual an Act, passed in the “ last session of Parliament, for building, and “ promoting the building, of additional churches “ in populous parishes,” a district was, by virtue of, and in conformity to, an Order of your Majesty in Council, dated the second day of October one thousand eight hundred and forty-three, duly assigned to the church of Saint Paul, in Wilton-place, in the parish of Saint George, Hanoversquare, in the county of Middlesex and diocese of London :

“ That, since the date of the Order in Council, in consequence of the death of the Rector of the
